A Search for the Purpose of LASFS - 1

It has been a while since I stood up in front of a meeting and asked those attending what the purpose of LASFS was, why the club existed and what the goal was. It was proposed that I put something together, and they'd look at it. Ed Green graciously offered to help me. Since then, I've been elected to the Board of Directors, and participated in Board of Directors meetings. (This is where things really happen. I invite anyone who is or

wants to be an active member to join me there.) I have attended other LASFS meetings, work parties, Time Meddlers meetings, etc. and have watched what is happened. I've talked with long time members, and have set as a goal to talk with each of the members of the board about our purpose and their vision of what LASFS is, and where we should take it.

I personally have finally developed a *beginning*; a preliminary view, or understanding about what LASFS is all about. It helps explain why we have gained, and lost, members in the past, and it helps me understand what we need to do to gain members in the future. It also gives me an outline of where we need to go in the future. That's rather presumptive of me isn't it? I'm claiming to understand what LASFS is all about, when so many others have puzzled over it, or just taken an observation I made 30 years ago (has it really been that long ago) as adequate. That observation was a marker, a guidepost, but was not a sufficient explanation in itself. In the intervening time, no one has built on it. It needs further observations, amplification, and interpretation before you understand all it implies.

My original observation was that "LASFS seems to take in socially inept people, and teach them how to act properly around other people. Once they learn that they disappear into the mundane world, and are never seen again." My proposition is that "LASFS provides a pathway to maturity for highly intelligent people." Now before you jump on me for calling you "socially inept", let's examine some of the things that probably happened to you. Yeah, you!

A long time ago, you learned that the people around you weren't as smart as you were. They were emotionally driven, instead of logical. When you pointed out their irrational behavior, they got mad. They talked over and over about the same, trivial stuff. They even repeated the same stuff over and over, as if you didn't remember it. If you tried to point it out, or help them, they thought it was criticism (which it probably was) and took offence. When you showed how smart you were in class, they made fun of you. You were an outcast from most social groups. If you were lucky in school, you found a couple others who were the same kind of outcasts and you hung out together. When school ended, you all went your separate ways, and you lost contact with them.

Sound familiar? You started at some point to read books, or go to movies, or watch videos. Most of them were "slices of life" with the same narrow-minded attitudes and stupid people. And some were different. They were fantasies or science fiction. They stretched the imagination. New worlds. Magic, where anything could

happen. You walked in on a story and had to figure out the rules of the game. It was new. It was imaginative. It had "A Sense of Wonder" about it. And your real life? Damnably dull!

So, you showed up at LASFS. IF you were lucky, someone talked to you. You discovered you were in fast company. They knew about Egyptology, movies, computers, Elizabethan England, Haiku, Lemmings, Xanth, Genomes, vitamins, neutrinos, etc., and sometimes YOU had a hard time keeping up. They could give and take, and were actually interested if you knew something they didn't. You discovered they weren't hidebound or prejudiced, except for one thing - they were intolerant of stupidity. If you couldn't keep up your end of the conversation, or didn't have something interesting to say, or just talked about yourself, you were ignored, or people just left. You were never expected to be something you weren't. People didn't care what you did or suffered in real life. They took you at face value. If you had pretensions of knowledge or status, you were quickly found out.

Visiting LASFS, and then returning again for most people is an emotional, not a logical thing. You can probably revisit your experience by asking, "How do I fit here? Does anyone want to know me? Am I needed? What was the value of joining? What is required of members?" But I digress.

In this type of intellectual, tolerant of information, but "fast company," "What do you have to contribute that's new?" environment, you had to drop the "I'm smarter than you" attitude, the little "intellectual tricks," the pouting, and the put-downs. They just didn't work. People just smiled knowingly and walked away. They listened to you about your problems once or twice, and then asked you why you didn't fix them or just walked away.

If you wanted to socialize with these people, there was nowhere to hide. If you threw a tantrum, they'd just look at you, not respond, wait until you got quiet, and then ask you if you were done. And then ignore you.

, failed to pay for membership at an attended LASFS function, or paid for goods and services from the LASFS or any LASFS function with a check which has been subsequently dishonored.

This changes the wording of the section as follows:

B. Any member who is 6 meetings or more in arrears in dues, failed to pay for membership at an attended LASFS function, or paid for goods and services from the LASFS or any LASFS function with a check which has been subsequently dishonored, shall be notified of this fact by the Treasurer. His or her membership shall then be reviewed by a committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board, the President and the Treasurer. Upon majority recommendation of this committee, the membership of the delinquent member may be terminated by a majority of those voting at any meeting of the society.

Petition has been signed by a number of members, sufficient to warrant consideration by the club.

After some discussion, the motion carried 42/3/5. Since 42 is greater than 16, the motion carried.

Registrar: We had two guests: Dave Huffman and Valerie Meluski.

Winter Holiday Party: The Lantern O' Jack was passed around. After the Lantern had had its chance, we had an auction, which raised over \$150.

MINUTES: The minutes were approved as corrected.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Operating fund: \$13,441.70; Century Fund: \$30,444.86; Key Fund: \$350.00; Video R/R Fund: \$345.00; Total: \$44,581.56. Liz Mortensen thanked the auctioneers for their results at a recent LASFS meeting.

NEW MEMBERS: An application from Susan Gleason was approved by voice vote.

APPOINTMENT: Mike Stern appointed Ed Green as his advisor on bylaws, with the title "parliamentarian."

MEMBERSHIP TERMINATION PETITION: After receiving at the last Board meeting a petition to terminate the memberships of Drew Rhine, Lee Downing and Eric Kellstrom, they had been notified by certified mail that the matter would come up at this Board meeting. They were not present. Mike Stern asked if anyone present wanted to speak for them, and no one did. The Board voted by a unanimous show of hands to recommend the termination petition to the club.

FUNCTION MOVEMENT: Mike Stern noted there had been a great deal of e-mail among Board members about the priority among those who want to use the clubhouse. An accommodation had been reached to allow Charlie Jackson's video program on a night the LADWVS planned to meet. Mike believed the questions raised in the process warranted a committee that will recommend a better way to do things. He created a committee and appointed Shaun Lyon, Liz Mortensen, and Kim Marks Brown to it.

CLUB MACHINES: Bob Null reported that the laser printer had been fixed for \$100. Joe Zeff said he and Mike Morris will get the connectors needed produce an Internet Lounge from club computers. Marty Cantor mentioned what work the Gestetner needs.

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about making the presentation at LOSCON. He warned people that there has been trouble with the hotel only giving rack rate on Friday night.

LOSCON 28: No report.

LOSCON.ORG: Mike Stern asked Liz Mortensen to remind Chaz to get us the paperwork for ownership of the web site.

LOSCONS OF THE FUTURE: Bruce Pelz, seconded by Joe Zeff, moved to refer LOSCON presentations directly to the club without approval of the Board. In Bruce's view the Board always approves all bids, so why not eliminate that step. Joe Zeff thought somebody should verify that a bid meets the requirement of having the necessary officers, but Board approval was not needed. Shaun disagreed that Board approval was automatic. Several directors tried to recall where were the requirements for LOSCON bids to have certain officers: they are not in the standing rule governing LOSCON. Kim wanted to make a motion to table the vote, which Zeff seconded after making a motion to amend the Standing Rules of the Board to define qualifications (minimum requirements) of a LOSCON bid. Kim said her goal was to tell bids what they needed to qualify to be considered by the club.

Kim moved to add to the Standing Rules of the Board a rule that, "A LOSCON bid must have a named person as Chairman, Treasurer, and Hotel Liaison." The motion passed 5 aye, 2 nay, 2 abstaining, 1 inert.

Then a vote was held on the Pelz/Zeff motion, which was defeated 3 eye, 7 nay, and 1 abstain.

ARCHIVES: LASFS: Bob Null said he had been holding regular Tuesday work sessions. The DE PROF issues have been organized, as have the Board minutes from 1994-on. Mike Stern thanked Bob Null and Eylat Poliner and anybody else who worked with them. Bob planned to identify gaps in the club's file of minutes.

OTHER: Mike Mason held a library work party on November 11, where volunteers had sorted through 6 boxes of books.

Mike Glyer didn't resign from the Board. Hoping you are the same.

A professional writer and editor, Ted has both produced and contributed many of fandom's legendary fanzines. Ted knows fanzines; and, in this column, he will be introducing an old (yet still living) fannish pursuit to those of you have not yet experienced this area of fandom (except, of course, for reading DE PROF).

FANZINES

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as "egoboo" – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzines below and broaden your participation in fandom.

ANSIBLE (Dave Langford, 94 London Rd, Reading, Berkshire, RG1 5AU, United Kingdom; ansible@cix.co. uk; monthly single sheet newsletter; available in the U.S. for a self-addressed, stamped envelope sent to U.S. agent Janice Murray, Box 75684, Seattle, WA 98126-0684)

Ansible has been appearing regularly for 20 years; the December issue is #161. Dave Langford writes and edits Ansible with clarity and wit and has been winning Fan Writer Hugos for it with an almost monotonous consistency for years — if not decades. This is a newsletter with a British accent which covers both fan and pro events, cramming an amazing amount of wordage into its two double-columned pages. There is actually more real news in an issue of Ansible than can be found in most issues of Locus.

Here's an example: "**Stephen King** suspended publication of his 'download free, pay on the honour system' serial *The Plant* as of 9 November. His assistant Marsha DeFilippo first said this was because only 46%

of readers paid up (success beyond the wildest dreams of anyone else publishing in that way); in a later statement she insisted that reader response had nothing to do with it. Some think King grew tired of a project that in his terms never generated more than small change, supposedly around \$375,000."

TRASH BARREL (Donald Franson, 6543 Babcock Ave., North Hollywood, CA 91606-2308; available "on request," but a stamped self-addressed envelope wouldn't hurt)

Trash Barrel typically runs only two to four pages of typewriter-typed double-columns, and although it's printed by xerox copying, it has the look and feel of older-fashioned, mimeographed fanzines. This fanzine is devoted to nothing but listings (with a sentence or two of description) of fanzines. They are almost too brief to be called "reviews," and they don't make exciting reading, but the latest issue (dated "Nov. 2000" and unnumbered) has 52 fanzines listed, in alphabetical order – making it a good place to find out about a wide variety of fanzines for anyone wishing to explore this aspect of fandom.

IDEA (Geri Sullivan, Toad Hall, 3444 Blaisdell Ave. S., Minneapolis, MN 55408-4315; idea@toad-hall.com; available for Letters of Comment; query about single-copy availability)

Idea falls at the opposite end of the fanzine spectrum from Trash Barrel. The new #12 runs 78 pages and is an ambitious "genzine" or general, unspecialized fanzine. Geri uses a high-tech mimeograph to produce this very attractive fanzine, but the text is all computer-set and looks virtually photo-copied. The front cover (both sides) is produced on a color inkjet printer and presents eight full-color photographs of such notable fans as British TAFF-winner Maureen Kincaid Speller. Inside are articles by American TAFF-winner Ulrika O'Brien, Dave Langford, Martin Hoare (who often accepts Langford's Hugos at Worldcons for him), Rob Hansen, Jeff Schalles and Geri herself – and a 30-page letter column. Discussions fill the letter column and invite your responses (there's nothing like seeing your own letter in print!).

That's all the space I have this issue, but I'll be reviewing more fanzines here in issues to come.

LOSCON doesn't seem like it would be run by LASFS, but you're acting like it's of prime importance to you that your own membership pay its dues at that event.

Actually, LOSCON is a proprietary convention - it is owned and run by LASFS and it is our primary fundraiser. Now, if the three who "ghosted" the con had been non-members of the club, forbidding them future entry to the con unless they paid their past con membership would have been sufficient to take care of the problem. However, as they "thumbed their noses" at the club and seemed to have the attitude that they were entitled to get in for free whilst all of the other non-conworking attendees had to pay to attend, the members of the club decided that we did not need members with this presumed attitude and did something the club rarely does - it expelled them (and spent over a year in trying to take care of the problem before doing so). In 66 years, LASFS has expelled fewer than a dozen members. The club rules make it difficult to expel members, and a general club tolerance for the foibles of fans makes it even more difficult. As a general rule, if anybody gets expelled from the LASFS, they really had to deserve it.


