

Well, well. Here it is one hear since I start -ed putting this thing out.



Let's look at the history of BUOY: On December Ist, 1952, I rele eas ed what I thought was a fanzine. It was half-page size, he ktoed, and like a fool I sent severa I around for reviews. But the second i ssue made up for that with Terry Carr on my staff. (He is replaced by Samu el Mines, new, after he gave up th cottant dard Magazines as a hopelessca.

-dard Magazines as a hopelessca-use, and joined fandom). With #3 I had it mimeoed, and was slightly thicker than before I might add that the cover was dra -wh by the famous illus trator, Roger Cana les, who now draws in -teriors for Astounding. Number #4 saw a decreas e in quality, but #5 came out with less gripes. #6 had a cover drawn by Bill Pri co of the Fantasy Art Sciety, and a'few fillers drawn by Shelby Vick, which was my first experience with BNFs. #7 saw light in July, 1953, with a new columhist, Walt Willis. #8 came out photo-pffset, with a 50,000'word novel by Robert A. Heinlein, ill-



ustrated by Virgil Finlay, which caused the same sort of sensation in the ranks of fen that "The Lovers" did. #9 came out, minus Torry Carr, who had just sold a novel to Shasta and went off ass a free-lamce writer. #10 was printed, #ust after I had bought all of Sun Dial's equipment. With that issue my circulation reached its all-time high of 50 million. #11 ushered in 7th Fandom, which, naturally, centered about BOO!...And this #12, our annish. Hope you like it..."

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A certain Donald O. Cantin pubs a mag called MICRO. Ho sent me a copy of it in exchange for aplug here. I'll do bette r than that—I'll review it. The cover is something that no true-blue Keasler fan should miss. It's a pic of a girl sitting on a rock, bare where her shirt should be, except that Don stapled a little strip of carboa rd over it; and when you lift it—well; send for one and see...Inside is loads of BNF stuff: Bob Tucker, Harlan Ellison, Rich Elsberry, Lymm Hickman, plus some excellent fillers by Peatrosky and Cantin. I especially got a kick out of the take-off on those Resicrucian ads on the backs of stf mags, "In your Headbone's Eyeball". Oh yeh. Forget to mention that they cost 10¢ per, 3/25¢. 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

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
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

The old adage of "Too many cooks spoil the broth," or to bring it up to date, "Toomany prozines on the market..." has finally tooken its toll. Science-Fiction's top monthly "fan's magazine, START-

MOIL

LING STORIES, has reverted to the pre-152 days; and is returing to its old hi-monthly schedule of because of a loahest of material, says editor Mines.

Theartily agree. There are too many prozines on the market of America for the good of science fiction. These extra magazines (some of them good, some terrible) are taxing the out-put of the authors of s-f to the limit; and the quality of most stories has determined stantlingly

in the last fe w years. All the former bi-monthly mags going monthly hasn't helped matters and, either.

Now, I don't want to kee any science flotion magazines go down the drain, any more than you do, with the possible exception of the Lowndes magazines, and a couple of other race, but something must be done. Either all the mags now being published will have to slow down their publing schedules mightily, or some of the present magazines will have to be junked. I will not say which ones those would be. Ism quite sure you know who will go first.

One thing he w publishing mompenies who are taking on a science fiction magazines must realize is that there is no longer any place for additional magazines in the field, if the quality of the fiction appearing in them is to remain at stabus quo. Science Fiction—in magazine and book form—has just reached its peak, in fact I would say, the peak is here in quantity, if nothing else, Off course, they quality can always go higher, but that is beside the point. The quantity of science fiction meading material will either remain static, or go down. It certainly cannot go very much further up. With 35 or 40 magazines now on the stands, the poor reader has all he can do to keep up with half of them.

Hugo Gernsback started AMAZING STORIES back in 1926 he wanted to please the palates of the readers of a certain field. science fication. He published science fication magazine because he desired to, not for money /Do I hear a laught as most publishers to now. He wanted to give entertainment of the highest calibre them available to his readers. Few indeed are the editors today who publishe forthis reason. The Almighty Dollar is their god. And while this is true, science fiction editors, as a whole, aromet going to care what kind of stories they print in their magazines, just so the pages are full. Proof of this is AMAZING STORIES, eclied by Howard Browne. He is such an editor.

You hear now t hat the active fan who reads stfmags and writes to the editor represent s a mere 2% of the circulation of that mag. There is proof of that crass comercializtion that has been infuencing the field for some years now. The fan has lost a large part of his voice'in the prozines. Many magazines, including the afor mentioned AS, no longer carry fan departments of any kind. With the abrubt growth of science fiction reading material, magazines, and the like, the fan has been shoved out, just so the dditor can print more crud. And the more stories a magazine prints, the more drain on authors. The more the authors are putting out, the less quality of their output. Down goes the quality.

I do not like to see quality sacrificed for quantity. The only answer is to get rid of about half the science fiction magazines on the market that an aristourat like SRARTLING STORIES must backtrack one of the smartest moves ever made by an editor of that magazine, simply because not enough good material is available. surely hope that the move is not permanent'.

With all due respect to Lee Hoffman and QUANDRY, there are times when I think Lee has entered the realm of deification to read and hear what some fans have to say. For example, on page 27 of EC-LIPSE, May 1953, we find this: "Willis wouldn't have made it, if it hadn't been for Lee Hoffman and QUANDRY. After QUANDRY started carrying the torch, everybody started sending money, just to get in the latest fad in fandom. They just contributed be cause it was the thing, the current rage. Anything that QUANDRY does, the rest of fandom must do, or be considered worse than BEMS ((Now the test of fandom must do, or be considered worse than BEMS ((Now the test of fandom might be a time like QUANDRY, I am very much afraid that fandom might have died out long ago, had it not been for QUANDRY, because the only things that get done in fandom nowadays are those things endorsed by Hoffman." Of course, A kerman, Tairrasi, Sykora, Carr, etc., never do anything. Lee has done a lot for fandom, granted, but she isn't fandom in herself; as the above quoted article, and some fonwuld believe if we followed their arguments to their logical conclusion. If we accept the line of reasoning of the above quoted article, it wn't be bongbofore we-fre saying: Hoil Hoffman. After all, there is such a thing as scientific objectivity.

Bob and I happened to be discussing research articles today. In writing research articles, the main points are to quote accurately and to footnote properly. Let's take a sample:

3Vernon L. McCain, "Beer & Buttermilk;" Confusion, 2:2, February, 1953.

First came the footnote number, which must appear both in the text and the correspinding number down at the bottom of the pge in front of the author's name, as in the sample above.

Secondly, put the authors name, and middle initial if he has one, In footnoting, the regular order of the person's name comes first, Rafer to sample above (In bibliography this order is reversed).

Third comes the title of the article. This should be enclosed in quotation marks.

Fourth comes the title of the magazine itself. This should be underlined. See sample above.

Fifth is the volume number separated by the division line, and followed by the page number. In the event that the volume number is not listed put the initials n.v. (no.volume) where the volume number would be.

Sixth is the date, month, and year, followed by a period,

This footnoting procedure applies to magazines only.

Research articles are something that is sailly lacking in fandom, and would help spread information more resterally around if used. By reffering to footnotes, aperson can get in idea of where to look for further material on that subject. This I believe, is the most important function of the footnote. In addition, it enables the reader to check sources of information in order to determine the accuracy. Fan magazines urticles would show a much higher level of quality, I believe, if more rescrach articles were used.

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
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FANZINES

This is the fourth issue of Balint's zine, and it's abig improvement over the first three issues. There're eight letter-sized pages here, as opposed to the two-to-four pages of the earlier issues. Larry Ander son (editor of SCIMTILLA) has a short bit explaining "How to Grow An Airpabne Plant", Raleigh Multog has a "poem", Bob Stewart (yeah) has a feat ure entitled "Fishbowl of The Future" (subtitle: This Fishy World), Don Cantin calls for all fanzine publish ers to stop bringing out new zines, and David A. Betes rambles...there's also a fanzine-review column, and a letter column. I liked Stewart's bit the best (honest!) and Multog's poem the least...But then you 'd most likely disagree with me.




