<u>From the editor:</u> This is my response, to set the record straight and it should appear in his upcoming *TZD #40* issue:

...And the answers to your questions are as follows:

The publication, CyberCozen, was created in 1988 by Aharon Sheer as the voice of the Rehovot (a city just south of Tel Aviv) SF club.

The all-encompassing Israeli Society for SF and Fantasy came into being in 1996 and the Rehovot SF club soon dwindled away (some of the members becoming active in the larger group) - but the publication continued to be merrily and mirthfully produced by Aharon. I took over as Assistant Editor in June 2014 when Aharon became ill, and then took over as Editor when he passed away in May 2015.

NASA Finds 7 New Earth-Sized Planets

1) NASA Finds 7 New Earth-Sized Planets

The quest for life outside Planet Earth just got a lot more interesting.



NASA on Wednesday <u>revealed</u> it has discovered a "treasure trove" of Earth-sized planets. Dubbed TRAPPIST-1, the system consists of seven Earth-sized planets orbiting around a single, nearby star. Three of these planets are located in what NASA calls the "habitable zone," meaning the area around the parent star where a rocky planet is most likely to have water.

While NASA has identified Earth-like planets before, this discovery sets a new record for the largest number of habitable-zone planets found around a single star outside our solar system. The space agency said all seven planets in TRAPPIST-1 could have liquid water under the right atmospheric conditions, but the three in the habitable zone are most promising.


Hear ye, Hear ye — Read all about it! (From SPACEIL – Israel's space exploration society):





<u>Short review of the new DC TV series from our friends at MonSFFA – Montreal Science Fiction and Fantasy Association, Feb 2017 Impulse bulletin:</u>

Powerless Brings Humour to DC's On-Screen Universe

The newest superhero television series doesn't focus on superheroes at all! A light sitcom, NBC's Powerless brings much needed humour to DC's on-screen universe. The show stars Vanessa Hudgens (Sucker Punch) and Alan Tudyk (Firefly, Rogue One: A Star Wars Story). Hudgens is Emily Locke, who is thrilled to have been hired as the new R&D director at the Wayne Enterprises subsidiary Wayne Security, a company that makes products for average folk, providing them a measure of safety in a world in which superheroes and supervillains regularly clash in and around Charm City. Tudyk plays Bruce Wayne's wastrel of a cousin, Van, who heads Wayne Security.

The residents of Charm City must constantly deal with the fallout of superheroes battling supervillains: smashed buildings, wrecked transit systems and the like, and have become weary of it all, even resentful that yet another superhero incident on the way to work is going to cause them to be late for a meeting or some such inconvenience. Emily has yet to grow so jaded and remains star struck when encountering superheroes.

When Bruce Wayne decides to shut down Wayne Security because it isn't turning out any worthwhile products, Van makes no effort to save the company, seeing an opportunity to move back to Gotham City and climb the corporate ladder. Emily, on the other hand, motivates her motley crew of R&D personnel into developing a highly effective wrist-worn supervillain detector, impressing Bruce Wayne, who decides to keep Wayne Security operational.

Gently poking fun at the absurdity of the comic book superhero trope, the humour is quiet, unforced, and delightfully silly. The premise is the winner, here, something of a cross between the Steve Carell sitcom The Office and the 1994 comic book miniseries Marvels. The show also offers comic book fans obscure DC references and inside nods, like having Adam West provide an introductory voice-over in the pilot.

If the series remains true to itself, and its talented cast are permitted to develop their quirky characters, Powerless has a lot of potential.

Some tidbits from IMPULSE:

- ▶ Born just down the road in Trois-Rivières, Canadian director Denis Villeneuve is fast becoming a star Genre filmmaker. His acclaimed 2016 SF film *Arrival* is up for eight Oscars, including Best Director and Best Picture. He is currently finishing work on *Blade Runner 2049*, scheduled for an October 6 release this year, and will follow up with a reboot of *Dune*!
- ▶ *Battlestar Galactica's* original Captain Apollo, Richard Hatch, has died. He was 71. The actor passed away on February 7 after a lengthy illness.
- ▶ Peter Capaldi is leaving *Doctor Who* later this year! The Scottish actor who has interpreted the Doctor's 12th incarnation since 2013 recently announced that the modern series' tenth season will be his last. Also departing the series at the conclusion of season ten is showrunner Stephen Moffat.

UPDATES on AI and ROBOTS – and various random thoughts

As we all know, there is a lot of investment going on in the field of Al and robotics.

For simple robotics, technical issues of performance, balance, mobility are advancing quite favorably as can be seen (for better or for worse) in the article, with accompanying video clip about "Handle" here: http://www.pcmag.com/commentary/351505/boston-dynamics-robot-is-a-nightmare-of-a-different-kind

Although some of the more practical concerns deal with how they will affect the labor force, the short and long-time impact on our daily lives and social interaction should also be considered (for example, touched on in the "Humans" BBC TV series I very briefly covered in the December 2015 CyberCozen issue – Maybe it's time for a fuller review, including the new season...).

Let's say, for example you have a robot housekeeper/butler/maid at your house. Will your guests be comfortable with that hanging/moving around? It will take society some getting used to. On the other hand, lots of people are uncomfortable when visiting a person with a dog: barking loud and scary – or even super-friendly (jumping all over you and licking you all over – including exploring your various bodily parts).

Usually, a host will take the dog outside or tie it up, or move it into a different room. A robotic housekeeper/butler/maid on the other hand, is expected to always – or at certain moments – be hanging around: serving, clearing the table, cleaning spilled wine, etc... It will take a while for society to adjust, just at that level, let alone shifts in work force and ethics, and workspace culture...

AND, ... Talking about the work force: 5 Jobs Robots Will Take First

Here's an interesting speculation on LinkedIn, by Shelly Palmer:

Oxford University researchers have estimated that 47 percent of U.S. jobs could be automated within the next two decades. But which white-collar jobs will robots take first?

He lists the following:

- 1 Middle Management
- 2 Commodity Salespeople (Ad Sales, Supplies, etc.)
- 3 Report Writers, Journalists, Authors & Announcers
- 4 Accountants & Bookkeepers
- 5 Doctors

I don't agree with #3 and 5, but 1, 2, and 4 look about right...

Superbugs in Space



The Falcon 9 rocket was launched last week, propelling the **Dragon** capsule on its way to the **International Space Station (ISS).** Apart from the supplies for the space station, it was carrying a diverse scientific payload: a device to **track lightning**; a **prototype navigation system** for spacecraft; interesting experiments by **high schoolers**, aimed to test the effect of microgravity on a variety of materials, cells, and organisms. However, the one payload item that caught my eye was **MRSA**, short for **methicillin-resistant** *Staphylococcus aureus*... a deadly, antibiotics-resistant **bacterium**, commonly known as a "**superbug**" that can potentially **wipe out humanity**.

This superbug is actually really scary. The phenomenon of resistance to antibiotics has spread so much, that close to **100,000 Americans** are infected every year, and if nothing is done to stop these fellas, the resistant germs might kill **hundreds of millions** globally in the coming years. So, the race is on to find a **cure** – in reality, fighting superbugs requires the discovery of **multiple cures**, one for each new permutation that the bacteria undergoes. This means chasing our tails continuously: a new antibiotic is found and works for a while, the bug becomes resistant, and we need to start the quest all over again.

This cycle obviously needs to be broken somehow, and that's were **Space** comes in. We've known for quite some time, that living in Space has **strange effects on organisms**, most of them harmful (in

humans a prolonged stay in microgravity can cause **eye problems, headaches**, and **neurodegeneration**, to name a few examples).

In microorganisms, however, Space affects something else: it significantly **accelerates the mutation rate** of their genomes. In theory, this can provide us a glimpse of things to come, and with it, a chance to prepare ahead for the bug's next tricks, and possibly make the **right drug just when it's needed**.

There's another cool thing about this whole business: the fast-tracked mutations accumulated at the ISS will be evaluated using **Gene-RADAR**, a novel mobile scanner that detects gene mutations in real-time (sounds SciFi, huh? This gizmo actually competed in the **X Prize**, a competition for building a **real**, **working tricorder!**).

So, although blasting a superbug into space may sound like the beginning of a cliché space horror opera (e.g. **reverse ANDROMEDA STRAIN***), this may just as well turn out to be a good thing for humanity...
