DUFF Newsletter

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The big news is that Marty and Robbie Cantor are our new DUFF winners, and as such will be attending the World Science Fiction Convention in Melbourne, Australia, in August 1985. With the help of Gary Farber and the moral support of Suzle, Jack Herman and I counted ballots in a process spanning two continents, three phone calls, and several hours. I'm supplying a vote breakdown below; note that I've distinguished between North American and Australian on the first distribution only.

In the preferential system we use, the winner must have a clear majority, in this case 97 votes. So we have to start distributing votes from the lowest ranked nominees, assigning their votes to the next preference of each voter. We had four ballots with only "no preference" marked; these were not included in our total. I also got one ballot with no donation, and eight ballots appeared after the deadline. In the following, the write-ins have been distributed first, then the hold overs, brown, and Stopa.

I'll run a financial report on the next page. let me make a few notes here: this report does not include such expenditures as the cost of this newsletter, shipping costs as DUFF relocates to the sunny LA basin, or phone calls to Asutralia; nor does it include income from fanzine sales and auctions at the upcoming Norwescon. So what the Cantors get will not be the exact amount I show as the current fund. This also does not include the fund in Australia, which has about \$1350. (The fund in each country handles the overseas flight of the winners it sends, and the travel expenses locally of the winners it recieves.) You might find interesting these statistics, based on all votes I received except the Ozannes': Western district: 66 votes, \$235 total donation, \$3.57 average; Midwest: 53 votes, \$166 total, \$3.13 average; 44 votes, \$147 total, \$3.34 average. This includes

even the late votes, in hopes that I would be more statistically meaningful. (Note to Dick and Leah: that breakdown is slightly different than the one I read to you, because I got more late votes.)
