In a Special Order of Business, I. Shaun Lyon passed out 3"x5" cards on which people were asked to write memories of past Loscons. Charles Lee Jackson, II apostrophized, "I liked the Loscon with the bouncing potatoes." A brief auction included an unspent bullet, which Ed declared to be "officially blank." Patron Saint Randy Greiner was remembered with three cheers "and a wailet an inch thick." Future programs were to include showings of "Holiday Inn" and the rescheduled Salute to Robert McKimson.

Old Business: Yup, we had some. The Digby-Jackson-Tepper Amendments came up for debate and two of the necessary three votes. The full text of the motion follows:

In order to reorganize the election of Directors of the Los Angeles Science Pantasy Society, Incorporated, the undersigned make the following motions for changes in....

FIRST, the By-laws of the Society, as of 20 January 1991:

Re-write Article III (Directors), Section 2: ELECTION AND TERMS OF OFFICE, in the following manner:

"Directors shall be elected annually, at the regular Society meeting on the first Thursday in December." shall be replaced with the sentence "Directors shall be elected annually, at the last Regular Society meeting before Thanksgiving."

The remainder of III.2 shall remain unchanged. SECOND, the Standing Rules of the Society, as of 20 January 1991:

Re-write Rule 25, Section A from the text in the Standing Rules to the following:

"Nominations for Directors of the Society shall be held on the last Regular meeting of the Society previous to the meeting during which the Election of Directors takes place. Nominations shall be closed at the conclusion of that nominating session and shall not be re-opened prior to the Election."

Section B.1 remains unchanged.

Section B.2 is re-stricted as follows: "Nominees, in person or through intermediacies, shall be required to explain their qualifications and intentions for the fulfillment of the office of Director."

Section 8.3 remains unchanged.

Respectfully submitted, [lots of signatures]. As previously stated, these were in fact two separate amendments: the By-Lawe amendment would require passage by a 2/3 margin, while the Standing Rules amendment would require passage by a simple majority at two consecutive meetings of the Society. The membership having already been properly notified of the votes by a combination of De Profundis and frequent reminders from Ssg Green, the matter was brought up for discussion.

He also had word of a "Lenny Bruce Birthday Party" at the Golden Apple on Melrose, with guests including Reed Waller and Kate Worley of "Omaha the Cat Dancer" fame, along with various other porn and counterculture stars. "What," exclaimed Glyer, "no Ted Danson?" Lynn Maners wasn't here, but you know what he would have said if he had been. Seg Green remarked, "In the event of a riot after the Reginald Denny beating trial, forget it, because we'll be burning down the neighborhood." The Emperor Jackson reminded us of the FWEMS this weekend, the films being on the theme of "around the world."

Reviews: Jerry Fournelle just couldn't wait to give a review that sounded curiously like a Putridity Report: Not only do they shoot

MINUTES: Glyer delivered the July minutes, and corrected them to show that Gary Louie had missed that meeting on convention business. Tepper gave Glyer the minutes of the August meeting to read, then withstood such corrections as Deckert's note [that] he had spent the last four weeks, not weekends in fabulous St. Louis. Jumper by Steven Gould Tor Books 344pgs. \$21.95 ISBN 0-312-85272-X

Davy Rice, a young, not-quite-18-year-old, kid, literally jumps into the adventure of his --or anyone else's - lifetime. Written in first person (a notoriously difficult task to do well), this could almost be a Heinlein juvenile, were it not for the flawed nature of its protagonist. But make no mistake, Gould's tale is for adults. Davy is an abused kid who escapes the horror of his existence by fleeing in a most remarkable way: through teleportation. Able to remove himself from any uncomfortable situation in the blink of an eye, Davy must learn to navigate the real world and at the same time discover how to cope with his feelings of abandonment and abuse. Soon, he has explored his remarkable abilities and is ready to take his revenge on those who have hurt him. Political correctness be damned; you'll be delighted at what Davy does to the various bad guys.

Other reviewers have called Jumper "fast-paced" and "a smashing adventure story; it is that and more. The writing is smooth and reasonable, the characters intriguing and far from perfect. Recommended as a way to rekindle those feelings you had when you first read Heinlein.

A Million Open Doors by John Barnes Tor Books 315 pgs, \$19.95 ISBN 0-312-85210-X

Despite 5 backcover blurbs comparing John Barnes to Robert Heinlein, to paraphrase last year's vice presidential debate, "I knew Bob Heinlein, and you're no Bob Heinlein". That is not to say that this is a bad book; rather that a comparison to Heinlein is probably an unfortunate one. A far better comparison is to Ursula K. LeGuin and especially to The Dispossessed, with which this book has many parallels.

Giraut, a young man of a culture clearly based upon almost medievally romantic ideas in which young men pine for their entendadoras, is betrayed by his romantic love object and, in reaction, flees the planet by joining an expedition to the culture of Caledony. Caledonian culture, very much the opposite of Girault's Nou Occitan, is governed by a sect of Rational Christianity, whose rationality is daily determined by powerful artificial intelligences. Their capital, Utilitopia, is governed by almost Spockian logic, in which every activity must be rational or it is proscribed. The invention of the springer, a long range matter transmitter, threatens to expose both of these heretofore isolated societies to change, and Girault finds himself the catalyst of that change, first inspiring revolution in Utilitopia and then in his own society.

At first glance, this novel reads as if it were a fantasy with an emphasis on sword play, troubadorism and exaggerated sense of amour propre and a language based, I think, upon the medieval French langue d'Oc. It is only after a few chapters that it emerges as a science fiction novel, contrasting two types of societies and the individuals who inhabit them. Although I think that it draws too much from The Dispossessed, it does offer some interesting ideas, one of which is Culture Variant History. Groups can petition to be allowed to form colonies based on their own socio/economic/political ideas, Cultural Variant History allows them to create a history justifying their society which does not square with actual history as recorded. Our hero, for example, is surprised at one point to learn that Adam Smith wasn't burned at the stake in Threadneedle Street and that Rimbaud wasn't King of France! A very interesting idea which could have been further explored.

In my opinion, an uneven but interesting novel. Recomended.

Peach Slices by Donna Barr AEON/MU Press 5014-D Roosevelt Way NE Seattle, WA 98105 100 pgs, \$9.95 + .75 s&h no ISBN

One of the real strengths of the comic book format lies in its visualization of alternate histories and personalities. In recent years we've seen the outstanding Expiain

Confederacy series, which postulated and illustrated for us a modern world in whose history the South had won the Civil War. The long running Desert Peach series by Donna Barr leaves history as it is, but introduces a fictional character, Erwin Rommel's gay brother, Col. Pfirsch Rommel, into our story.

This collection, entitled Peach Siless, is a compilation of a number of sketches, short stories and various designs from the Peach's universe. Some, though not all, of the strips have seen publication in other venues.

Although two of the situations depicted in this collection are explicitly sexual and, as such, more suitable for adults, this is not a "gay" comic; rather it's a historical fiction comic, set in North Africa during WWII, (as well as one story set in immediate post-war Occupied Germany) whose eponymous protagonist happens to be gay. Nor is it a pro-Nazi comic; Col. Rommel despises the Nazi party and what it has done to his country; rather, his concern is for the safety of his men in the performance of their military duties. His unit, by the way, is one of the most eclectic in military history, containing soldiers from aimos every German military formation and even paroled American POWs.

Barr's obvious familiarity with military history and with the German language shows to good effect in this selection of material; reading any issue of The Desert Peach is likely to start bringing back snatches of your high school German!

In summation then: Peach Silces is a good introduction to Barr's Desert Peach universe (including her "furry" and centaur work, which I personally find less appealing).

Highly recomended for more sophisticated and mature readers.

A Deeper Sea

by Alexander Jablokov AvoNova Books, 1993 360 pages, \$4.99 ISBN 0-380-71709-3

Religious themes have a surprisingly long history within the science fiction and fantasy genre. One need only mention the works of C.S. Lewis or Blish's A Case of Conscience to appreciate part of the range of subjects upon which authors have written. Part of this body of works includes what I call the transformational and transcendental motif, exemplified by Dane or 2001: A Space Oddysey wherein God or his/her prophet is immanent. This book fits firmly into that tradition.

Ilya Stasov is a Russian colonel in 2015 engaged in military dolphin research. He hypothesizes that old myths are true and that, at one point in time, dolphins could talk to men. His research concludes that the end of this period coincides with the explosion of Santorini and the end of the Cretan Thallasocracy and its replacement by Myceneans. Acting on this, he recreates the sonic signature of the Aegean scabed at the moment of the eruption and his research dolphin promptly speaks to him in Russian, demands to die and commits suicide.

A few years on, we find Stasov as part of a

group of officers involved in using the now speaking (at least to Russians) dolphins in a war between Russia and the USA & Japan. Despite some amazing feats by both natural and cyberdolphins (mechanically and biologically augmented), Russia loses the war and Stasov finds himself in a Japanese torture camp in the Philipines. Rescued by a female American dolphin reseacher cum naval officer with whom he has an affair, he becomes involved in the continuation of an American pre-war project to communicate with intelligences which appear to be living in the clouds of Jupiter. His communication work with cetaceans enables oreas (killer whales) to insist that such creatures do indeed exist. The dolphins then interpret these intelligences as the Bubble of God and one dolphin emerges as her prophet, the Echo of God. The dolphins and oreas insist that all will be transformed when a mission, via a cyber-sperm whale, is dispatched to Jupiter. The cetacean hope to be forever rid of man via transformation/merging with the intelligences of Jupiter is dashed when Clarence, the cyberwhale, is crushed to death by the forces of the intelligence of Jupiter. Dolphins, orcas, and whales now realize that they will forever live only at the mercy of man.

Jablokov is an excellent writer and this book displays some of his obvious talent. Even talent, though, cannot obscure an excess of metaphysical gobbledygook when cetaceans and humans start debating the nature of God. Although there are lots of good ideas and vivid descriptions in this book, readers may react just as they did when they first found the same kind of nonsence in Dune and its sequels: skim it quick and get on to the interesting stuff. Unfortunately, the worst of the religious speculation lies at the end of the novel, leaving this reviewer unsatisfied.

Exiles to Glory
by Jerry Pournelle (copyright reads: Jerry and
Roberta Pournelle)
Baen, 1993 (revised edition)

As many of you will, I turned directly to the back of this revised novel to see just how Poddy dies.... Oops, wrong revised novel!

As with any variant reissue of a novel, one must needs wonder just now much revision is necessary in order to qualify as a revised novel rather than simply reprinting the original edition. The answer in this case is, unfortunately, not much.

Most readers will be familiar with the basic story; a young man must flee the US for space, a US that has become increasingly like the Clinton's wet dream of a total rianny state where coercive harmony and forced equality dilute the quality of life for all. Finding his niche in a private space enterprise, our hero, Kevin Senecal, ends up on Ceres at the unknown edge of a plot to steal much of the mining corporation's most valuable one. Captured and marconed on a tiny ball of rock, he and his companion escape to Cares itself by cobbling together an electric water heater powered rocket (I was reminded of the beer

powered rocket in Anderson's 1962, The Makeshift Rocket), confront the bad guys and prevail.

A close comparative reading reveals that actual revisions in this novel are few. The Green Fence gang become the Garvey Street Crips, "my wife" on the penultimate page becomes "Laurie Jo" and "Sure is." is added to begin a sentence on the same page. The longest actual addition which I could find is 4 sentences of Kevin's thoughts about his society on page 62.

Recommendation: If you're a Pournelle completist (as I am) buy it, if not, the original will suffice.

The Mark of the Cat by Andre Norton Ace Books, October 1993 248 pp., \$4.99 ISBN #0-441-51971-7

Andre Norton was the first science fiction/fantasy author I remember reading, shortly after learning how to read. Porty years ago I read every book by her in my grade school library, then moved on to Heinlein and others and never went back. Today I can't remember a single title or plot of a Norton book, though the Heinleins are fresh and clear in my memory. Therefore it was with some trepidation that I picked up my first Norton novel in forty years to read and review.

I'll say right up front that fantasy is not generally my cup of tea, so take all my views with a grain of salt, to mix a metaphor. The Mark of the Cat is a straightforwardly told fantasy story of the growth and development of Klaverai-va-Hynkkel, from outcast in his own clan-family to Greater Things.

Hynkkel is a slight youth, a herdsman in a society that prizes (though it apparently no longer has any use for) warriors. The ecology of Hynkkei's world, Kahulawe, is rather sketchily presented. At first it seems to consist entirely of (besides humans) five animal species, two large predators, two domesticated herd species, and a small domesticated pet, balanced by a single plant species, algae, that apparently grows in profusion in water pools that collect in occasional rocky outcrops in what is otherwise a waterless and uninhabitable desert. If fantasies were supposed to make sense, this strange ecology would probably be the clue to the whole plot, but in fact it is just background, of no more than passing interest.

Hynkkel is sent out on a "solo", a rite of passage for young men in his society, during which his family hopes he will conveniently expire, unnoticed. Instead, Hynkkel discovers he has heretofore undiscovered Powers, in fact all of his perceived weaknesses turn out to be strengths, and his solo turns out to be preparation for a much larger test that lies beyond.

The story is interesting enough, as long as Hynkkel is the viewpoint character about 80% of the time. Occasionally, the viewpoint

switches to another character, for no apparent reason; it neither advances the story very much nor adds much explanation. Like most fantasies, there is plenty of Magic, Porgotten Old Lore, Casting of Divinations. If this is the sort of thing you like, you'll like this one. (Sorry, no dragons.)

The ending of the story virtually screams "INSERT SEQUEL HERB". I was amazed to find that Andre Norton was still alive, much less still writing. Here's to you, Ms. Norton; you led me to greater things.

We are members of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society and saw the letter you wrote to it, which was published in its monthly newsletter. We found these books and magazines for sale at second-hand stores and got them quite cheap. We haven't read all of them, and so don't guarantee that they're all good. We have read some of them and think that some of those are quite good. We hope you like them. Let us know if it's not too inconvenient. (We don't promise to reply. You just happened to catch us when we had some spare time.)

We're sending you two boxes: one full of books and a few magazines and one just full of magazines.

Have you ever heard of roleplaying games (like Daugeons and Dragons)? We might be able to get you some material connected with that sort of stuff too. One of us (Lee Gold) has written some RPG books (historical backgrounds on Japan and the Vikings). Lee also publishes a roleplaying amateur press association (that's a fan magazine with many different contributors, each commenting on what the other people said in the previous issue). It's got contributors from the U.S., Canada, Grest Britain, Australia, and Hong Kong. It's only \$2 a page to contribute, but it's \$3.36 to buy otherwise.

The other one of us (Rita Winston) also publishes an amateur press association. Rita's APA is about pagan religion. (Not only archeological and historical, but also for modern urban people who believe in Pagan religions. Americans and Canadians, so far.) Basically, copies are only available for the people who write in it. It costs money to make photocopies of the articles and for postage, but I have been known to give "scholarships" to people whose writing I especially like.

Lee couldn't tell whether "Mircea" was a man's or a woman's name, but Rita explained that it's a Romanian man's name and mentioned the famous Romanian anthropologist Mirces Eliade. #### LASTS GIFT EXCHANGE BULKS

- 1) The dift Exchange is considered an extension of the previous night's meeting. Dues will be collected, if not previously paid. All paid-up active members of LASFS are eligible to participate. Tou must be present in person no proxies. You should expect to spend several hours at this event.
  - 2) To participate in the Gift Exchange, bring an anonymous wrapped gift, with a value of at least \$18.60. The gift must be related to Science Fiction. Fantasy on Fandom. The gift you place in the Exchange should be considered a donation. The purpose of the Exchange is to have fun. Because of the wide range of gifts that may be contributed, and because of varying tastes, YOU BAY NOT RECEIVE THE GIFT YOU REALLY MAST!
  - 3. On entering the Gift Exchange, you will receive a registration number. The registration numbers will be randomized, to determine when each person will be called to choose a gift from the table.
  - 4) The first person called will choose a gift from the table, open it, and show it to the audience.
  - 5) The rest of the participants, in order called will each choose a gift from the table, open it, and show it o the audience. If the person opening a gift desires, he/she may "Force Trade" that gift with any gift that has been proviously opened. The person holding the desired gift must accept the trade.
  - 6) The first person in the Gift Exchange is allowed the last "Forced Trade". after everyone else has selected and opened a gift.
  - 7) A "Crud Cell" may occur if a gift is deemed unsuitable. "Crud Cells" may only be made if the gift has insufficient value of if the gift is not related to Science Fiction, Fantasy, or Fandom. "Crud Calls" may not be made merely because a person is unhappy with a gift, if it otherwise meets the requirements."
  - 6) The person opening the gift may make a "Crud Call" at that time. Also, the person receiving a gift on a "Forced Trade" may make a "Crud Call" at that time. The participants may overrule a "Crud Call" by majority wote if they consider it unjustified. "Crud Calls" are not allowed at any other time.
  - 3) "Saves may be made after a "Crud Call", if any participent mants the gift that has been declared grad. If more that one person wants the crud gift, the person holding it may choose among the gifts offered in exchange. If only one person offers to take the crud gift, the person who made the "Crud Call" must amongs the trade. After the trade, neither person may make another "Crud Call".
  - is) A participant may trade his/her future gift choice on a "Crud Call". The person making the "Crud Call" will then select another gift at the appropriate time. The acceptor of the crud gift may not make another "Crud Call" on it.

11) If no one volunteers to "Save" a "Forced Trade" with the perpetrator of the crud gift - whether a future selection of an already opened gift - is mandated.


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12) After the exchange is over, free trading of gifts may occur. This trading is outside the Gift Exchange and is done by persons willing to trade all or parts of their gifts with each other.

#### GUIDELIERS & SUGGESTIONS

- 1) If you would not be happy receiving the gift you are donating, don't put it into the Gift Exchange. Others probably won't like it either.
- 2) Having participants fight over an expensive gift ruins the spirit of the Gift Exchange. If you bring a gift morth more than TWICE minimum value do SOT expect equal value in return.
- 3) Rotsler's Rules for Masquerade Presentations can apply to Gift Exchange presentations, too: "Funny is better than serious. Short is better than long. Short and Funny is best."
- 4) Do not put anything effensive into the Gift Exchange. Lemi, crude, rude, or otherwise distasteful gifts are #22 funny.
- 5) If it took more than 28 minutes to wrap the gift, it will take too long to unwrap it at the Gift Euchauge. Keep the erapping simple so that if can be opened in a reasonable amount of time.
- 6) When giving books that are part of a multi-part series, it is considered good form (and perhaps even good taste) to include the first book of the series.
- 7) Some gifts that were very popular at previous Gift Enchanges were: stuffed animals (especially those from comic strips), telescopes, secently published books (in new conditions), toy ray guns, coffee table books about Science Fiction or Fantasy, and educational High Tech. High Quality Gifts of alcoholic beverages and/or chocolste are considered Fannish)
- 6) Items that bombed: miscellaneous food, handcrafted "artwork", used paperbacks if small in number or poor in condition, and anything having to do with <u>Pots</u> (unless Crud Insurance is included.)
