His magazines, FUTURE S-F, S-F QUARTERLY, and DYNAMIC S-F have shown remarkable improvement lately. While the authors aren't the best available with the funds he has, Lowndes manages to obtain many good stories.

Of the many numerous features, the book reviews are the most interesting, while of the others, there is one dealing with science fiction itself, and not with a connected phase of it, as is most often the case.

-In DYNAMIC, well known fan Robert Madle dis cusses STF in the frank manner you would expect in a fan mag. News of other competetive publishers is freely

given, thereby breaking an old editorial taboo.

In S-F QUARTERLY, equally well known fan Calvin Thomas Beck handles the fanzine reviews. His style is a little rough at the moment, but as it was his first attempt, given a little time his column may well turn into one equally as famous as Rog Phillips much lamented Club House in the old AMAZING.

With these and other radical changes, Lowndes truly deserves the full support of fandom, and if the Double -Action pulps allowed him a larger expense account, the resulting better typography and fiction to be seen would send the magazines sky-rocketing to the top.

### ABOUT NOTHING IN PARTICULAR.

The attendance at the recent Australian Science Fiction Convention held in Sydney (around 85), while being an improvement on the attendance at last year's gathering (around 60), is nothing like the number which could be collected around the banner of science fiction in Australia. In addition, the small number of interstate guests (five) gave a rather thin representation for the fans outside the Sydney area.

The next Australian Convention site is again in Sydney, as decided by the attendees of the recent gethering. The reason for choosing Sydney for the 3rd time being that there were no other fan groups large enough to take on the job of entertaining fifty to a hundred fans over a three day period. However, both Brisbane and Melbourne may probably be putting in a claim for the convention in 1955, if their numbers continue to grow as they have in the past year.

New fans may be curious as to what goes on at a science fiction convention. Perhaps the main attraction is that one gets a chance to meet, or at least see in action, the more prominent fans the will make a speech, or in some way contribute to the gathering.

At the stf conventions in the States, the programme is composed of professional and amateur displays of art work, magazines, books, fanzines, etc., which are exhibited usually at the opening session.

The Americans are lucky in the matter of speakers, in that they have hundreds of topline stf writers, editors, artists, agents, etc. to choose from, many of whom are accomplished speakers in addition to being prominent in the field. The speakers are sometimes serious, sometimes hilarious. Short plays or skits are presented, films are shown; in fact anything which will instruct or entertain, and provide an opportunity for the audience to see coming & well known fans in action. Then of course, there is

In the UK the conventions always seem to be held in London, as contrasted to the US practice of holdingit in a different city each year. The UK conventions are a lot more staid, and would appear to be more under control of the professional section of stf, rather than the fan section.

In Australia, there is an open slather for future programmes in that there is no established tradition to follow. While in Australia there are a few stf authors selling locally and to the States, and there are a number of prominent fans of long standing; there is just not a vast number to choose from.

The need at future conventions will be for speakers and presentations of general interest, well prepared and delivered which will appeal to newcomers and established fans alike. Against this background the more prominent fans and organizations can present their reports, air their views and carry through the necessary business meanwhile consolidating the contacts between organized fandom and the newly discovered reader of science fiction.
