Despite a lack of chairs there was a good discussion. We were then treated to a showing of the promotional trailer from <u>Star Wars</u> as well as the <u>Star Trek</u> blooper reel. After that, <u>Uncle Rick gave his</u> second trivia quiz, this time on the works of Larry Niven.

There were four contestants, but Fem Fan president Julia Wilhoit was the winner. She received a copy of <u>The Mote in God's</u> <u>Eye</u>, autographed by both Niven and Jerry Pournelle. Tim Bolgeo announced that Uncle Tim will have a trivia contest in January, on the

works of Andre Norton; see him for further details. In the business section, Tim Bolgeo, book procurer, said that Foster's Icerigger has not come in yet. It was decided to take that book off the schedule until it gets in, and to re-schedule it then. The book for November will therefore be this year's Hugo and Nebula award winning novel Gateway, by Frederik Pohl. Mike Rogers will lead the discussion. The Southern Fandom Confederation bulletins were distributed as far as they would go -- more are needed to fill the demand. November's meeting will be Saturday, Nov. 18, in the Lookout Mtn, room of the U.T.C. Student Center, and will start 1/2 hour earlier than usual (at 7 PM instead of 7:30). The entertainment section of the meeting will feature a George Pal science fiction double feature of Destination: Moon and Conquest of Space. To get to U.T.C., take I-124 to the 4th St. exit (last exit before Tennessee River bridge). Go on 4th St. for about 8/10 mile to Mabel St., and turn right on Mabel. Go 2 blocks (bearing right) and turn left onto Vine St. (which is 1-way). Go $2\frac{1}{2}$ blocks. The Student Center is on the left side; look for its sign. 

FANZINES RECEIVED

Cullowhee Comments #4; Richard Llewellyn, Drawer BP, Cullowhee, N.C. 28723. 50¢ or the usual.

The Silver Eel; Robert P. Barger, P.O. Box 8, Evensville, Tn. 37332. \$3.00

We've received two interesting fanzines in the last week or so, by regional fan publishers.

<u>Cullowhee Comments</u> is pubbed irregularly by N.C. fan Richard Llewellyn, who is a librarian at Western Carolina University. It's a good zine, and it's getting better with each issue. The latest one we've received (#4 - Oct. '78) features some interesting pieces -- book and fanzine reviews,

area fans' pros and cons on <u>Battlestar Galactica</u>, a critical look at <u>Omni</u>'s first issue, a lettercol, and some decent fanart. The repro is nice because it's offset at the university print shop. This zine has excellent potential as a regional genzine, if Richard can keep getting good submissions and artwork, and can keep it more than a personalzine.

The Silver Eel is a sensational one-shot for fantasy fans by East Tennessee fan Robert Barger, devoted to Fritz Leiber's Fafhrd and the Grey Mouser fantasy series. It's beautifully done -- offset on expensive paper, with a super cover by Tim Kirk depicting Leiber as Fafhrd and long time fantasy fan Harry Fischer as the Mouser. Inside, there are articles by Karl Edward Wagner and Harry Fischer, plus an interview with Leiber, a Fafhrd/Grey Mouser bibliography, and fine, fine art by Kirk, Jim Pitts, Liz Danforth, Gene Day, John Mayer, Herb Arnold, and Martha Fischer. The layout is well done; it compares favorably with any fanzine I've ever seen. Even at \$3 for this 38 page zine, I'd rate it a best buy.

SF on TV

No, the rock group does NOT travel to the wilds of Africa to meet the legendary masked man himself and fight crime in the jungle. But they do save an amusement park from closing down, rescue a young man from the clutches of a mad genius who "turned" him into an "android", and destroy a few dozen of said mad inventor's robots (not to mention the evil genius himself) in this fantasy adventure.

How do they do all that in two hours? Simple. They have various super powers. Wait a minute... a rock group with super powers? Yup! They sure do. Gene Simmons breathes fire and talks with a voice that echos of rolling thunder (among other things), Ace Frehley does tremendous somersaults and backflips, and can teleport the whole group when necessary, and Peter Criss leaps and throws bolts of energy now and then as well as providing the brains. A rock group with super powers, all because they each have a talisman shaped like the symbols they wear in face make-up. "Everyone has a talisman", they explain. Thank goodness; I thought they were aliens. They claimed it was a fantasy.

It was good kidvid with excellent effects, and not too bad acting. Anthony Zerbe was excellent as the mad inventor, never letting the character get out of hand. Kiss was not as stiff as most rock ((continued on page 5))

TECHNICAL REVIEW

PROGRAM REALISM AND QUALITY OPINION / BATTLESTAR: GALACTICA vs. STAR TREK PART 1: SHIP DESIGN

In the book we were told that there were twelve remaining <u>Battlestar</u> Class battleship-carriers. The thirteenth ship, the <u>Pacifica</u>, the largest of them, had been destroyed during a battle sometime before the peace mission was initiated. With the loss of the <u>Pacifica</u>, the <u>Galactica</u> became the largest remaining battlestar. It is approximately three miles long (15,840 ft.), one and one-half miles in width (7,920 ft.), and one-half mile in overall depth (2,640 ft.). Basically, it is a beautiful design...for an exploration ship rather than as a front line warship. As a warship, it is grossly underprotected and grossly underarmed!

Despite the beautiful design, it is still inefficient in a number of The hull configuration, for example, has far too much madifferent ways. chinery exposed to battle damage on the outside of the ship, thus making the ship far more vulnerable to receiving far more serious internal damage, which is disasterous for a space ship! The basic design, though irregular and inefficient, could be retained almost entirely, and the ship's defensive capability would be increased a hundred times, if the Galactica had a smooth, armored hull, outside the exposed machinery and existing hull with a gap between the two. This is called space armor, and is very effective against <u>direct</u> hits by non-nuclear projectiles. This protection, if carried further, would be even more effective. If the Galactica had four of these bulkheads layered outside the existing hull, the defensive capabilities of the Galactica would be increased four-hundred times over what it had been. This means that if its original defensive factor had been 50 (on an arbitrary scale), with the four new smooth, armored hulls with gaps in-between would raise the defensive factor to 20,000. If the outer hull was then covered with a highly reflective mirrorlike covering, the defensive capabilities would be increased another hundred times, to a new factor of 2,000,000! Even the energy blast from a pulse laser bolt of a Cylon fighter would be reflected anywhere from 75 to 100%, depending on its striking angle. With this type of protection alone, it would require a direct hit by a heavy nuclear charge to destroy a battlestar. Another serious flaw is the lack of defensive energy shielding and short range defensive light energy weaponry. I'll go into that deeper in the next next CHAT.

Despite these design flaws in protection and weaponry, as terrible as they are, the basic design of the <u>Galactica</u>, with its structural strength and tremendous fighter-carrying capabilities, gives it a several-hundred-timesmore efficient design than the starship <u>Enterprise</u>. But as things stand by way of the <u>Galactica</u>'s protection and armament, the <u>Enterprise</u> alone could destroy the entire battlestar fleet!






