Cathy Beckstead beat her squeaky, plastic gavel with a presidential rhythm on everything in reach. Against the table — not loud enough; against her own head — hifidelity; against Glyer's head — ouch! When she called the meeting to order, Rob Cole filled in the blank by moving to adjourn.
