Think of a number, double it, add six, divide your ansver by two, ${ }^{\text {ake }}$ away the number you first thought of and the result will always be three. Such a simple calculation delights nost children and forms a happy introduction to some simple algebra. I find that such arithmeticalmill sweeteners always seem to go down well so for those who, like me, enjoy playing with numbers I'll run a few of thean here. I olain no oricinality for any of them, but they all. have one thing in coman -- the arithmetic involved is elomentary and shouldn't scare off even the rost mathematically inept reader... and calculators may be used to take the drudgery out of the thing.

Wa more than the multiplication tahle is needed for this first one... wr:te the rumbers 12345679 (notice the 8 is omitted). liow piok any number from 1 to 9 (and this time you can pick 8 if you wish). Fultiply this chosen number by 9 (i.e. if you chose 4, then $4 \times 9$ (ives 36 ) and then take this result and multiply 12345679 by it (in this case, by $\bar{j} 6$. You may , ,or nay not.. be surprised to find that the end product is a string of fours. llad you picked 5 , then $5 x 9$ would give 45 , and 45 tines 123450679 encls up as a line of 5 s and so it, coes. Try it on a calculator to be sure ..and to avoil erros, If you want to see why this happens, just try multiplying the 12345679 by 9 only... and then you can see why using the selected number always comes up at tho end.

Want something a bit easier ? Pry this one for size, frite down any three figurc number, then reverse it...and subtract the lesser number from the creater. Exampae... 345 if reversed, gives 5ty. Take the 345 from 543 ada you will get 198.an number that wis divisible by 9....and any three figure number you try will be the same...i.e. divisibie by ríao, If that isan't enough, try the same trick with four, five, six, or indecd ary number. Reverse and subtract..the result will always divide boferf The reason for that involves some very simple algebra. .but knowing how many people shy away from any expression involving $x$, I'll leave you to try finding it for yourself...it is easy, honest.

Still very simple is the next item. Jot down a threcfigure number, then repeat it...e.g. 246,246. You now have a six fimure nurnber which will be divisible by 7,11 and 13. No ratter how you vary your chosen digits, once you repeat the three, the final result is divisible by 7,11 and 13.
 7 , then divide that answer by 11, and finally divide the answer to that one by 13 . Your final result will bo the original 3 digit number. The hidden catch in this one is that $7 \times 11 \times 13$ will give you 1001 ..and of course if you multiply_that by any 3 disit number, you eet that d number repeted. the basis of an infallible ropilette system) , othe two questions ate $\because \because$ (1) How much money must you put on the 64 thisquares:and (2) What will be the total amount on the board ? Care to try it on paper or calculator before you read on...or how about making a guess.

Once you get to the $2 p$ on the second square, you then progress in powers of 2 . for 63 more squares, so the final total will be $2^{63}$ plus the 19 on the first square. I tried it with logs and also with a calculator and unless I've slipped a cog somewhere, you'll be plonking on that final square, the sum of 9 million, billion pence - and those are Englisil billons. Tollowing on from the above, yet at first glanze, totaljy unconnected, is the question.....f. shopkeeper wished to weigh out any exact number of pounds from 1 to...say 31 lbs. What is the smallest number of weights he must purgrise. . and what weights must they be ? Try worizing it out before reading any further.

The solution follows the same progression as the chess board. He will need the following weights.. $1,2,4,8$, and 16 a total of five weights. Fy judicious selection of these he can get any weight from 1 to 31 inclusive. Had he wanted to weigh up to 63 lbs , one further weight of 321 bs would have been needed. The progressikn would. have bect the same as with the chessboard problem...1, $2,4,8,16,32,64,128,256,512$ and on.

Ihis forms what is called a Fibonacci series after a character. who used to live in Pisa. So what ? Well that innocent string of numbers seems to crop up in the most unusual places...the nuraber of stem diversions astia plant grows seems to follow it closely.as does the posibible number of peffacean a flower oin general, if you count up the petals on a flower the result wize be on or near a Fibonacci number. The sories crops up in genetics.,and even in the ways of arranging coins to form consecutive totals. Dont ask me why this happens, I haven't a clue...but that'a the fascinatingathergot pout playing with numbers. you never know whero you wijl end up... Iike if you work out the ratid between consecutive Fibonacci numbers...the higher the two numbers chosen. . the nearer the fatie approaches the classic Golden Section.

The anthology is an odaitig in the scisence fiction world. Odd. ingofar that the official editorial policy of many publishers is not to pubIish them because they have depmonstrably poorer sales figures than full lingth novels. And yet, anthologies are still being published, not so many as in former years, maybe, but in appreciable numbers. Why ?

As a literary agent who has specialised in anthologies, I hava, my own theory about this. Briefly, I put it down to personal enthusiasms on the part of a small group of people. Said' people have very different azes to grind, havever. Pirstily, the editor himself. He comes in trap main varieties: one, the long-tine fan and collector who has detailed personal knowledge of the good, the bad, and the ugly fn science fiction. ifike Ashioy is the arohetype of this breed of editor. Second, the thristing young publishingexecutive who has any number of contacts Inside the business? Ho may not know a great deal of sf history, but he knows what he likes. More importantly, he is. shilled at offering blandishments to gullible fans, enabIing him to pitck their brains and borrow their collections. I do not need to name this variety - their work is everywhere apparen't." It is oosy to be contemptible of this breed, but such contempt is misplaced The fact. is that the insider.editor ustualy offers a superior package. So far as the reader is concerned, he usually gets value for money. He should: 'insider' anthologies" have uisually been compiled with the help of the most lenowledgeable (and gillible) collestors.

Ask an SF fan to pick the story hes like to see filmed and it's a bi, like putting foto in small $\mathrm{t} \mathrm{y}^{2} \mathrm{~s}$ hand and pointing him in the direction of the nearest toyshop. No SF novel seems beyond the scope of the modern cinema - if the financial backing is there and the writer can envisage it, the model makers and the matte painters can convey it on the soreena. The Cinerascope camera can lie verry convincingly。

The question then: which story?
Bearing in mind the curient remakes of FARENELE MY LOVELY and THE BIG SLAEP, and the current trone towaras SP, it might be a good idea'to film Enic Franik Russell's, THREE TO CONQUER. It's the film I'd like to see anymay. Not a blockbuster maybe, but certainly with good comercial and ainemaita possibilities.
" Ideally, the director I'd choose to handle this one would be Den SeigeI, who made the excellent and under-rated INVASION OF THE BODY STATCHEPS back in 1956, before turning his terse, documentary-style technique bo recording a rather different kind of suburban paranoia with the first of the Dirty Tiarry cycle。

It would be asking alot that fhe film be shot in monochromo and small screen, in order to retain the claustrophobic intensity of the booke. But, as"we 'ro playing 'let's pretend! then okay, let's have it filmed jusk that way.:

Even in this never-never land, though, it would be too muoh to ask that the story woulda!t be tampered with, but that's its beauty. It ra a straight-ahoad, nowfills, thriller; nothing anyóne could do would roally harm its The plot then; to bagin with. The romantic element, almost entirely lacking in the book would have to be developed. 'Moira' would make her appearance carly in the story instead of almost at the ond-and of course would bo abducted by the enemy half-way through. The enemy takos the form of an alion virus whet, possessing no intelligence, of its own, once injectod into a living body, possesses the mind of its victim.

Minch of course doesn't bode woll, for the abducted Moira.
It would make good cinema, though: the telepathic Wade Harper receivos a mental distross call from Moira, and attempts to locate the onomy base-- all the time knowing he's too late. The alienst days are numbered; but the on ly cure for the virus is a drug which reduces the pationt to an imbecilic state.

Some might look on this as an unwelcome returin to the attitudos of the paranoid thirties when the only good alien was a dead one Porsonally, I prefer to regard jt as a sobering note in the present atmosphere of flag-: waving optimism.

Nough of moral issues, anyway; back to more concrete devails. Gasting. . . part; everyone Inows iust what Moira and Wade Harper look Iike.

The unfortunate, truth is, though, that the number of perfectly cast films cound probubly be counted on the firgers of one hand and you'd stilu. have digite nopaining to snap at the rest. Whe onlt thing eertain is that Moira wouldn't appear as liusecllwesoribes her, as small, plump blondes seldoz waize photorenic heroines.

The first actress who springs to mind for the part is leliuda Jillon, who displayed a nice sense of vulnerability tempered with determination in Close Mncounters, and misht not compromise Tussell 's descripticn too much....then again, I've just bean looking through an old PhotopIay, and Britt Eklund, as she appeared in THE MAR WITH THIE GODEI GUIV, might bo just risht; certainly small and blonde, and probably a more likely telopath than Dillon. ((I'm a bit puzaled her. iroira wasn't a telepath in the story...Ed, )) The problem is, she's Britt Elslund.

Then you go to see a Bond film, you know ali the time that you're really coinc to watck Scan Connery -..- it just isn't the eane when another actor plays the role, and that has nothing to co with his ability to act. Pillu actors must be very good at doine nothing at all; they should not enote", Hithcock said. Film actors never do anythine buta display tiny fragments of theix own personality...and if an actress isn't a'loira', then that's unfortunate, but hard luck.
:ate Harper, then ?
Unfortunately. I know just who I'd like to play the part of Harper, 'Uniontunately', because, apant from being totally incoupatible with either of the two actresses mentioned above, Spencer Tracy will be 70 this year...that's if ho's still alivo (something I'in not sure of ) ( (Me isn't. ID)
iif squat man with immense breadth of shouldors, hairy hands and bushy oyebrows"--- he fits Russell's description perfectly-m-I visualised him in the role when I first picked up the book.

Iot, I hasten to add, the Spencer Tracy of all those Pracy-Irepburn Comestic conraies. But ecrtainly the other Spencer Tracy, the darder side of the gian elimpsed in the detormined vigilante figure stalking through Johm Sturges' A BiD Dey AT BLACK ROCK. In that film, Tracy was Wade Harper (ovon lackine aze ara and telepathio powers).

Her Chancellor, Montfalioon euploys robsery, midnap, assassinatiofi and any illegality which serves his end of uphoIdjing the law and peace of the queen's realm. His henchnan, the sadistic Quine, is insulted, so joins a plot to cause terror and distarbance in the palace and country so that Arabia may tane over. Dheoubtediy one of the best Mooricock tales it has been my pieasure to read. Several sub plots are kept moving with none frowing stale. All the scruffiness of Elizabethan Ebgland is kept mainly off-stage to leave more room for the intrioately detajled background. For my money, it is even betier than Aldiss' 'Malacian Tapestry'.
