
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#### LUNACON INFORMATION:



## At The Kountains of Kadness by H.F. Lovecraft:::

Inspired by Symmes' pioneering novel Symzonia Poe wrote The Narrative of Arthur Gordon Fym (1837) which trails off as the travellors enter the enigmatic point of approaching a great abyss near the South Pole.

Jules Verne wrote a sequel (The Ice Sphinx, 1900), burroughs referred to "a book written about 1830", hellow-earth cultists have kept up a barrage of Symzonian "non-fiction" that is still unabated... and in 1931 H.F. Lovecraft tried his hand at sequelizing Pym. Like Verne, Lovecraft rejected the hellow-earth element in favor of polar adventure, introducing artifacts and even a few survivors of the ancient aliens who pervade his works. The story is told in typical Lovecraftian fashion, all after the fact, all infused with a post hoc terror and mystery of outlook that belies the "scientific" identity of the narrator, and all quite smothered by a maddening verbosity that makes the book almost unreadable.

#### Beyond the Golden Fire by Allan "ednesten martanut inol was sall . mortalocum!

This book, unlike its predecessor, A Journey to Other Climes (1909) makes much less sense then I would have thought the author to have. Briefly. it is the story of a flight by the author's astrol body beyond the atmosphere of the Earth and to the far reaches of the solar system, where the astral body sees many amazing and interesting things. which it proceeds to tell about with nauseous detail.

The book is a hefty one: 527 pages of smeal type make this a tedious chore to wade through. Further. the at times amusing text in the rrevious book has given way to long passages of verbiage that excite not the slightest bit of interest from me. The book itself is interesting graphically: there are a number of interesting woodcuts or etchings scattered through the text. They serve to illustrate some of the more far-fetched scenes that the author describes. I would say save your money, except that then you will be without the sequel to the first book, and it would break up a set. On second thought, do save your money.
