ROBERT LIDNEL FANTHORPE

Yes, after two cancellations, it seems to be definitely on this month. Our speaker has to be in Birmingham on Saturday for a family wedding so it is highly unlikely that anything will go wrong this time (But what if the bride suddenly decides oh SHUT UP ... think positive). Many of you have asked the all important question about our world-famous guest speaker ... "Who is he?". Always something of a mystery man in the science fiction world, his career started in the late 50s when he started chiring out writing novels for that unique paperback house Badger books (unobtainable in all reputable bookshops but heavily stocked in all dingy back-street newsagents). His fame from such unforgettable novels as er ... er ... and ... oh ... well, I'm sure you remember, grew alarmingly. So much so that he started writing under the pseudonym Pel Torro. So unique was his literary efforts that his cover-up was blown. He changed to Lionel Roberts, a couple by Bron Fane, a couple of dozen novels as John E Muller...but no, all SF fans knew that behind these names the brilliantly devious mind of Robert Lionel Fanthorpe lurked, spewing forth these literary gems. 6 months and 57 novels later, Badger books started their Supernatural series ... novels and collections of short stories by such great and diverse names as Bron Fane. Pel Torro, Lionel Roberts, John E Muller and Karl Zeigfried. (Who was Karl Zeigfried everyone wondered ... could Badger books have found a new literary genius?) Alas, or fortunately (especially if you happened to be Fanthorpe's bank manager), the Zeigfried pen-name was discovered too - yet another by-line of the prolific Robert Lionel Fanthorpe - yet another three pounds, sixteen shillings and eleven pence per novel. Unfortunately in the mid-sixties, after writing all 118 of the Badger SF series and all 109 of the Supernatural series, his pen ran out of ink. Only then did he realise that it had cost him more to write the novels than he was getting paid by his publishers! Frustrated, penniless and unable to buy an ink refill, Robert Lionel Fanthorpe gave up writing ... his bank notified him of his 15000 overdraft and he disappeared forever Until now, that is, when he breaks

his 15 year silence to come and speak to the Birmingham SF Group. Don't miss this historic event when all the <u>true</u> facts about Badger Books and Robert Lionel Fanthorpe will be revealed...he might even show us all the scars from the manacles - proof of his years chained in the basement by his publishers, being forced to write one unreadable novel after another while they, raking in all the profits lived in luxury riding around on their brand-new second-hand bikes! Remember....THIS FRIDAY....Robert Lionel Fanthorpe at the Brum Group!

Nigel Kneale has now completed a 4th Quatermass serial to be shown on BBC-TV this Autumn. The budget was over a million pounds and its to be shown in 4 parts. There will be a novelisation by Kneale in hardcover in August and in paperback in September. The paperback is from Arrow books who will be reissuing the original 3 Quatermass scripts (complete with stills) in October.
