### CAROL EMSHWILLER

Carol Emshwiller's writing is brilliant. Rich, funny. Incredibly funny. Wry. Sad. Angry but in a controlled beautiful way (and not always of course).

She began writing in the 1950s, under difficult circumstances: she was married, with small children, and it was the 1950s. Sometimes she would pick up her typewriter and sit with it inside the children's playpen while her children played and raged around her. She sat and wrote, ignoring them as best she could.

In the short story 'Autobiography,' from the collection Joy in Our Cause, she writes, 'Most of my life is spent not writing.' She was in her forties then and her husband Ed was still alive. Most of her life now is spent writing. She has a set of writing rules that she likes to break. The rules are the sorts of thing writing teachers routinely tell their students: begin with a bang, show don't tell, work out your plot ahead of time. Carol prefers to sneak up on you, to figure out the plot as she goes along, and she'll tell and show and tell whenever and however she wants to.

Carol has written stories ranging from straight-up science fiction to experimental pieces. Her novels are just as varied. Carmen Dog in which women turn into dogs and dogs turn into women, is the funniest battle-of-the-sexes novel ever written. Ledoyt and Leaping Man Hill completely transform the western genre. Her most recent novel, The Mount, is another role reversal set in a future in which humans are bred for speed and beauty and ridden by their alien masters. It's a beautiful book, at once a cracking good adventure and a mediation on slavery and power.

Carol lives in New York City in the winters and spends her summers in the California mountains. Her most recent writing is filled with mountains and rattlesnakes. [bio by Justine Larbalestier]

China Miéville (pronounced mee-AY-vill) grew up in London, went to boarding school, worked in Egypt and Zimbabwe for a year, and then earned degrees from Cambridge and the London School of Economics. His first novel, KING RAT (1998), was a dark urban gothic take on "The Pied Piper of Hamlin". It was followed to much acclaim by PERDIDO STREET STATION (2000), set in the imaginary, grotesque world of New Crobuzon; the book won the Arthur C. Clarke Award and the British Fantasy Award. His latest book, The SCAR, set in the same world, will be published in 2002. He currently lives in London. -Locus Magazine
