# Review by Laurraine Tutihasi Ray Bradbury's An Evening on Mars

presented by the Planetary Society

be my birthday, the Planetary Society presented a benefit performance for the Thomas O. Paine Memorial Award for the Advancement of Human Exploration of Mars.


