

All armigers whose arms have passed the College of Heralds completely are urged to see that notification is made to the proper Baronial Pursuivant, so that their arms may be entered in the Caid Ordinary (register of arms) which is being compiled. All heralds are reminded that one of the main purposes of tournies, heraldically speaking, is to get together with other heralds and compare notes. It is also a good time for heralds to track down armigers who have hitherto escaped their grasp, and to secure an accounting of their arms for the Ordinary.

(ed. note: Anyone who needs aid in designing a nice coat of arms should contact their local herald--if they are at all attentive to their business, they know an artist or two who can "visualize" your idea for you. It might also be noted that there is a sufficient amount of unicorns & griffins already in use -- try for originality!)



MY LORDS & LADIES OF CAID,

It has long been known that the College of Scribes of the Kingdom of the West has been, not only excellent in its productions, but grossly overworked.

WE NEED A COLLEGE OF SCRIBES IN CAID!

WE NEED A COLLEGE OF SCRIBES FOR THREE REASONS:

- 1) When Caid becomes a Kingdom, we will have to have our own College, as we will no longer have the services of the West Kingdom scribes.
- 2) It would be very decent of us to relieve West Kingdom scribes of some of their load by rendering our own scrolls. This would have the added advantage of speeding up delivery of scrolls to those of our people who have received various awards but who are still waiting for documents.
- 3) It is entirely possible that the West Kingdom College of Scribes may decide that "you're a Principality now, so in theory you should have enough people active in the right areas to be able to do your own scribe work. It's all yours now!" I've had indications that this may happen in the not too far distant

I've read in several issues of the PAGE that there have been calligraphy classes in Calafia. What happened Ioanes Leckie (Jon Lackey) has held classes in Los Angeles on calligraphy, but very few SCA members have gone to them. Why is that? Lots of people have said to me "I'd like to learn calligraphy." Why haven't you? If you have, why haven't you told me about it?

I'd like to have all of you calligraphers out there get in touch with your local Master or Mistress of the Sciences, or with me directly, for the purpose of setting up classes; and get in touch with your local Herald or Lord Conrad von Regensburg, Crescent Herald of the Principality, for the proper text of various awards (I would prefer that you went through the proper Baronial Council Meeting, 1974.

I'd like all of you illuminators out there to get in touch with your local Master or Mistress of the Arts or with Lady Meg Shelford, Principality Mistress of the Arts, for the same reasons as above.

If people are dissatisfied with the long time it takes to get a scroll, we have no one to blame but ourselves -- the Kingdom scribes are doing the best they can. Let's get the ball rolling, people!

TO ALL PRINCES, CONSTABLES & SENESCHALS...

On May 4, IX, King Andrew did appoint me to the post of Constable of the Kingdom of the West. As such I intend to make a few basic changes and to clarify as much as possible. To these ends I am taking the following steps:

- 1) All Deputy Constables will be issued a warrant confirming them in their posts. If anyone has been told he is a deputy but has not received a new warrant he should see me immediately. Anyone who hasn't got a new warrant is not a Deputy Constable.
- 2) A job description follows. Please note the "Qualifications". The basic purpose of these requirments is to get competent, self-confident men who are skilled at working with people. The age limit is for legal reasons.

DEPUTY CONSTABLE: Duties -- enforce the King's Law. Maintain the security of all SCA events. Greet newcomers to events, telling them of the SCA and directing them to the Golden Key for further info and costumes.

Qualifications: Loyal to the King. At least 18 years of age (only in exceptional cases will anyone under 21 be accepted). Preferrably a fighter. Able to work amicably with strangers. Willing to spend an indeterminate amount of time officiating rather than participating. Prefer a man who holds no other office. In Caid or An Tir, he must be acceptable to the Principality Constable.

Pay: The satisfaction of serving the King.

Remember: events held on city or county property can be investigated by Fire Marshalls, who have the right to order removal of all "fire hazards". Think on't: a simple precaution now could not only prevent hassles with officials, but perhaps an irreversible accident to loved ones.

WHY FORM HOUSEHOLDS?

There have been a number of questions and misconceptions of late about what does or does not constitute a household, what households are and are not supposed to do, and who may or may not form one. Perhaps some clarification is in order.

Strictly speaking, households have no official status in the West. That is, the Crown does not formally recognize households except as social units and does not charter them. Hence, households are not obliged to follow any organizational regulations set down by the Crown beyond those dictated by common sense and the duty of any loyal subject to his Sovereign Liege.

What this means is that households may vary Some will consist only of a Lord and his Lady; greatly. some will be five or six people--perhaps related by some Society relationship, but perhaps not -- who simply like to attend events together; some will be formed of a Knight, his Lady, their offspring, if any, several squires, and perhaps a few men-at-arms and ladies-in -waiting: still others will be the so-called Great Households like House Bellatrix or Bufo Manor or House Irini, perhaps containing several "family units" which in turn may comprise part of a more or less organized alliance of households: Chaos, Toad Hall, the Merini Alliance. Whatever the size, the purpose is generally the same; to share the joys and the work of attending a Society function, to trade special skills, whether it be cooking, sewing, fighting or whatever, and to do it in congenial company, each member contributing as he or she is able.

It is customary in the West (and especially in the Mists), though not mandatory, that only armigers (people who hold at least an Award of Arms from the Crown) form their own households. This is probably a good idea, since it tends to ensure that at least one person in the household has been in the Society long enough to have become acquainted with the ground rules of the Current Middle Ages, and to have made sufficient constructive contribution to come to the favorable attention of the Crown. However, since all members of a household assume the dignity of the highest-ranking member, it is probably sufficient that only a member -- not necessarily the head -of a household be armigerous. (On the other hand, if you're already in a household and have no armigers yet, or if you're thinking of forming one but are alarmed by what you've read above, don't give up you're plans. award of arms does not make the recipient noble; it simply acknowledges the existence of qualities which were already present. Noble actions will speak far more eloquently than a wallful of scrolls, however artistically calligraphed and illuminated. Remember, everyone is considered to be a Lord or a Lady unless he or she shows otherwise by churlish behavior!)

But I digress. The qualities of nobility are for another time, requiring far more space. Households, in a word, are useful, beautiful, rewarding-and fun. And if the latter is missing, you might as well forget all the others. Prosperity and health to the Households of Caid!

A few ground-rules about Households:

You don't ask to join a household--the household will indicate its interest in a new member. If you are interested in a particular household, it would do no harm to be helpful & show interest.

If you are dissatisfied with your household, remove yourself from it or try to remedy the problem. You do NOT discuss household problems to outsiders!

Sometimes (but rarely) a person may belong to two (or more) households at once. This occurs ONLY with the permission of the head of your original household. It usually involves "membership" in a perhaps distant household that is more honorary than real, or belonging to a company of fighters (or other types) and also to a household.

BE IT NOTED:

Griffin Freehold is the name of the Trimble household in the SCA. Mathom House is a real business title under which a "cottage industry" of publications is maintained in the mundane world. Do not confuse the two, please!

The Merini Alliance is a combination of House Merriment and House Irini: at no time has it included Griffin Freehold, and the so-called "Merini-Grif" Alliance does not exist as a household name. All three households are friendly, however, and copperative on SCA projects.

The SCA and other groups will be given better treatment this year, so you can have lots of fun at the Faire while helping KPFK build its dwindling treasury! Though we aren't going to be a strictly Medieval and Renaissance theme this year, it would still be a good place to advertise SCA activities with small handouts. Anyone who can sew would be able to get \$ or trade for crafts by helping craftspeople with costuming: contact us if interested. We also have a contest going for a good, long-range symbol for the Faire that shows all the fun, sharing, and giving involved: even a rough sketch that can be redrawn by one of our artists is acceptable-or a verbal description. DEADLINE: August 30. Another contest is for best decoration of our already-made banners, to help dress up the Palladium stage: contact us for picking up a banner or two.

The theme will be a rather loose "Christmas Through the Ages" with more emphasis on creative, colorful, Christmas-y costuming than the authenticity of any era. (Some of the craftsmen rented Renaissance costumes at \$75 and \$150 each, last year!). We'd like to see more rustic country marketplace type outfits (not country Western, but Old World). If you have any designs...



If you'd like to see less Angels News and more news from <u>your</u> area, you know what to do about it! I can bug local (Angels) people easiest, which is why we have so much from them! So....

Thank you.

We are hoping to get a notebook together showing photographs of the costumes of the Barony of the Angels whole hordes of SCA folk go a-Maying, it was deemed a with record cards attached. This notebook would be for educational fashion shows, and for showing off to others what marvellous costumers we all are and to show newcomers what can be done in costuming. I would greatly appreciate it if pictures could be in full color and full-length. (Perhaps our new Principalit Image-Maker, Lady Joan of Crawfordsmuir, would provide you with a good portrait for a nominal sum). The info cards should be standard 3x5", TYPED, and have the following information: (1) Your name--both mundane & Society); (2) Name or type of costume; (3) Date or period of costume; (4) Origination and/or country of costume. Avoid any obvious descriptions (i.e: "Thiis a green dress with pink sleeves...") but if the outfit has anything unusual about it--90 million beads to the square inch, or rare trim, etc--please note that on the card. If you wish, some indication of the cost, time taken to make the costume and any anecdotes or historical notes would be interesting. Any or all of the above should be fitted onto ONE SIDE of the card. Don't procrastinate--help fill the notebook!



WANTED: ASSISTANTS FOR THE GOLDEN KEY!

In the Northern Kingdom, the Golden Key has 6 ladies in charge of it, and a sewing society to provide costumes for it. Yet, I have noted on my trips North that their Golden Key has about 1/3 of the costumes that the Barony of the Angels has, and that they are neither pressed, kept hung on racks or even nearly so nice as ours. I have noted one other thing-the Barony of the Angels has exactly 1/6 the woman-power of the Kingdom's Golden Key! This 1/6th is bepower of the Kingdom's Golden Key! ginning to feel very frayed about the edges, trying to do all the work by herself, and is clinging to her costume records with feeble, battered fingers!

I am in dire need of assistants--any sex--HELP! any and all willing help will be gladly seized upon! I would prefer someone who can sew, someone who will iron costumes, someone who can read and record items, and someone who has a car to transport costumes to events I cannot attend. THE OTHER SIDE OF GOLDEN KEY:

Greeting newcomers, explaining our ground rules & telling them about the costume-rental is a very important part of the Golden Key function. For this we have Lady Arabella Lyon de Rohese (Carlean Karnatz). who could also use some help from out-going people who are interested in recruiting interested bystanders instead of letting them wander off because everyone was too snobbish to speak to them! That's no way to build a strong group--new blood (not necessarily on the field) is always of interest to a Society that wants to keep growing.

MEDIC ALERT!

In view of the hazards on and off the field when wise idea to foster a FIRST AID CLASS in the Barony of the Angels. Go thou and do likewise! Call your local Red Cross and ask for info--they can't charge for classes, though First Aid books (\$1.95+) are usually mandatory. They'll try to set up the required 20 hours of study to suit your group's schedule, too.

We have all been remarkably lucky so far: how long do you think the law of averages will work in our favor?

People who wander around barefoot, play with knives or insist on bonking each other with even slightly lethal weapons should consider getting a tetnus booster every 5 years. Tetnus shots can be added to those given your child with no ill effects, usually. FAIR WARNING: knives left out "on display" for small fry to handle will be confiscated!

Do NOT expect your SCA Medic to carry everything you may need out in the field or woods--it is up to each person to carry his own personal bug spray, cough syrup, poison oak remedy, antihistimine, salt tablets and aspirin! Emergency medication (within reason) will be available, but NOT doled out like candy--that adds up pretty fast and depletes SCA budgets quickly!

If you are on any kind of MEDIC ALERT and have NOT brought your medication with you to the event, the Chirurgeon in charge can (and will) ask the autocrat in charge to send you home to get it! Some particularly un-cute attention-getting devices have been pulled in the past (on others), but that type of person will find I'm rather hard-nosed and unsympathetic--they'll get First Aid, but they may remember it a long time! Take heed--if you NEED medication, don't be stupid & leave it at home to prove how brave you are! That kind of "chest-beating" is pointless, dangerous, & takes up my time when a real emergency might occur.

HOW A "BRANSLE" BECAME A "BRAWL"

In the 11-13th Centuries, s before a voiced consonant (which includes 1) stopped being pronounced in Old French. So you're left with branle from bransle.

The final \underline{e} was pronounced $\underline{-uh}(a)$ until a couple of centuries ago, and still is in formal poetry, so you have branl(a).

an became a nasal vowel a, so you get bral(a).


Normally now, that final a is silent, so you get bral, which is fine except English doesn't have nasal vowels--we tend to hear them as vowel + n or just plain vowel.

If you figure just plain vowel, you're left with bral, which sounds like "brawl". OK? Clear as mud, no doubt!

Random House Dictionary gives branle as a better spelling. If their etymology is correct, disregard the first sentence above: (S's often got stuck in words they didn't belong in when people stopped pronouncing them). Random thinks it's branal in English, which is a less modern-French pronounciation: take your pick. al is really just a 'syllabic' 1 = brant.

You would also understand, in that case, should he win a prize, it would be hers, not yours, and you would have only the reflected glory. It may or may not suffice.

I have seen the Northern Kingdom give out awards to people who have done very little, in comparison with others who go without rewards but work very hard for the Society. Who decides upon these awards and who gets them? -- Very Interested.

Dear Very:

DARYOLS, DARIOLLS & MAIDS-OF-HONOUR

A simple but tasty (and unfortunately, highly calorific) dessert has come down through the ages under various names, and some slight changes in the recipe, but remains basically a creamy tart worth trying.

A royal cookbook, THE FORME OF CURY, was compiled by the cooks who served Richard II, in about 1390. "Cury" being an Old English word for cooking; the title a sort of Chaucerian way of saying "The Art of Cookery". In it was one of the first recorded recipes for "French Daryols":

Take creme of cowe mylke, (or) almandes. Do thereto ayren (eggs), with sugar, safron, and salt. Medle it ifere (mix it together). Do it in a coffyn of two ynche depe; bake it wel, and serve it forth.

The recipe stayed popular throughout Medieval times and was served often both at banquets and for "tea" or snack-time, and were as popular with men as women. By the time of Henry VIII, the recipe went thus:

Flaky pie crust 1 doz. unbaked tart shells 1-1/4 c. milk, scalded & strained 1/8 tsp. salt 1 c. soft, fresh bread crumbs 1/2 c. sugar & 1/2 c. soft butter 2 eggs, well-beaten grated rind & juice of 1 lemon 1/2 c. blanched almonds

bottom & sides with fork. Brush lightly with ice water & sprinkle with sugar. Beat eggs & lemon juice (and rind) together. Add to the crumb mix, stir in almonds. Fill the shells 2/3 full. Bake in pre-heated 400° oven for 5 min. Reduce heat to 350° and continue baking until silver knife comes out dry and not milky when inserted into center of tart. Cool on wire rack. Serve warm.

Legend hath it that Henry discovered a group of Maids-of-Honour having tea, joined them, tasted the daryols, and promptly named them after the ladies. Since the tea-party was at Richmond, they are also often known as "Richmond Maids-of-Honour". There is some belief, however, that a baker--in hopes of making an impression on Elizabeth I--named them. By that time, the recipe had taken several turns. Here are two versions of an Elizabethan recipe for Daryols:

Flaky pie crust 1 doz. unbaked tart shells

1 c. powdered sugar

ground almonds (or, 8 oz. can almond paste)

1 Tbsp. flour 1/4 tsp. salt

1 egg, well beaten 2 Tbsp. whipping cream

1 Tbsp. rose water

Follow recipe for Henry VIII method, except these tarts are served with whipped cream.

Alexis Soyer, one of the first chefs to write a cook-(4) See #1.

K for the masses. was a Best-Seller from 1846 to '62 (5) SOYER'S COOKERY BOOK by Alexis Soyer (David book for the masses, was a Best-Seller from 1846 to '62 with somewhat dreary recipes for Boiled Neck of Mutton and Calf's Brain Pie. But he also had a recipe for a dessert which was by then called a Cheese Tart, or Custard Tart. The French were continuing to call them Darioles...they were Richmond Maids-of-Honour, with a few changes: by now they are Plain Cheescakes:

Puff or pie pastry 1/4 lb. cream cheese 5 Tbsp. light cream 2 eggs 1/2 c. sugar & 1/2 c. hot water 1 tsp. gelatin 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1/2 c. heavy cream, whipped

Make sufficient puff or pie pastry for 12 fluted tart pans (or use fluted or plain muffin tins). Roll out to 1/8" thickness & cut into rounds to fit the pans. Fierce with fork to prevent air bubbles & bake at 450° for 15 minutes or until delicately brown.

Prepare Dariole as follows: Blend the cream cheese with the light cream to a fluffy consistency. Set aside. In the top of a double-boiler over simmering water, beat the eggs & sugar together until creamy. Quicklyadd the hot milk, stir until mix begins to thicken. Remove from fire. Dissolve the gelatin in 1 Tbsp. cold water & add to custard. Add vanilla. Stir well. add custard to cream cheese mix & last, fold in whipped cream. Fill the baked tart shells (no further baking is necessary). Garnish with toasted coconut or slivered toasted almonds.

Sover himself put it even more simply: and it is obvious by now where the ancestry of our modern (and also unfortunately highly calorific) CHEESECAKE came from! The Medieval "daryol" is nothing more!

Put half a pint of milk curds well drained, in a basin, add to it an ounce and a half of butter, stir perfectly smooth, put in three teaspoonsful of sugar, one cunce of washed currants, one egg, half a pint of milk, and any flavour you like, as lemon, orange, &c, &e. Prepare your paste as #322 recipe, fill up the tins with this, bake the same, and serve.

In 1929, the English were still holding true to a favorite dessert, though a return to the original, less complicated recipe seems to have been in order: these are called Maids of Honour, and credited to Richmond, Surrey as their place of origin...

Pour milk over salt, bread crumbs, sugar & butter. Stir Beat together the yolks of 7 eggs and 1/2 lb. powdered & let stand 1 hour. Line the shells with pastry. Prick sugar; pound not too finely the same quantity of sweet blanched almonds, with a few bitter ones and 2 Tbsp. of orange-flower water; mix in the almonds the last thing, and bake in patty-tins lined with paste. (6)

> And finally, by 1971, the dessert is simply called "Old English Custard", and returned almost full circle to its original simplicity:

2 oz. caster sugar 1 pint of milk Rosewater

Raisins & almonds Make the custard mixture as for baked custard. Butter individual ovenproof dishes and put a layer of chopped raisins & skinned, slivered almonds in the bottom of each one. Stir a dessertspoonful of rosewater into the custard mix and fill the dishes about 2/3 full.

Place these in a baking tray of water and cook very gently in a slow oven until set. Let them get cold then put in the fridge until wanted. These little custards make a delicious dinner party sweet. Serves four. (7)

The proposal to raise the membership fee to \$10, to help set up a paid regis. try, isn't the answer, either; such an increase would simply drive away many of our students, and others on tight budgets (which might alleviate the problem, but do we want to do it that way?).
