Ah, the chil of the night, what music they make! Members fled inside to escape the Ed, Mike Stern and David Lathram's ghastly kazoo trio, instruments furnished by the Maestro Tepper for Loscon Chairman political machine.

To start the meeting President Tepper asked, "Are you ready, Gridley?" The reaction ranged from a simple, "No!" to a brash, "I was born ready!" As Matthew rapped the gavel, the Not Ready for LASFS Player, Rob Cole, said "I move not to

Patron Saint: Eyeing the crowd here to vote on Loscon, Matthew ironically noted that everyone was here except the Patron Saint, Stan Burns. He led three in absentia cheers for St. Staniel, plus a wishful tag "...and a broken Nikon."

Auction: There was one. Be funnier next time.

More Timebound Stuff: Matthew had a printout of the Hugo nominees. He noted two nominations of interest, at least to Glyer. He read several other categories, including Best Dramatic Presentation which was startlingly devoid of Babylon 5 episodes.

Brett Achom passed along a story about a street robber who gave back busfare for his victims to get home.

Tadao Tomomatsu had worked on the Lethal Weapon 4 shooting at the Bradbury Building. He demonstrated his trick foot, rotating it 180 degrees to the stupefied amazement of stars Mel Gibson, Danny Glover, Joe Pesci and Chris Rock. Tadao didn't make it into the movie, but he is making it into the behind-the-scenes documentary for freaking out the four stars.

To end the meeting, members approved a motion to animate. Fred Patten's last words were, "This one is dubbed!"


