

LASFS Library Donations FAQ

Does the library accept donations?

Yes. Please speak to or write to the librarian before bringing anything in.

What should I do if I have some books I'd like to donate to the LASFS library?

Thanks for thinking of us! Please speak to or write to the librarian before bringing anything in.

I just want to get these books out of my place. What's the worst that could happen if I dump them off here at the clubhouse?

You will cause the librarian added stress and he might break out in oozing hives.

I've been a member since the Eisenhower administration. I chaired Fubarcon 6 times. Furthermore, my roommate's cousin used to date John DeChancie's barber. Can't I just drop off my 67 boxes of books?

The library greatly appreciates your many contributions to fandom. No.

I would like to donate my collection of the complete works of that giant of literature, Dick Logoflattus. Will you put them on the shelves tonight? No. Not all donations will be added to the collection. We might sell them or donate them to someone else. Please speak to or write to the librarian before bringing anything in.

I just made a large donation. Surely the librarian will show gratitude by taking me to the airport/worming my dog/buying me lunch/giving me some free books in return.

Sorry, no, although the LASFS appreciates your generosity.

I saw the librarian putting books in the dumpster!

Donated items with bugs, mold, rodent droppings or other signs of infestation will be discarded. The LASFS generates its own plagues in-house.

What happens to books the library doesn't want?

They may be placed on the sale shelf (see above). They may be donated to Operation Paperback, an organization that sends books to military personnel in Afghanistan and Iraq. They may be distributed to random panhandlers. We regret that we can't offer any guarantees about the eventual disposition of donated items.

Fewer and fewer places accept large donations of books. Many charities and thrift stores will only accept one box at a time. If you know of a specific place that accepts books in quantity, we would very much like to know about it.

Who decides what gets added to the collection?

The librarians do, based on the following criteria:

Do we already have the book? Yes - it goes on the sales shelf.

Does it complete one of our incomplete series? Yes - we keep for the collection.

When was the book published? Very old - probably keep. Very recent? Probably keep.

5 - 10 years old - depends.

Who's the author? A LASFS member or significant other thereof? Keep.

What's the subgenre? We're heavy on military SF of the 90s and early 2000s, light on recent dark fantasy.

Sale shelf

Items that are not being added to the collection (see

above) may be placed on the sale shelf. Items selected for the sale shelf are usually things that, in the librarian's subjective opinion, are likely to sell.

The librarian knows that:

Books can be sold. Former librarians X and Y did things differently. You, your mom, and your 6-toed kitty have an opinion on the disposition of any given book. Books can be mailed at a special rate. You may be right.

In his turn, Charlie Jackson noted the passing of Donald Westlake, who wrote mysteries and was known to a fair number of LASFSians who read mysteries. He also wrote SF under a pseudonym.

The **Menace** from last week were read and accepted as "for once the LASFS members not only have nothing clever to say, but they know it".

Guests: In the absence of a Registrar, Elayne Pelz announced the existence of a guest. Dan Nichols was introduced by Ryan Nichols. They were assured the dangerous ones were usually plainly marked. Unfortunately, you have to be able to see vacuum ultraviolet to read the markings.

Patron Saints: Dan Alderson. Scratch recalled Dan as a sane mad scientist, great guy, whose favorite words were "weep wail." He's missed. Tom Safer recalled Dan as always here, even though he didn't say much, and he was important enough to have a parking space named after him. Joe Zeff stated that Dan wrote down the Alderson Method for elections, which is easy to understand, if you're a computer programmer. Marty Cantor said Dan was friendly with everybody. Professionally, in his community, he worked for JPL. He was the one who designed the Trajectory Monitoring package that was used by JPL. Jerry Pournelle called him an imaginative person. He's reliable, he never promises what he can't deliver, and always delivers on what he promises. Greg Barrett says, Joe is steadfast both as a member of the club and as a friend. He can't think of another member who is more so than Zeff. His friendship is something he cherishes. Mike Thorsen has known Joe since joining the club. He's very imaginative, and has an incredible memory for tiny details and obscure trivia, which he loves to put into his stories and characters. He particularly enjoys trotting out references that no one recognizes. (Charlie Jackson is a challenge.) Glenn Olson met Joe Zeff the first time he came to a meeting. Glenn thought Joe was actually a paid performer for the club, on account of his stupid computer user and other reports. He now misses them. He was furiously shushed by some in attendance, fortunately, without bloodshed.

Joe Zeff answered a question that had arisen earlier: His sacred object is the Sacred Sideburns. He added that most times, he doesn't make the obscure references to stump people, but simply because they amuse him.
