LASFS Board of Directors Meeting of January 12, 2002 William Ellern, Karl Lembke, Chairmen Mike Glyer, Secretary

Attendance: (Board) Bill Ellern, mike Glyer, Karl Lembke, Michael Mason, Liz Mortensen, Mike Stern, Joe Zeff, Mike Thorsen, Elayne Pelz, Cathy Beckstead, Bob Null. (Others) J. Sperling, L. Stern, M. Cantor, C. Bernay, A. Satin, T. Tomomatsu, E. Green, S. Beckstead, G. Barrett.

Chairman's Remarks: Bill Ellern said that he had started the bylaws committee. He has appointed two individuals to his new marketing committee.

Minutes: Glyer delivered the minutes. Bill Ellem discussed whether the treasurer's report should be included when the minutes go on the web. Marty Cantor questioned whether the information should be in *DE PROFUNDIS*. Karl Lembke noted that as a tax-exempt organization, some of our financial information (for instance, anything in our Form 990 tax returns) is available to the public. Under Archives, the Hubbard letter mentioned is being evaluated, and another copy has been put in the club archives. Mike Stem moved to approve the minutes as corrected. The motion passed by voice vote, unopposed.

Officer Election: Chair: Karl Lembke (8), Bill Ellem (3). Vice-Chair: Michael Mason (elected by a majority in a voice vote). Secretary: Mike Glyer (elected by voice vote). Comptroller: Mike Glyer (elected by voice vote).

New Members: Applications were received from Michael Karpenste, Gayl Siegel (a USAF public health officer - Karl declared, "Boy, do we need on of these!). The applicants were accepted by voice vote, unopposed.

Treasurer's Report: Liz Mortensen reported on the status of the treasury. Donations for 2001 are posted. She also submitted the proposed LASFS budget for 2002, accompanied by information about 2001's proposed and actual budgets, and other historic information. She said dues income had been up in 2001 because several members paid lifetime dues, and donations were up because somebody became a Patron Saint: these are non-recurring income. She would add to 2002 the anticipated revenue from renting art show hangings to ConJose. Glyer recommended increasing the soda revenue in line with the projected cost of sodas, since we would not be selling at a loss as might be inferred from the proposed budget amounts. After further discussion of items, the budget was accepted by voice vote, unopposed.

Facilities: Marty Cantor placed a notice in *DE PROFUNDIS* about the club's desire to give away the Gestetner 460, and nobody contacted him or Bob Null. He planned to announce again at the next meeting, and if there was still no response the machine would be recycled.

Bob said he had replaced two of the computers in the computer room, which will now have a full complement of Pentiums. He is working on networking them. Joe Zeff confirmed the internet lounge stuff is available to be used. Bob discussed updating the computer operating systems as needed. Joe said he will set up user accounts for the Linux system.

Ed Green said that, as President, he was going to start pushing for a cleaner, neater clubhouse. He asked the Board individually and collectively to consider purging our mathoms, excess equipment, etc. Storage space is at a premium. He added that Tadao Tomomatsu has done an excellent job cleaning up the auction space. Ed planned to schedule a cleaning party in March. Bill Ellern, seconded by Mike Glyer, moved to ratify Ed's plan as he requested, setting aside March 30 for the "party." The motion passed by voice vote.

Marty Cantor raised the latest problems with parking. Cathy Beckstead discussed the problem that we don't benefit from the long-standing agreement with the neighbor. Elayne recommended that since we can't do anything about weekday daytime use, we drop the issue. After further discussion, Karl Lembke suggested a couple of people write down what our parking situation is, what our needs are, find out whether an arrangement can be made to use church parking spaces. Mike Stern said we need to repaint the handicap parking space. Michael Mason agreed to collect information about the parking situation. Cathy Beckstead moved to table the discussion until the next meeting. It wasn't Karl asked Ed Green to talk to the church about parking. He asked Michael Mason to write down the standard answers to the standard questions about our parking situation (a FAQ, offered Joe.)

Elayne Pelz moved that the minutes on-line will not reflect treasury information. The directors agree. The need for a building repair was discussed. Elayne, seconded by Mike Glyer, moved to obtain a contractor to replace the slab on the west side of the building, and make necessary modifications to the door. Up to \$1000 would be authorized for the expenses. The motion passed by voice vote unopposed. Greg Barrett and Ed Green also discussed grading the opening of the door (so-called "emergency exit") on the east side. Ed suggested talking to the neighbor to see if they would agree to let us do it. Joe Zeff volunteered to talk to the east side neighbor about clearing ground for the door opening. The directors discussed the logistics of doing the work on the east side emergency door. They decided to ask the contractor we find for the west side slab to give an estimate on the east side clearance as well.

Archives: Bob Null reported.

Library: Michael Mason said the library is starting to accept donations again after a three-year hiatus.

Emergency Lists: Karl Lembke had made progress on an e-mil list. As a preliminary step, he sent an e-mail to everyone's address that he could find.

LOSCON 28: Elayne said they will be turning over about \$10,000.

LOSCON 29: Tadao is proceeding. The first committee meeting will be after February.

LALACON: Scott Beckstead announced Fan Guest of Honor Eric Hoffman. The Artist Guest of honor is anticipated to be Allison Hershey. The event will be held over the May 5 weekend. (Cinco de Lalacon?)

Bylaws Committee: Karl said it met.

25th Anniversary of Clubhouse: No alternatives having been proposed, Elayne, seconded by Mike Glyer, moved to let Charlie Jackson go ahead with his proposed anniversary event. The motion passed by voice vote unopposed.

City Government: Marty Cantor said there had been a meeting on January 7. The committee is working on getting certified by the city.

New Business: Scott Beckstead and Casey Bernay proposed to hold a one-day comic book and animation mini-expo in the clubhouse on July 27. They requested a \$527 budget for publicity flyers,

supplies, and refreshments, and projected revenue from table rentals, soda sales, and auctions of \$1487. Liz verified the date is open. She also asked where the auction items were coming from and stated the estimated \$500 of sales would be donation credit to the club rather than counted as revenue of the event. Elayne, seconded by Mike Stern, moved to authorize the use of the clubhouse and the proposed \$527 budget. The motion passed by voice vote unopposed.

Marketing Committee: Casey Bernay and Arlene Satin had been appointed by Bill Ellem as a marketing committee. They proposed a sustained marketing plan for the LASFS and its events. They discussed that an anonymous donor offered to match up to \$500 of whatever the club authorized for these purposes. Casey Bernay gave as examples of the committee's help that they would gather standard information on how to submit publicity to the media. They would establish relationships with vendors. next month.

Ed Green asked for money for a slushy fund to feed the Mathom cleanup; we gave him \$100.

The Mid-Town North Hollywood Neighborhood Council is working on getting City certification.

Michael Mason and Liz are delegates to Condor.

Adjourned 12:33, with the next meeting set for Sunday, March 10, 2002.

FANZINES By Ted White

(What you are holding in your hand is a fanzine. That is right-this is that strange critter which is ye ed's main interest in fandom and is the type of thing about which Ted concerns himself in his syndicated column which is pubbed here and in various other clubzines. If you like what I have been producing for you I recommend that you investigate many of the other fanzines about which Ted has written. Those of you who are online can easily find many of these zines at www.efanzines.com.-ed)

Fanzines are a basic part of science fiction fandom, having been in existence as long as fandom itself – the past 70 years. Fanzines are a reflection of many fans' interest in the printed word and amateur publishing. The publication you are reading this in is a fanzine, but a specialized one. A variety of other fanzines are also available – many of them by request – and this column will cover some of them each issue.

All fanzines are published as a hobby and lose money. Their editors appreciate money to defray their expenses and sometimes list single-copy or subscription prices, but they appreciate even more your written response – a Letter of Comment, or LoC. Feedback – better known in fandom as "egoboo" – is what fanzine publishing is all about.

Check out the fanzine below and broaden your participation in

fandom.

SF COMMENTARY #77 (Bruce Gillespie, 59 Keele St., Collingwood VIC 3066, Australia; also available as .PDF files from his e-mail address: gandc@mira.net or from the *e-fanzines* site at http://efanzines.com/SFC/index.html; available for "the usual" – "letters or substantial emails of comment, artistic contributions, articles, reviews, traded publications or review copies [of books]" – or subscription: "\$US30 for 5, or equivalent, airmail; please send folding money, not cheques")

SF Commentary sits at the high end of the "sercon," or serious discussion of SF, group of fanzines, a position it has occupied for many years now. In this *SFC* is following a proud Australian tradition first established by John Bangsund in the mid-'60s with his *Australian SF Review*. Both fanzines engaged SF's literati from throughout the world, and both have offered important venues to some of the major voices in SF criticism, who in turn have written seminal pieces on some of the most important authors to emerge in the field in the second half of the 20th century, starting with Phil Dick and Ursula LeGuin.

What's most impressive about the way Gillespie (now) and Bangsund (then) have accomplished this is that neither gave in to the academic stuffed-shirt navel-gazing which has grown up over the past forty years around SF and all but smothered SF criticism. *SFC* maintains a civilized and literate tone throughout, but draws more upon the British tradition of letters and the ties of fannish community to accomplish its purposes. It is not by accident that Gillespie has long called his editorial in *SFC* "I Must Be Talking To My Friends."

Only a couple of ye ars ago *SFC* celebrated its 30th anniversary with issue #76. That was a monster issue which had been more than half a decade in the making, but #77 is no slouch either, running 84 pages of small (but readably set) type, with color covers on glossy stock.

The issue opens (on page 3) with "Four Reasons for Reading Thomas M. Disch" by the late John Sladek. It is reprinted from a relatively obscure Australian book of essays about SF authors, *The Stellar Gauge*, which was published in 1980. The piece is typical Sladek and deserves the position of honor here.

Gillespie's editorial occupies the next 8 pages and covers a variety of



topics. "Criticanto" offers 10 pages of thoughtful book reviews by Marc Ortlieb, Roslyn K. Gross, Ian Mond, Steve Jeffery and the editor. A 16-page letter column catches up with responses to *SFC* #s 73, 74, 75 and 76 – the oldest letters going back to 1993.

The remaining nearly-half of the issue is taken up with "Scanning in the Nineties: Part 1," all but the introductory first two pages by Colin Steele, who wrote these reviews between 1993 and 1999. Subsequent issues will offer similar "columns" by Gillespie, Alan Stewart, Paul Ewins, Doug Barbour "and a few more." Steele's reviews are grouped by category: Reference & Non-Fiction, Australian SF, Australian Fantasy, Australian Horror, British SF, British Alternative Reality Fiction, British Fantasy, British Horror, American SF, and American Horror. The issue closes with a five-page index (in four columns of small type) – a feature which is truly useful in a fanzine of this sort.

If fanzines which talk about science fiction are your meat, *SFC* belongs at the top of your list.

SSAPA - The APA which starts with a hiss

An Amateur Press Association is a nice, fancy name for something which is really very simple. Contributors just print up the requisite number of identical copies and hand them to the person who collates them with all of the other contributors, handing back collated copies of all of the contributions to all the contributors. Contributors write what they want; but, after the first disty (distribution), the heart of most APAs is the comments one makes to those who contributed to the previous disty. This is a chance to communicate to many friends at once, in writing, at the same time one is honing ones and communication writing skills. All contributors see what you are writing and they can all join into the commenting and fun. And it is, indeed, fun. Many fans have contributed to the same APAs for decades as this is a simple and inexpensive fannish hobby.

So, why did I write (up above) that this is for *almost* everybody? And why is this APA being put out on Second Sunday every month?

There are many fans, mostly those of the younger persuasion, who mostly show up only on Friday evenings and Second Sunday Open Houses for gaming and socializing with their (young) friends.

APA-L is collated every Thursday evening and this day and the weekly periodicity can be a problem for students. LASFAPA is monthly, but most of the current members live in the Barea and are not known to many current LASFS attendees - and that APA is sometimes very, er, adult in its contents; so, for those reasons, it may not be appropriate for younger contributors.

An APA with most of the contributors being of the same social set *may* just be an appropriate forum for those just beginning this fannish experience.

These are the reasons I have decided to start SSAPA, with issue number one slated for the Second Sunday in April. All members (or soon-tobe-members) can contribute to the APA, but the beginning main focus is the younger members who are just expanding their fannish horizons. I expect to be the token Old Phart who gets the show on the road and is there to provide direction and to answer questions and like that.

Below are the few simple rules which will govern how the APA is to be run. These are subject to change if necessary.

- 1. Copy count is not yet set but I will announce it in plenty of time before SSAPA #1 (which will be put out on April 14, 2002).
- 2. Minimum activity for getting copies is 1 page every other month. This will entitle you to get a copy of each disty.
- 3. Cover artists will get copies of the disty on which the cover appears and the next 2 disties.
- 4. At the present time, only those who show up on Fridays and Second Sundays may contribute to SSAPA. Contact me for exceptions.
- 5. Deadline for SSAPA is 2:30 pm on Second Sunday for pre-printed zines, Noon on the same day for those zines which need to be printed: rates are 4 cents per obverse sheet and 2 cents per reverse sheet. The disties will be handed out as soon as they are collated so that the collators can get on with board gaming. If contributors think that they may be late on Second Sunday they can hand me their zines on the previous Friday night.

Please let me know if you are interested by April 5 so that I can set the copy count for issue #1.

LASFS will be at the Los Angeles Times *Festival of Books* at the UCLA campus, April 27-28. We will be at booth 440 and we hope you will drop by and visit us. Free gifts are available to everyone.
