


Since, in some respects, this is almost a first issue, in that OSF hasn't appeared in about two years, I think a new understanding of my editorial-policy would be lots of help.



Several typical Hollywood scientifictional and fantasy f i l m s are already lined up, as we 1 l as not-too-technical films concerning Rockets, Atomic Power, etc. Although OTHER WORLDS is the only professional magazine which has thus far contributed originals to the affair, either an auction of stf i t e m s, or a few G I A N T door-prizes are expected to consume a small amount of time. Since most fans would rather eat their own chow then attend an expensive banquet, the CON ... will purposely not have one. Naturally, all attendies will have a chance to win free stf books donated to and by the Buffelo Fantasy League.

Also on the fire are several one-act plays, round table discussions, and a few "secret" items which cannot be disclosed as yet.

Legal hours in New York bars (veery important at all conventions) are from 8 A.M. to 3 A.M., and liquor stores are open from 10 to 10. Anyone under 18 is considered a minor, but the Committee is naturally providing entertainment for them and a large expected non-guzzling element; and no-one will be without company in his or her own personal vices ... be they booze or movies.

The hotel which has been picked for the site is the RICHFORD, and it is situated in the heart of downtown Buffalo. Rooms there average about \$2.75 f or a single, and \$4.50 for a double, depending on the sort of accommadations various representatives want.



FLYING DISKS BY JIM SCHREIBER-ETRO CORR

The EXTRA-TERRESTRIAL RESEARCH OR-GANIZATION (ETRO), a group which is at present dedicated to learning the a bsolute truth about the "Flying Dicks," has an excellent motto: RESEARUH - THE ROAD TO TRUTH.

ETRO uses the theory that the disks are, interplanetary in nature, since this seems most likely in light of the investigation the organization has smade thus fare

The group collects all possible data about the disks, and try to draw it in to a pattern by careful objective analysis. Since ETRO is a new organization, and not to o well known, and since very little has been done, their hopes lie in the future.

Elliot Rockmore, publisher of SAUCER REVIE!, a factual summary of disc sightings, suggests a p a t t e r n of flashing lights as a means of contact.

Telepathy is another means. Several members claim to have talent in this direction, and one claims to have already established mentile contact with the disk piolets.

Ray Palmer, editor of OTHER WORLDS, is the newest member of the organization. Then the organization gets enough backing of all kinds, it is going to go A L L out, and try to kick some sense into the public.

Stf seems to be the l i n e of least resistance for ETRO's expansion. One method of expanding in fandom is v i a fanzine; so ETRO is publishing a good one. For non-member, the fanzine: ETRON costs 25¢ per c o p y, and \$1.25 per y e a r. ETRON is a variety zine, published bi-monthly, mimeo with offset cover, and 50 pages long.

Dues in ETRO are 3.00 per year, payable in yearly, quadrimonthly, or monthly amounts. Hembership includes ETRON, and all other reports issued by the organization. ETRO can use every cent it can get since it is much more then a fan club.

The 70 in E T R O are scattered over Canade, England, France, and the United States. Some of the members are located in places where they can hold regular meetings to conduct ETRO business. The others down hat they can where they are and try to locate interested persons in their areas. If ETRO's hypothesis (main) is correct, which it hardly not be, the organizations work is very important.

ITRO members didn't arrive at the interplanetary theory because they read stf, and think it a perfectly lovely idea. Members try, to conduct their work in a scientific manner, and take their work seriously. They scoff at no one until he has proven himself worthy of nothing but a scoff.

The ther or n o t ETRO is successful, the organization's work cannot help but benefit the members in expansion of their knowledge, and braodening of their minds, while not becoming gullible and besides — it can be fun if taken in the right spirit.


