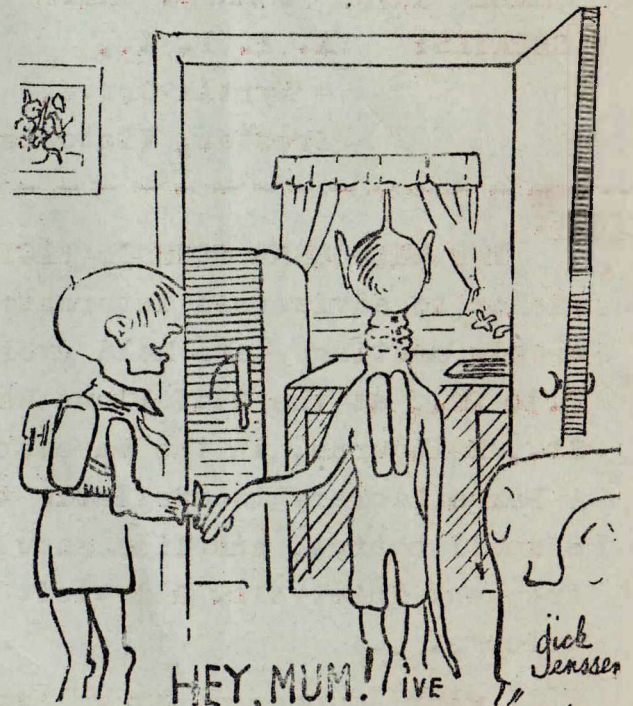

INVADERS OF EARTH. (Groff Conklin anthology in Boards from McGills, priced at 13/3).

WHEREVER YOU MAY BE by James A. Gunn is first class, and points a moral. Never jilt a witch-girl, you may not enjoy the consequences. Also good were SPECIALIST by Robert Sheckley, about an animate spaceship, and NOT FIT FOR CHILDREN by Evelyn E. Smith. Clifford D. Simak's JUNK YARD was good, but disappointingly below his best. A GLEEB FOR EARTH by C. Shaffer was readable, just.

ASTOUNDING SCIENCE FICTION, Oct. 1953. US

Outstanding cover by Kelly Freas, depicting THE GULF BETWEEN by Tom Goodwin, which tells of the disadvantages of having too obedient servants. If you saw a demonstration of levitation, what would you do? Call a psychiatrist of course. You know it is impossible. Isaac Asimov's BELIEF deals with a physicist who is affected with levitation.

In the good bracket are THE SCAVENGERS, by James White, and two articles, George Pal's 'Filming of THE WAR OF THE WORLDS' and 'How To Talk With a Martian' by G. R. Shipman. Lowest rating THE TEST by Ralph Williams. Good enough, but not your reviewers type.

FUTURIAN SOCIETY OF CANBERRA

The inaugural meeting of the Futurian Society of Canberra was held on 8th November, 1953, and was attended by five science fiction fans. Apologies were received from others unable to attend.

Geoffrey R. Bennett was elected Director, and Peter Jones Secretary/Treasurer. Following a brief report by the newly-elected Director, on the organization, constitution and workings of the Futurian Society of Sydney, it was decided to adopt provisionally the constitution of the Sydney Society, mutatis mutandis.

The Canberra Society has formed a library, having received donations from several of those who attended the meeting, as well as from Sydney well-wishers. These donations, together with an initial loan of 20 books and magazines generously made by the Futurian Society of Sydney, will form the nucleus of the Library. Annual fee was fixed at 2/6 (to be increased as the library grows) and borrowing fees at 6d. per book and 3d. per magazine.

The first task of the Society, and one of primary importance, will be to contact stf readers in Canberra. The welcome offer made by the Australasian Science Fiction Society, to print slips for insertion in magazines and books sold locally, was accepted with thanks. It is estimated that 300 to 350 books and magazines are sold locally each month, which gives some indication of the Society's prospects. The Society can be contacted through the Director, at 73 Boldrewood St, Turner (Tel, B608), or the Secretary at 13 Hart St., O'Connor.

We wish to place on record our sincere appreciation of the help we have received. Particularly, we should like to thank Graham Stone, who first suggested the idea of a local society to us; the Melbourne Science Fiction Group, and Laura & Vol Molesworth for the practical help and assistance.

ETHERLINE GOES TO A DIANETICS MEETING

I went along to the Melbourne Dianetics Group meeting on Friday, 13/11/53, conducted by Mr. Hurst.

The meeting was opened by Mr. Hurst with 'a shot of nothing' as Mr. Hurst put it. This consisted of 10 minutes of thinking of nothing. I tried this but couldn't make it. Try it yourself at some time. It's harder than it sounds.

One point which I noticed during this period, was the fact that quite a few people were addicted to periods of yawning, and other signs of severe tiredness. This I put down to mere coincidence, but Mr. Hurst told me later that it was a general reaction to this part.

A further silent period was spent on Duplication, and this, to me at any rate, did not seem to be quite so quiet as the previous test.

Mr. Hurst, in bringing up 'Organic Sensation', asked the gathering to imagine themselves in a series of positions. In this, I noticed that quite a few of those present exhibited feelings of joy, mirth or of general well-being, as they frequently broke out in large smiles.

The thing which impressed me most were the long periods of complete silence, during which the member projected himself into a position suggested by Mr. Hurst. The object of 'Organic Sensation', I learnt later, was to provide the means to obtain a change in the person's outlook by the application of standardised and proved mental therapies.

In conclusion, I would suggest that if you are even slightly interested in Dianetics, then go along to the one of the meetings, and see for yourself what is going on in this young mental science. Dates of all the future meetings, and sites, will be published in these pages.

Out in Melbourne are IMAGINATION UNLIMITED, and MEN OF SPACE AND TIME, both by Bleiler and Dikty, each priced at 10/9. Publishers are Bodley Head. Also out is FOUNDATION by Isaac Asimov, from George Weidenfeld and Nicholson, priced at 13/3, all available at McGill's, while FLYING SAUCERS HAVE LANDED, by Adamski and Leslie, is available at Whitcomb Tombs, priced at 15/6.

Three new editions of URANIA, the Italian Galaxy have arrived. Titles are STAR OF ILL OMEN by Denis Wheatley, CITY AT WORLD'S END by Edmond Hamilton, and HANTISE SUR LE MONDE (Obsession On The Moon) by Jimmy Guieu. All priced at 3/9 each.

Pocket books to arrive include THE TIME MACHINE by H. G. Wells and VOYAGE TO VENUS by C.S. Lewis, both priced at 3/-.

THE MAZE, new 3D stf film, started it's run in Melbourne last Thursday, and a review will be in the next issue of ETHERLINE.

Out in U.K., BRE's of IF, BEYOND and MAGAZINE OF FANTASY AND SCIENCE FICTION, all priced at 1/6 stg. The last mentioned is a composite issue, culled from various editions. The cover is from the Sep. '52 U.S. edition, and mag features MOTHER by Alfred Coppel. Sub rate is 19/6 stg. per 12 issues, but it is not available in Australia.

The long awaited Kenneth Heuer book has just been issued by Victor Gollancz, priced at 8/6 stg. Titled THE END OF THE WORLD, Heuer lists the possible ways in which Earth could be destroyed. Einstein has recommended this one, so it must be good (?)

A new collection of horror stories was seen in Melbourne last week, titled THE DOLL and Others,

it is written by Sarban and published by Peter Davies, priced at 15/6. Also available is a new edition of both LOOKING BACKWARDS by Edward Bellamy from Alvin Redman, priced at 9/6, and THE YOUNG DIANA by M. Corelli, one of the real oldtime rejuvenation yarns, published by Hutchinson, priced at 9/6.

Early next year will see the publication of NIGHTMARES AND OTHER STORIES, a second collection of stories from Bertrand Russell, from Bodley Head, and priced at probably 10/6 stg.

It has been confirmed that the price of the new BRE of ASTOUNDING will be 1/6 stg. The October issue has just arrived, and details are given in full.

BEYOND BRE has started from the first American edition, while the commencing number of IF is as yet unknown. Both these are from the publishers of the BRE of Galaxy, so the format and production will be identical.

The grapevine has it that there will be quite a few pocket books - dozens was the term used - in before the start of December, so it looks as if the space opera fan will have his Christmas reading matter supply ensured.

THE GOLDEN APPLES OF THE SUN by Ray Bradbury, priced at 13/3, and published by Rupert Hart-Davis, is now available in Melbourne. It is made up of 20 stories from the 'slick' magazines. One of them, "April Witch" was recently in ARGOSY.

The latest issue of STARTLING STORIES, BRE, has arrived in Melbourne, priced at 1/3.

Available shortly will be a cheap pocket book edition of SPACE TIME TASK FORCE by Preston Yorke. I hope it is cheaper than the usual run of pocket book for the story itself was nothing out of the box.

This column is just to show you that Tasmania is on the science fiction map even if we have no organized societies. I can assure you all that if any of you are holidaying in Tasmania at any time, you will be assured of a warm welcome from Roy Gregory in Launceston and myself in Hobart. After all, I've acted as tourist agent to Bill Veney, Nick Solnstaff and Warwick Hockley; I am pretty certain the first-named would give you a reference (for what it's worth).

The recent turn-up of an extremely good pre-war sci collection, part of a deceased chap's estate was quite a shock to ardent collectors in Hobart. I never ever knew that Tasmania had a complete set of early AMAZING STORIES, these running from April '26 to the early '30's without a break, and then most others up to '40. The collection sold totalled 220 with some WONDERS, ASTOUNDINGS (quite a few '30-'31 plus '38s) and QUARTERLIES. Don't worry though boys, they have all now been disposed of, though if anyone wants AMAZING STORIES of the latish '30s, Roy Gregory of Launceston will only be too happy to oblige.

As only a small amount of science fiction is to be found in Tasmania, I find ETHERLINE does a very good job in giving me what is available over in Melbourne, and thus gives an idea of what can be ordered there.

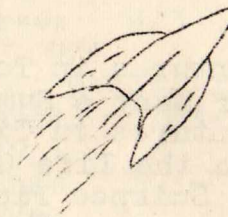
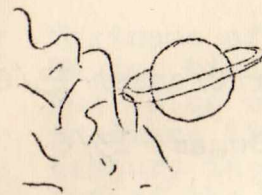
