From the record-breaking success of "Jurazzic Park" to the personnial popularity of dinosaur exhibits, amusement rides and books, dinosaurs have long held an amazing fuscination for adults and children alike.

The meeting was called to order at 1113. In the absence of Board Secretary Mike Giver, Chairman Deckert appointed a familiar substitute. Civer had seat minutes on ahead, however, and these were read to an audience more attentive than usual, since there was only the one copy. There was only one change, namely, the proper framing of Nola's sumance. The Treasurers' Report showed total assets of \$17,441.40, divided amonget \$16,723.40 in the Building Fund, \$3.59 in the Treasury, \$230.28 Library Fund, Keys \$320.00, Video \$68.83, Winter Holking Party \$5.00, Acherman Half-Toning \$40.00, Showcase \$50.00.

Membership Applications: Applications were on hand from Robert J. Williams and Tim Hobbs. Separate consideration was suggested for no particular reason, but in the end the applications were passed by voice vote without objection.

Convention Delegator: Gavin Claypool had sent a request to be named a delegate to Tuecce, and he got what he asked for. Joe Zeff wanted the absent Drew Sanders to be made a delegate to everything, but he didn't get what he asked for. Gary Louie was named a delegate to SMOPcon.

Construction: Bob Null and there was a ballast light out in the Computer Room and another one needed to be installed in the Library. Chairman Deckert observed the costs were well within the Treasurers' discretionary limit, despite "LASPS policy to keep as many people in the dark as possible." Robbie Cantor said some leakage from the well had gotten in, but the roofers fixed it and the recent minstorm hadn't caused us any problems. Tim Merrigan said it was real nice to finally have a speaker in the Ape L room, but it would be even nicer if it were actually attached to something. Robbie said the Time Meddless could probably do it, but Bob warned against mismatching the impedance. Leigh Strother-Vien wanted to know if the line between the buildings had been fixed. Bob said it hadn't, and that we should call the DWP. Gary Louis noted that many tools had turned up missing, and that most of them were the property of individual members. Dockert suggested this issue be reised at one of the regular Thursday meetings. Ed Green said a few wasps had been sighted outside the buildings. Shaun Lyon conveyed thanks from the Time Meddlers for the eradication of the wasps. Mike Donahue thought we should discuss the magazine and display racks at our January meeting. Gary wanted to know when the comfy seating would finally show up. Mike Donahue said that B.G. Workman hoped to have the job done for us by January.

Debugging: Bob said the yellowjacket nest was found in the rafters near the back building restroom. He added that he made his assault on the rest the same night Boris Yeltsin moved against the Communist hard-liners. Somebody had complained about reaches a couple of weeks ago, and a bug bomb was too successful, lesving the bathroom full of deed reaches. Deckert recalled the early days of the present clubhouse, when you would open the door and see swarms of reaches soutting about. Several lunch dates were immediately cancelled. Some further exterminating methode were discussed. Ed liked the idea of bombing the recen Thursday night at sround 8:00 p.m. Note that he didn't say "bug bomb," just "bomb." Charje Jackson liked the way the timing would make it take place after the serial chapter. Deckert asked if there was anything more that needed to be said about bugs. Hal O'Brien offered, "Yngvi is a louse?"

Läserry: Leigh Strother-Vien said that Heather Stern has moved to Oregon and is therefore now Librarian-At-Arms. Heather is expected to install the new-and-improved software soon and update the Library databases. Leigh also had an offer of a donation from Frank and Laura Kelly-Frees of Kelly's file copies of books and magazines containing his art, as a "semi-permanent loan." Kelly and Laura are still checking with other possible beneficiaries, however. There was discussion of many issues raised by this offer. First was the amount of room the collection would take up, and Leigh thought the new-and-improved Library would be able to contain it all. There were differing opinions as to whether these items would be allowed to circulate, with Leigh initially reminding us that the Library was founded with the specific mission of being a loading library. Ed and Matthew mentioned the idea of a Special Collection. Deckert inferred a consensus that we would accept the donation offer, and find such storage space as necessary. It was put to a voice vote and passed.

Leigh also had had another offer, from a woman she had met at ConFrancisco who wented to donate her specialized collection of a few authors' works, and get a tax writeoff for it. Leigh promised to get more details, though Uirika O'Brien mentioned UC Riverside as another possible donation site and Mike Donahue mentioned UC Santa Cruz. There was some discussion of how to get this collection down from the Bay Area, but the consensus was that we would make it happen somehow. Mike Donahue wanted so have a work party to get stuff out of Monstro and into the Library. He also wanted to know if the Library would like to have some CD-ROMs. Leigh said, "Why not?" She had also heard an offer to sell a run of some prozine called variously Quantum and Thrust. Gary said she should talk to Bruce Pelz about it.

Children's Literature Committee Recommended Reading List: Galen Tripp said the list had been updated in October, and 500 copies had been printed, which he hoped would last a year. Requests are up slightly with the beginning of the school year.

Emergency Preparedness Committee: Ed Green wants copies of our Library holdings, financial records and such by the end of January. He will publish a new phone tree at that time, once we know who the Board members, and Board and Procedural officers are. Bob Null said that a fire-proof safe warn't absolute guarantee of the safety of its contents, as witness some safes that survived the recent firestorms but had charred contents. Prancis Hamit was somewhat less pessimistic, saying that the type of fire we were likely to have on our prenaises would not get quite as hot as the fires in Malibu and elsewhere. CL suggested an outside wall as the place to keep the safe safe. Ed said he would take these various suggestions into account.

Plaques: Gary said the plaque for the Evans-Freehafer Award has gone in in time for Loscon. He still needs the list of names of the construction crew. Leigh and Donahue said they will review the list. Shaun volunteered to do the necessary legwork to get the Forry Award in time for the con. Gary added that there are still some plaques in the Library which could go up on the wall.

Computers: Bob Null said that Jerry Pournelle had donated lots of stuff, including Microsoft Word 6.0 and CorelDraw! 3.0. These were now installed on Bookie Monster. FrankNStein would be going to Loscon. Charlie said that the miscellaneous computer parts that hadn't sold had been brought to the curb and had, as expected, been vanished by the neighbors. Ed Green muttered, "Andruschak will find you responsible for that!" Gary said that our copy of Ventura Publisher had been upgraded to version 3.0, but that this had somehow crased a font directory and a bunch of style sheets, and otherwise caused havoc in various ways. Several people said, "ouch," or the moral equivalent.

BBS Committee: Fang Van Took had had a printed report ready for some time. Having written up his proposal, he introduced the following written motion:

Moved that the LASPS set up and run a Bulletin Board System, to provide an electronic meeting place for fandom and to ald in running conventions that are under the suspices of ether LASPS or SCIFI (who (sic) has granted seed money for this project). This BBS will be initially set up and run by the current LASPS/SCIFI BBS committee and in particular under the guidance of Fang, as bead of that committee. [Signed] Fang A. Van Took, Mertin R. Nuli, Mathew B. Tepper, Joseph Zall.

Fang said the computer for the BBS could be set up in the cupboards in the back of the Apa L room. We could probably set things up so one could log onto the BBS through one of the computers in the Computer Room. Nola Prame-Gray wanted to know if we'd need a new phone line. Robbie Cantor said we would. Pang expressed the hope that the BBS would not only be useful, but would generate income for the club from the fees from people outside of LASFS and SCIFI. Passed by voice vote without opposition, but with Gary Louie abstaining.

Loscon 20: Shaun said, "It is a go." Work parties were planned for the following Sunday and the Wednesday before Thanksgiving. The Program books were being done even as he spoke. He also had a pleasant surprise in the news that Vonda McIntyre expected to be living in Los Angeles for a year, and might even pop over to LASPS occasionally. Bob said the missing equipment had included an ice chest, so we need one. Christian McGuire said it had not been borrowed from Kim Marks, as had been rumored. Shaun volunteered the use of the Time Meddlers' ice chest. Charlie said he had been getting lots of questions for Loscon for which he didn't have the answers, and needs to coordinate with other people to get match the questions with the answers. Dan Deckert said he felt the financial condition of the conwas good. Robbie wasn't so sure, but then that is a Treasurer's prerogative.

Loscon 21: Shaun said, "If somebody signs the contracts, we're settled into the Burbank Airport Hilton." Leigh said her understanding was that the Board would have some sort of meeting at the coa to confirm (or deny) our continued association with the Hilton. Deckert said he would probably just sort of wander around and make himself available to talk to Board members at the con as he saw them. Shaun had some slight concern over the small ballrooms. Nola and CL addressed the issue of bus access.

Showcase: Utrika apologized for her not having been able to clear the dates, since a renter had the use of the clubhouse for the intended date and apparently did not answer calls. Dan thanked her for the work that she had done on the project.

Digby-Jackson-Tepper Amendment: Matthew B. Tepper said the twin motions to move BoD elections to the Thursday before Thanksgiving had passed overwhelmingly, by a vote of "everyone else in the room to Carol Ann Cranston." He added that Carol Ann had stated objection only to the clause allowing Board candidates to give their statement of intent through an intermediary. He also thanked Charlie Jackson for his work on drafting the specific language to the changes to the Standing Rules and the By-Laws. The amendments also move the nominating meeting to the week before the election. Leigh added that Board attendance records are probably available through Bruce Pelz.

Old Bit of New Business: Ed said that the LASFS Gift Exchange had been scheduled for 17 December, to be hosted by himself with the assistance of Bob Null and Joe Zeff, who had each agreed to bring five random-number lists.

New Bit of Old Business: Ed reminded us that next year marks the 60th anniversary of the founding of the LASFS. He had received a letter from Lew Wolkoff of the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society, which was founded in the same year and wanted to do some special celebrations to mark the fact. The PSFS wanted to know if we'd like to coordinate with them on some activities, such as putting on a con. Beth O'Brien wanted to put on a joint con in St. Louis. Miscellaneous: Bob said the concrete bumpers in the parking spaces were crumbling, and one had already been totaled and in need of replacement. Robbie pointed out that the Treasury was depleted, so we'd just have to wait until after Loscon, and hope that people don't drive into the building. Dan said we should determine the costs and discuss it after Loscon.

Leigh said there were some concerns raised at the last Second Sunday. It seems that the regulars had chipped in, as it were, to buy some charcoal and firestarters for the barbecue, and that some of this had been "borrowed" by persons unknown. There was much discussion, but no real answers. Bob wanted to know if we really needed the smaller of the two barbecues, which apparently doesn't get used much out of season and just takes up storage space. It belongs to Dale Heles, who agreed to take it home for the winter at Gary's suggestion. Deckert suggested that the charcoal and firestarters should be labeled specifically as "not open stock."

Charlie Jackson said the Autumn Holiday Party, held on 31 October, had gone pretty well, and had been funded entirely by member donations, matching funds from his two pocket organizations, and the take from some suction items supplied by Greg Bilan. He thanked the following for their assistance: Joyce Sperling, Mike Thorsen, Steve Merritt, and Greg Bilan. The Winter Holiday Party already had a good start on donations.

For the last business of the meeting. Dan introduced Phil Broad and Ed Zamora of "Phil & Ed's Excellent Convention." Phil & Ed at first denied any knowledge of the missing charcoal. But they were really here to invite LASFS members to attend their con, and offered the club a table so we can promote our cons. Dan said we would graciously accept this offer. Phil & Ed said they will host room parties on Friday and Saturday nights at Loscon. Shaun added that Phil & Ed had already taken out a two-page ad in the Loscon program book. The mood of the meeting was that Phil & Ed are "good neighbors," and that friendly cross- promoting would probably be good for both our houses.

Adjournment was at 1300. Next meeting: 11:00 a.m., 12 December 1993.

First, we had a bit of clarification from the previous week. At that time, Ed Green had suggested a railroad to give the award to Forrest J Ackerman himself, but on further consideration this idea was not as good as at first blush. As Fang and CL had separately noted, the Forry Award is given by the LASFS essentially in Forry's name, so giving it to Forry is kind of like Forry giving an award to himself. Bruce Pelz said Loscon's host hotel, the Burbank Airport Hilton, still had rooms available, and make sure you tell them you're with the con. Bill Green said one coincidental item not on the official program was a total eclipse of the Moon, totality occurring around 2200 PST on Sunday 28 November. President Green reiterated the scheduling of the LASFS Gift Exchange for Friday 17 December. Also, there looked to be a LASFS theater party to "The Three Musketeers" on 3 December; see Robbie if you want to go with. There was, regrettably, no time for sergeants Reviews or Committee Reports, but who knows what the future may bring? We adjourned at 2140 to whatever silliness awaited us in our separate lives.

The Memory of Earth by Orson Scott Card Series: Homecoming: Volume 1 Tor HB 292 pgs \$21.95 March 1992 ISBN # 0-312-93036-4

This month I have found two very different books that I can recommend highly. The first, by Orson Scott Card, is the first of a new five book series about a planet that has been kept under strict control by a computer. The computer makes people not think about things that would lead them to technology. This has been going on for almost forty million years and would have continued indefinitely but the master computer discovered that it was no longer able to do the job to which it had been assigned. The computer, known as the Oversoul, decides that the only way to protect its charges is to send people back to Earth to get answers as to how to continue its mission. The book is the first of a five book series and with fully developed characters it should have been nominated for the Hugo. As it was, not enough people noticed it and the book went by without the fanfare due it.

The Forever King

by Moliy Cochran and Warren Murphy Tor HB 364 pgs \$21.95 June 1992 ISBN # 0-312-85227-4

The second book this month is a retelling of the story of King Arthur, but with one major twist. Most stories about Arthur talk about how he will return one day to lead mankind to peace and prosperity." But like Christ that is a prophecy that hasn't happened. Well in this book Arthur has returned and is once again a little boy. Galahad has returned (his soul) and he is now a retired FBI agent who is troubled by the boy that he failed to save. Together with Merlin, they must battle a psychopath named Saladin. Saladin has been alive for centuries because he has been in possession of the Holy Grail. He was in possession of it before it was the Holy Grail and as long as he has it with him he won't age. Arthur and Seladin must bettle for possession of the Grail in order for Arthur to bring back Camelot.

The book is extremely original and the writing is extremely fresh and different with a style that will book you within the first five pages and will keep you hooked till the very end. Many of the early surprises are things that you can predict but even when you guess things , they are revealed in a way that makes you happy for your correct anticipation. I really enjoyed this book, and I would recommend it to anyone looking for a good modern day fantasy novel with a touch of history in it. Arthur's place in history has a non-fiction feel to it at times, giving a more realistic feel to the novel.

This is another book that came out in 1992 that I missed when it first came out and I am only just getting around to reading. I wasn't that happy when any of the books that got nominated for the Huge award this ye. That is not to say that I disliked the books that won, but rather that I didn't think that they were that good. Here are two books that I have just now read that I feel are better than any of the nominated works. Maybe next year more deserving works will get noticed and the best book will truly win. But then again who am I fooling.

Ray Shackleford makes a comfortable living as a stereo repairman. He loves music and spends a lot of time thinking about great albums that never got made. One day he hears the music to a song never recorded coming out of the speakers in his shop. This is just the beginning of a personal odyssey that profoundly changes Ray's life.

Is this fantasy or science fiction? If you consider "Lest Darkness Fall" SF, then so is this. Shiner's novel is intimately bound up with the music loved by early boomers. A govel that makes you think. Recommended.

This won't mean anything to you until you read the book, but according to Shiner's interview on Hour 25, Brian Wilson showed up at one of his book signings, and apparently enjoyed the book.

A Philosophical Investigation

Farrarr Straus, Giroux, 1993 330 pp., \$20.00 (Hardcover) ISBN # 0-374-23176-1

London, 2013. A serial killer is stalking and killing men with no apparent connection. But there is a connection, a list supposedly known only to the police themselves. Inspector "Jake" Jacowicz must find out how the killer knows these government secrets and stop the killings.

This novel is presented as a straightforward story of detection (not, by the way, a mystery story with clues for us to solve). I think it qualifies as SP because of the 'near-future' but nevertheless futuristic methods employed by both the police and the killer. Recommended.

WARNING: Definitely not for the squeamish.
