James Brogden was born in Manchester and now lives in the Midlands where he teaches English. He also spent part of his childhood in rural Tasmania, Australia. His often blends writing elements of local history and

folklore together to make unique, contemporary fantasy tales.

His first novel, THE NARROWS was published in 2012 and is an urban fantasy with horror elements set in Birmingham (published by Snow Books). Before being accepted by Snow Books the novel won through three rounds of <u>WEbook.com's</u> "Page to Fame" competition to the "Agents' Showcase" section and also won a Bestseller award from <u>www.Page 99test.com</u> both of which helped him to be accepted by Snow Books.

When he last visited us, he had was just about to publish his second novel, TOURMALINE which was then followed by sequel, THE REALT. He was then taken up by one of the major SFF imprints, Titan Books and has published three stand-alone novels with them to date. These are HEKLA'S CHILDREN (which was described by *The Guardian* as a "visceral, seat-of-the-pants thriller"), THE HOLLOW TREE (based on the local mystery of Bella in the Wych Elm) and his latest, THE PLAGUE STONES (published in May of this year) where decisions made centuries ago at the height of the Great Plague have consequences for the modern residents of a small village.

He is also an accomplished short story writer, and his stories have appeared in many well-regarded publications and anthologies. *Alchemy Press* published a collection of this short stories, EVOCATIONS which showcases his versatility and (as I said when I reviewed it for the BSFG) his mischievous and satirical sense of humour. To maintain the BSFG Website to an agreed format and to update it as necessary.


The other ORDINARY MEMBER

RETRO-REVIEW: CITY BY CLIFFORD D SIMAK Reviewed by Ian Morley

Clifford D Simak has been one of my favourite authors, since reading WAYSTATION in my early teens, which I have reread a few times since. Having also read a number of his other full-length works, I recently realised that I had not read his fixup novel CITY. This novel is a set of linked short stories written between 1944 and 1951. The stories make up a future history covering 12,000 years. The main focus is on a single family named Webster, whose actions forge the history of the human race, and the evolution of dogs that are genetically-engineered to have the power of speech.

Each story is linked by the use of an editorial introduction by a dog historian. The first story sets the stage with a world where technology and plenty of personal resources have made cities obsolete. Subsequent stories track the decline of the human race, and the rise of a mutant branch of humanity that takes its own path. It is told, mainly, through the eyes of various dogs and a robot, called Jenkins, who is present over the tens of centuries spanned by these stories. It is an apocalyptic tale, but unusual in that there is no destructive event, rather a series of decisions that gradually change



the nature and viability of the human race.

Each chapter is set a few decades or centuries after the previous chapter, most of the chapters flowing easily from one to another due to their setting and tone. On the other hand, there are a couple of chapters that took a page or two before I was able to get in to them, as a result of their displacement from the previous narrative.

For me there are two main themes throughout the book. Firstly, that the human race in order to develop and ultimately survive, needs the struggle against its limitations and environment. The second theme is that of

personal responsibility. In that if we are to make decisions that could affect a great many others, we have to accept that we cannot be sure of the final outcome. In the book the characters often wrestle with the decisions they have to make, and the reader is drawn in to their internal conflict by Simak's skilful prose.

Due to the fixup format, the novel perhaps feels less complete than WAYSTATION. However, the reader who enjoys the pastoral settings often used by Simak will very much like the overall experience of reading this work. As is common with all Simak novels, the characters (most notably Jenkins) elicit much sympathy from the reader, which combined with thought provoking developments and some beautiful descriptive phrases show why this title continues to be so highly regarded. *IM*



NEWS IN BRIEF



Cosmonaut Alexei Leonov died on 11th October. He was most wellknown as the first human to successfully complete a spacewalk, spending 12 minutes outside the capsule during the *Voskhod-2* mission. He nearly didn't survive as his spacesuit expanded in the vacuum

and he was now too large to re-enter the spacecraft. He took the risky step of bleeding off oxygen to shrink the suit and successfully got back into the airlock. A keen artist, he was also the first man to create art in space having taken a sketch pad and crayons on the mission. He also was one half of the first international handshake in space when he and astronaut, Tom Stafford met in the docking tunnel in the first Soyuz-Apollo rendezvous in space. He continued his interest in art and was a respected and talented painter, probably best known for his paintings of space scenes Actor Stephen Moore died on October 4th. He was the voice of Marvin the Paranoid Android in the radio and television versions of *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy*. He also played a Silurian (Eldane) in Series 5 of Dr Who and Adrian Mole's father in the TV adaptation Dave Langford has almost completed a collection of **Bob Shaw's** "serious science" talks, which will be released as a free ebook at http://taff.org.uk He is still missing the final speech from the 1995 Eastercon and the 1st Glasgow Worldcon later that

year. Can anyone help? SF story The Testaments by Margaret Atwood and Girl, Woman, Other by Bernardine Evaristo were announced as joint winners of the 2019 Booker Prize. This caused some controversy as the judges broke their own rules which state that there can only be one winner The James Tiptree, Jr. Literary Award (which aims to encourage "the exploration and expansion of gender") has been renamed the Otherwise Award. This was in response to the discomfort about the controversial circumstances of her husband's death. 

MISTLETOE by Alison Littlewood

Strong emotions can leave their mark. One of the theories behind hauntings is that powerful events are recorded by the fabric of the place they happen in and are replayed is the right trigger is tripped. Other ghostly sightings attributed to unfinished are business on the part of the deceased. This might be benign or, in some cases, a desire for revenge. Whether ghosts can actually influence the actions of living the or are merelv apparitions depends on the kind of ghost story being told. If strong emotions didn't generate the ghost, the actual haunting can provoke them. Ghost stories belong to a popular genre and



while readers enjoy them, the reality is open to speculation. But it is not only the strong emotions of the ghost that should be taken into consideration, there are also those of the one who perceive the haunting.

Leah has had a tough few months. Her son and husband are dead (we learn later the circumstances) and her grief is raw. Before the tragedy, she and Josh were considering buying a house in the countryside with space for Finn to play. One of the places Josh had thought had possibilities had been Maitland Farm. Leah had considered it with disquiet as her maiden name was Maitland and she suspected that she was descended from the original owners but in the aftermath of Finn's and Josh's deaths, she bought it. Now she has arrived.

It is just before Christmas and it is snowing. The house is very rundown and has barely any furniture. Conditions are fairly primitive as there have been no recent improvements and it has been empty for a number of years. It is not surprising that she hears noises outside during the night. She thinks she has an explanation when she disturbs Charlie, the son of a neighbour, lurking in the barn. Initially, she thinks that the very ugly doll he has dropped is his. When she is holding it, she has a vison of another boy dressed in similar clothes to the doll.

Charlie's mother, Cath, brings the boy over to apologise for trespassing and invites Leah for Christmas dinner. It looks as if Leah has begun to be accepted and she discovers a little about the previous owners of the farm. Discoveries of mistletoe leaves in a cupboard as she begins the manmoth task of cleaning seem to trigger more visions and the tragedies that led to the Maitland's deserting the farm are played out for her.

This is the kind of ghost story that can be taken in different ways. All the events could be because Leah is in an emotionally vulnerable place, it is her first Christmas on her own, in a house that is isolated, neglected and external sounds can be exaggerated. All these factors coming together are likely to excite the imagination and disturb sleep causing hallucinations. Mistletoe, which plays a significant part in the story – it being prevalent on the trees in the orchard behind the farm, can be mildly hallucinogenic and could be the cause of what Leah is experiencing. Alternatively, her connection with the house through her heritage, and the unresolved events of the past could equally be a haunting to which she is susceptible. After all, someone had to have chopped the wood for the fire and brought the tree into the house, and she doesn't remember doing it.

Whatever the explanation is, and only the reader can decide, this is an excellent piece of story-telling. The characters and situation draw the reader in, and if there are some aspects that seem familiar, they are dealt with in a very competent way. A good read. PM
