

Here's our "good luck" ish, DNQ 13 — we hope, since some of the previous ones have been anything but. We've made a number of New Year's resolutions — for example, we will now be citing the sources of news items we use here, with the premise that if people do not wish their names to be appended to a particular item, we would be better off not printing it. Those who tell us news at conventions will be asked if the item can be included, and whether their name can be attached to it. Those writing us letters should note anything that should not be passed on, and be aware that anything not so indicated may well be mentioned along with their names. This, we hope, will avoid many of the gaffes that have plagued us so far. Also, we'll be putting our names at the ends of all bits one or the other of us writes, and we request that people with complaints please write to the author of the offending piece, and not to whoever's name happens to be on the return address for that issue.

There are some other changes. There's a new feature this time, "...Sgt. Pepper Taught the Band to Play", a news column with a difference — all quotes or abstracts from newszines of fandom's remote past. The last original episode of "2020" appears this time, which ends this feature unless Taral is pressured to draw more. You have a chance to save it — send encouragement (in the form of crisp bills) to Taral by the beginning of February so he has time to draw a new one for DNQ 14. We'd like to ask our loccers and correspondents to send a carbon copy or photocopy with their letters if at all possible

Subs are 3/\$1 U.S. (or 3/\$1.20 Canadian), overseas copies and special long issues going surface mail. Other ways to collect DNO is you are not a completist include trades of twiltone at the official rate of 8 issues per ream (2 reams of a colour preferred); contributing art, news, letters, and columns we use; arranged all-for-all trades with a few newszines, one-for-one trades for most zines (2 issues if each of us gets your zine); old fanzines for our growing collections; valuable commodities; wishes-come-true; or even 35¢ for single issues. No back issues currently available. TYPO appears in DNO from time to time as a letter supplement, free of charge. Flyers are accepted for \$10 (if we print), and \$7 (if you print your own). We retain the right to refuse advertising for any reason.

PCLICY...We do not attempt to give comprehensive coverage of fandom so much as hope to add another dimension to the services provided by other newszines. The exotic or outre or mythic properly belong in our pages, though we will never hesitate to stoop to vulgar scooping of more secular news if the opportunity presents itself. To be perfectly honesa, we aim to please ourselves, and in so doing bring pleasure to other fans and friends who are our readers. If our editorial aim seems a trifle erratic, the purpose is the same. If we raise anticipation rather than dissatisfaction, we must be doing something right...



so that we can both have a copy — a logical extension of our earlier request for copies of trade zines for both of us, which get you two issues of DNQ.

Bad news and good news...Canadian post orifice rates go up soon to 17¢ per ounce first class from the present 14¢. However, we are working on a second class bulk permit, which will give us a two oz. maximum per copy weight limit, and not just allow us to hold the line on sub rates but actually to decrease them, back to our original four for a buck. Once the permit goes through, we will adjust everyone's sub card to give everyone the extra issues they'll be entitled to for the remainder of subs paid for at the old three for a dollar rate. Until then, though, the old rate still applies -- we still pay three times as much in postage as all supplies and other incidentals combined.

Our correspondents, fannish friends, and dedicated supporters can expect an issue of TYPO, our informal letterzine, with the next DNQ. It should be noted that TYPO, like many of our flyers, is a "free gift" available on our whim, and is not counted as part of a subscription.





INDEX EXPURGATORIUS 17 - TARAL

Not all that long ago Linda Bushyager started a newszine called KARASS. Not all that long ago at all... Just about 4 years, going on five. I personally find that hard to believe. Linda didn't publish the first KARASS until I'd been in fandom for three years, and it seemed like a recent event in my memory. Yet, there they are, the 38 of them. 38 issues of a monthly newszine don't appear overnight. A rough mathematical calculation tells us that at least 3 years and two months must have elapsed since KARASS I arrived with an 8¢ stamp pasted on its back. And the Prodigal Son itself, 10

pages printed neatly on green twiltone, corner stapled, and adorned by lettering guide, announces its birth as January 1974. Four years, nine months. After the 38th, no more.

Around the 35th issue, when Linda was making noises that she was going to fold, fandom panicked, wondering who was going to provide KARASS's essential services, and with what. The rumour that Mike Glyer was thinking of a replacement was kept confidential under a few hundred hats soon after.

There was also some noise, made largely where it wouldn't be heard, in Toronto. Nothing came of it then. But shortly later the stored energy came forth in 3 issues of TWEEK, after which the batteries of Mssrs. P. Hayden, G. Farber, A-L Logan, and S. McEvoy were discharged.

Phil Paine discharged his energy in a three issue run of DOWN WITH! of which only the first was really his doing, and the other two largely Victoria's.

My capaciter was still full; I hadn't discharged at all yet. And Victoria, stimulated by her stab at co-editing DOWN WITH! hadn't finished with the idea of a newszine either. With the two of us together we almost had a working proposition, but to be on the safe side we tried to rope in a third conspirator stateside. That didn't turn out to be practical, so Victoria and I plunged into work on the first DNQ ourselves. Meanwhile...

Meanwhile, from rags to riches. From fandom worrying whether there would be any replacement for KARASS at all, we now have 5 or 6 generally available newszines, some of which, just for the fun of it, I thought I'd review, and get in a little gratuitous recent fan history on the side. You see I've been successful. But if I seem biased, it's because you don't agree with me.

RALLY! - Don Markstein, 8208 E. Vista Dr., Scottsdale AZ 85253. 25¢/ish or 4/\$1, "in arithmetic progression limited only by the folly of the subscriber". The Southern Fried Newszine has kicked around for years, but it remained for Don, when he took over editorship, to make it known outside of Southern fandom. Don's stock in trade is exaggerrated humour and sarcasm. Like TWEEK, it is sometimes a little tricky to distinguish between the

"colour" and the facts. (Resulting in Ellison throwing a tantrum when Don got a little too_"colourful" in describing some of Ellison's sensitive activities.) RALLY! seems to average about 6 pages, with short news items predominating. Don admits that "frequency" is a bit of a misnomer to describe how often it came out, but he plans to be more reliable in future, he says. Generally, RALLY! has foregone the extravagance of a cover (only number 39 has a cover of the 10 revived issues), but there are spot illos inside. Reproduction has been unspeakable, but is improving in recent issues. RALLY! needs improvement before I'd give it unreserved endorsement. It needs more of Don's attention, maybe a little less "colour" (or at least more care with the crayons), and something meatier than short news items every issue. A columnist or two would be beneficial.

CHECKPOINT - Peter Roberts, 38 Oakland Dr., Dawlish, Devon, U.K. Subs are 4/\$1. Checkpoint dates from April 1971, and has changed little over the years. The logo is normally the only artwork in an issue, and the average length has rarely varied from 6 pages. Its raison d'etre is brief news, delivered with some degree of regularity. Generally found in the pages of the typical CHECKPOINT are reports of TAFF drives, Worldcon bids, NOVA results, obituaries, CoAs, zines arrived, and other basic information. If I were to describe CHECKPOINT in one word. I would choose "workhorse". It isn't particularly entertaining to read, but it's informative. Fortunately, this workhorse newszine has one strong virtue that makes it nearly indespensable. No other newszine has its finger on the pulse of British fandom the way CHECKPOINT does, and for obvious reasons. We other newszine editors get our basic British news primarily from Peter Roberts... Being in Britain gives him a terrific advantage over us!

FILE 770 - Mike Glyer, 14974 Osceola St., Sylmar, CA 91342. 4/\$2.00, single issues $50\phi(?)$. Hexaweekly. I needn't go deeply into the virtues of F770. There is, of course, Mike's indefatiguable wit. There is also Victoria's "In Contention", a regular column. And there is a self-indulgent fanzine reviewer. It is one, two, many pages long (another old Toronto in-joke), in bright colours not perma-

nently harmful to the eye. There are superb illos from Stu Shiffman, Jeanne Gomoll, "T.Quirk", David Vereschagin, Alexis Gilliland, and so on. It has a truly wretched title, true, but fandom isn't in a position to complain after SFINCTOR. To be serious for a moment, FILE 770 could stand tighter editing. Mike's editorials rambled a bit too loosely in the past, and were likely to occur in disconnected segments throughout the zine instead of in one place, where they belong. News and other items could be made tighter too, (but please, Mike, don't prune my reviews).

ATARANTES - Cliff Biggers, 1029 Franklin Rd., #3, Marietta GA 30067. Subs are 12/\$3.50 but copies are available for contribs of news or membership in ASFiC. Nominally a club newszine, ATARANTES is available to non-club members as well, and Cliff seems to be trying to build up a subscription list, so I perceive it as falling within the scope of these reviews. The couple of issues I have seen were short, only a few pages, and poorly organized. News was clumped together under topics like "Pro news" or "Random Fan Notes" and individual items were hard to find again. The news is, however, generally up-to-date and comprehensive. There is a mixed bag of other material in ATA-RANTES. For instance, in issue 15 there was a report of Iggy (that I disagreed with In almost every particular) and some short letters. The previous issue ran a few recommendations for other newszines. There is, as befits a publication doubling as a clubzine, a smattering of club business such as meeting dates and minutes, but these will be of no interest to you or me or any other non club member. My feeling is that ATARANTES is adequately designed to function as a monthly clubzine, but can't compete on this basis with the other presently existing newszines. It would have to play the game on their terms by jettisoning the club material, and gearing up with regular faanish columns, or somesuch. I don't think this is Cliff's aim, though, so I think Glyer's hegemony in the field is safe from ATARANTES at least...

FANZINE DIRECTORY 2 - Allan Beatty, PO Box 1040, Ames, IA 50010. Price is \$1 U.S., \$1.15 Canadian, or 60p. Double price for overseas airmail. Also available for trade. This is not a newszine to be sure,

but it's not exactly a genzine either. On the basis of it providing information I've decided to treat it as a newszine for the purposes of review. THE FANZINE DIRECTORY is basically a good idea, but I'm doubtful about how well the job has been done. Physically it is find. The offset reduction is clean and legible, although the placement of necessary explanations is unnecessarily scattered throughout the zine. However, I caught Victoria's FAN-THOLOGY 76 half credited to me, and my involvement in that project was totally as a paid employee. Without any way of checking, I can only guess how accurately the rest of the 1000 some odd zines were listed. The sheer number of zines. over a thousand, explains a lot of Allan's difficulties. Who gets 1000 zines a year? I doubt anybody does. Much or most of Allan's entries must be hearsay. This suggests the obvious solution. The information at Allan's disposal must be supplemented by information from those with the easiest access to it -- faneditors. Mail a postcard to Allan at the end of the year with a list of what you've published in the past 12 months. I, for one, propose to do just that.

HOW VEGETARIANISM THREATENS TO DESTROY FANDOM - TARAL

Everybody knows a famous fan who is a vegetarian. There is, locally, Barry Kent MacKay, the fanartist so prolific as to threaten to be a modern day Rotsler. And everybody knows Peter Roberts. There are others... They will destroy fandom as we know it too.

Think for a moment about your favourite fannish activity. Some number of you out there will pipe up with "drinking", but you know this form of fanac is really confined to a smaller body of fans than this vocal and well lubricated minority would have us think. Argue about the exact percentage if you will -- 10, 30, 50, 80%, it doesn't matter. We all eat, and so the drinkers are outnumbered, even in British fandom. We all eat, and if we stop a moment and think about it, we'd find we spend quite a large chunk of our time at cons, parties, club meetings, and dinners (naturally) eating while we talk fan stuff. Before we go any further the reason for this behaviour among fans ought to be explained. It is no coincidence that fans eat so often in conjunction with talking. Talking takes energy, a scientifically measurable verity. A fan talking non-stop without nourishment cannot maintain his pace more than, oh, say six or seven hours. With proper regulation of energy outflow and fuel intake, however, the same laconic fan can talk uninterrupted for as many as three continuous days -- for all practical purposes indefinitely -- and is limited only by the need to sleep. Perhaps it is one of the mysteries of nature that the movement of the jaws for articulation allows the simultaneous mastication of food, with almost unmatched economy of effort. The sense of wonder inspired by this engineering efficiency is overpowering.

Vegetarianism doesn't threaten eating per se, though. The nature of the threat is more subtle, even insidious.

Examine the foodstuff you are undoubtedly consuming at this moment. Consider the favourite restaurants of your local fandom or fan group. Here are examples that are well known to everybody of what different fandoms satisfy their hungers with. New York, especially the Fanoclasts, are known for their addiction to ice cream. Suggest to one that you want a solid meal, and be prepared to eat at Jahn's, the famous ice cream parlour. Toronto fans are known for unswerving loyalty to the pizza, and only one dares abstain due to her unfortunate allergy to the prime ingredient, cheese. In the southwest, the parallel substance is the burrito. Actually, any Mexican food whatsoever, and craving for combustible consumables has spread with the growth of the Taco Bell fast-food empire. Chinese cuisine is universally popular, and one Worldcon institution, the Great Wall of China, is built around it. Japanese cuisine too, has a following. Another fannish institution dependent on dining is obviously the traditional Banquet, and its doppelganger, the Ranquet held simultaneously at any nearby McDonald's. Need I mention the historic fan club, Elves, Gnomes and Little Men's Science Fiction, Chowder and Marching Society of the late 40's and early 50's?

By now it must be obvious to even the readers of DNQ how vegetarianism threatens us. By striking at the very roots of fannish activity. By spreading a way of life inimical to the wellsprings of fandom. The one common denominator of all fannish diets is meat! (Even ice cream has animal fats, milk, as an ingredient, and cannot be consumed by a strict no-nonsense vegetarian.)

Obviously, deprived of our energy source, fans will suffer exhaustion after unreasonably short bouts of talking, and the conversation will become a lost fan art, like

hand-stencilled art and hectography. There seems nothing to be done about it. Morally, vegetarianism is unarguable, and we fans are slans, or we are supposed to be at any rate. In time our moral evolution and skyrocketing inflation will force vegetarianism on all, even the most atavistic, of us. Fandom as it exists in the late seventies will cease to exist by 1985 I predict. Textured Vegetable Proteins and soy substitutes may prolong the meat era a few years longer, but the outcome is inevitably vegetably.

Then vegetarianism will unleash upon us such a dreadful flood of crudzines as has never been suffered before...
