Undaunted, the members formed smaller groups and had lively discussions on various subjects. The book for the May meeting will be Mindbridge by Joe Haldeman. The June book (chosen at this meeting) will be The Moon is a Harsh Mistress by Robert A. Heinlein. Please note we are ordering books for future meetings at each regular meeting. The April meeting will be Saturday night, April 15, at 7:30 P.M., in the Lookout Mt. Room of the UTC Student Center. We will be discussion The Jar-goon Pard by Andre Norton; Tola Sneed will be discussion leader. We will also have a video tape presentation of Westworld, a film about an animated playground of the future, and a few door prizes. In order to "save money with a group discount and to have fun with like-minded individuals," Louisville fan John Harris has organized a fan flight to WorldCon in Phoenix. Scheduled departure from Louisville is 8:24 AM on Thursday, Aug. 31 with arrival at Phoenix at 11 A.M. local time. The return flight departs Phoenix at 2:30 P.M. on Monday, Sept. 4 and arrives at Louisville at 9:55 P.M. The round trip fare is \$ 190, which is quite a bit below normal airline rates. As of now, about 25 spots are left open. To register for the flight, send a deposit of \$ 10 immediately to John Harris at 8109 Cortland Dr., Louisville, 40228. CSFA MEMBERS INVOLVED IN ACADEMIC PROJECTS....UTC Associate Professor and CSFA member Dr. Craig Barrow will write one of the articles for a book on Stanislaw Lem for the "Writers of the 21st Century" series. This series has published volumes on Isaac Asimov and Arthur C. Clarke so far, with books on Heinlein, Le Guin, Lem and others in the works. Also, UTC Associate Professor and CSFA member Dr. Dimis Weisbaker will teach a course on the writing of science fiction this fall at UTC. STAR WARS UPDATE....Locus, the SF newspaper, reports that the movie Star Wars is now the largest grossing domestic film of all time, surpassing the record set by Jaws, in November 1977. The movie sequel to Star Wars is now in the works; the script is being written by longtime SF writer Leigh Brackett. Production should start this fall; the expected release date is in early 1980. The Star Wars novellization, by George Lucas (and rumored to be co-authored by Alan Dean Foster) is also doing well. A second Star Wars novel, Splinter of the Mind's Eye by Alan Dean Foster (not the sequel to the movie), has just been released in both hardcover and paperback. (DL)

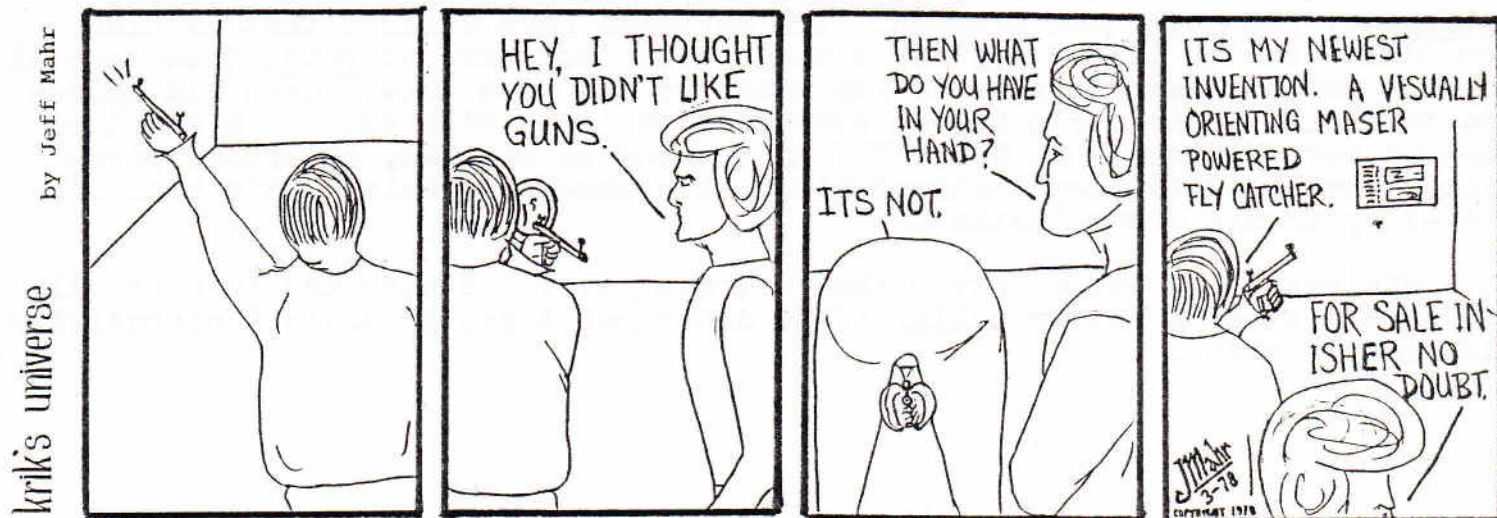

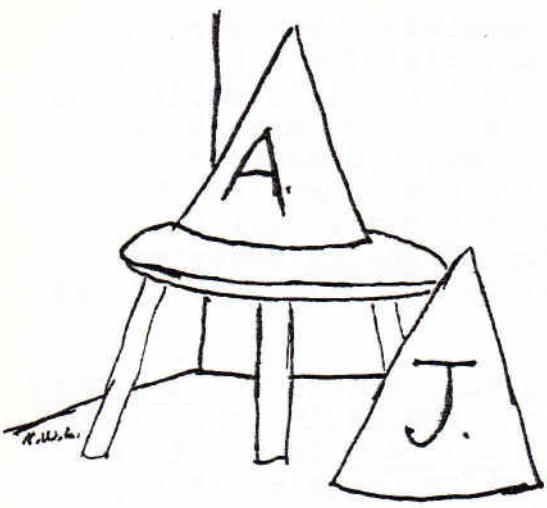
BOLO by Keith Laumer, Berkeley Medallion, \$1.50

Bolo is a collection of stories concerning Laumer's dinochrome brigade, the ultimate war machines. The introduction traces the history of the General Motors Bolo from its inception as a semi-automated tank to a fully sentient war wagon.

Each of the six stories in the book deal with a Bolo at a particular stage in their development, although all but one deals with a unit years after it has been taken off active duty. "Field Test" concerns the first sentient Bolo and is told from the different points of view of those involved in its first combat activity, including the Bolo.ONE. Being totally programmed for war, the sentient Bolos develop their own psychology, and their actions and motives prove sometimes quite interesting, based, no doubt, on Laumer's own perceptions of things.

Also of interest to fans of Laumer's other works is the story "Courier", which features that irrepressible diplomat James Retief. (By this story and mention of CDT in others, Laumer has definitely linked the universes of Retief and the Bolos.) However, this seems to be a different Retief than seen previously, which makes me suspect that this is truly a Bolo story more than one of Retief. The story is dated 1961, so perhaps this was a rough draft version of Retief? At any rate, Bolo is full of action and good story telling, and the general scarcity of Laumer material makes it well worth the money for that reason alone.

"Movin' on" from insects, before it begins to bug us too much, AJ saw The Car, the story of a demon possessed auto that chases James Brolin up a cliff and the audience out of the theatre. Or to escape The Car, we could have gone to a mysterious tropical island...that is, if we wanted to be turned into humanimals. We don't believe in cruelty to defenseless humans so we didn't waste our time on The Island of Dr. Moreau.

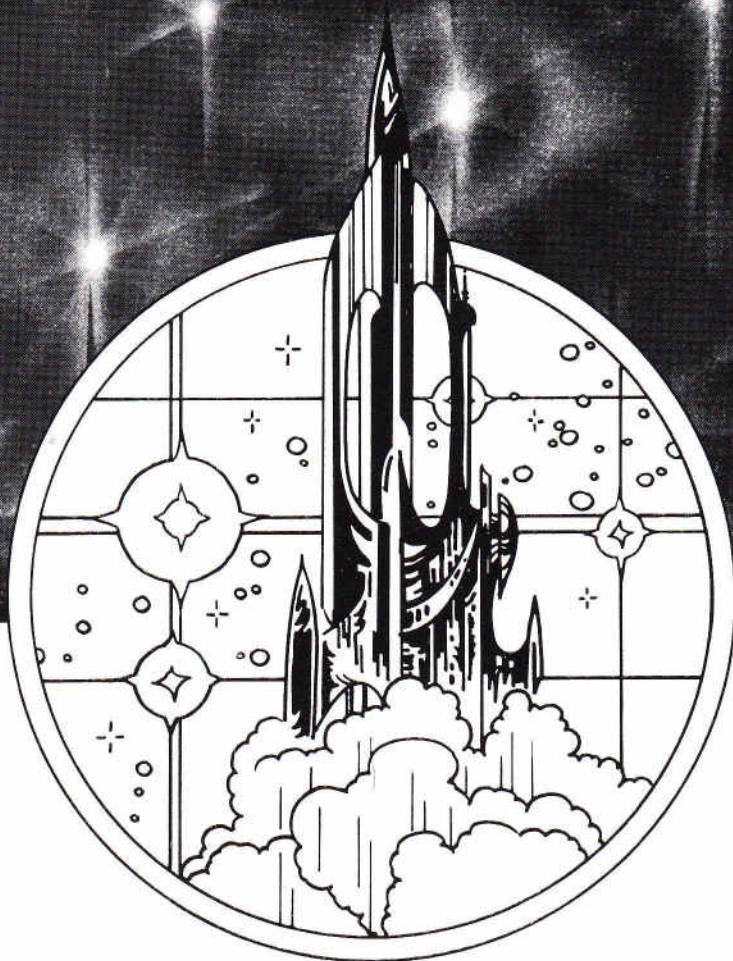
