For those in the know, it's not really a 'Jewish thing' to celebrate the non-Jewish New Year (it's OK, however – and even recommended – to wish people "Happy New Year", "Merry Christmas", etc. because it's THEIR celebratory festival). "Yidishe Faktazyes" is a collection of 11 magical stories in the borderlands between fantasy and reality.


Written by Velvl Chernin, one of the very best contemporary Yiddish writers, and elegantly illustrated by Roza Strokova.

The Sea of Salt – by Elana Gomel

Elana Gomel's very interesting 16-page story is the first in the anthology. It takes place in Israel, at the Dead Sea, where a portal opens to another place and time. Here, a cruel German scientist has been continuing his Nazi experiments on Jews (and possibly others) – creating morbid mindless monsters.

One of the interesting points in this story is the remorse and wanting to 'set things right' of that Nazi's granddaughter who comes to Israel and seeks the portal so she can go kill her murderous grandfather (the mad Nazi scientist).

Although this review is quite short (I didn't want to give too much away) it's really a well-written horror-SF story that is worth reading.



Making History - by Stephen Fry

Originally published in 1996 in the UK, I read the 2004 (574 page) copy, republished by Arrow books

Thursday, the 27th of January has been proclaimed by the UN as the International Day of Commemoration in memory of the victims of the Holocaust, and since this is January, I thought that now would be a good time to review this book that I read a few months ago and didn't get a chance to write up. (In addition, the "More Zion's Fiction" short story above, is also appropriate to the 'occasion').

"Making History" is a very interesting take on the 'kill baby Hitler' concept, with several interesting twists, and – of course – consequences: as we all SHOULD know, interfering with the threads of time has its consequences ... or, think of the adage: you play with fire, you are likely to get burnt...

Since the main protagonist (and we're assuming Stephen Fry, the author) is not into killing innocent babies, he figures out a more 'moral' solution to the dilemma: Make sure that Hitler is never born! With the help of a scientist, our story's hero manages to send back a pill into the drinking water of Hitler's father, making him impotent, so little Hitler is never born. Unfortunately, 'our' Hitler was never alone, and the person who would eventually replace him as leader of the Nazi party in that parallel history – was infinitely worse...

When I first picked up the book, I had no idea that it dealt with WWII and the Holocaust. I saw 'History' in the title, and that's what initially attracted me. Then, the back cover: "... Leo Zuckerman is an ageing physicist obsessed with the darkest period in human history, utterly driven by his fanatical hatred of one man." This scientist – who survived the war – however, was a Nazi scientist! He wants to atone for the evil he was a part of... Interestingly enough, Fry is not the first to use that concept of taking a Nazi, making him out to be a 'Jew', and turning him into a 'hero'.

Zukerman never said that he was a Jew (though in some books, the ex-Nazi kills people to hide his past, then assumes the role of a Jew – even as a 'Nazi hunter', like in the recent TV series "*Hunters*" starring Al Pacino. Another case, is a book I read many years ago of an SS officer who becomes an Israeli war hero, using his military skills to help during the 1948 War of Independence and eventually taking up a high-ranking role in the fledgling Jewish state). I recently picked up another book: "*The Storyteller*" by Jodi Picoult. I liked the title, though never read any of Picoult's other books. The back cover also 'misleads' and talks about Josef Weber who has a "...long-buried and shameful secret..." – again, the back cover doesn't mention WWII or the Holocaust. Weber was in Auschwitz – and again, not a Jew. He was an officer there ...

Another reason I picked up Fry's book was that the back cover's various quotes from the critics included: "A sci-fi comedy...". There are various comic moments in the book – and it is very well written, keeping you wanting to continue reading – but I wouldn't call it a 'comedy'. I do, however, recommend the book.

"Star Trek" episodes, which introduces the crew to a cute, furry, rapidly reproducing alien life form.

"A lot of Jewish tradition — a lot of Jewish wisdom — is part of 'Star Trek,' and 'Star Trek' drew on a lot of things that were in the Old Testament and the Talmud," Gerrold said in an interview. "Anyone who is very literate in Jewish tradition is going to recognize a lot of wisdom that 'Star Trek' encompassed.""
