I would like to take this opportunity to introduce Ray Schaffer, Jnr., who is one of the best-known American fanzine columnists. Ray's column will be as regular as the mails allow, and will deal with nothing in particular and everything in general.

I spent a very enjoyable evening at the GROSVE-NOR THEATRE in Melbourne seeing the delightful Russian fantasy, SADKO. This has to be seen to be believed, as the photography is really something, and the trick sequences are almost impossible to pick. Highly recommended.

The Cover illustration this issue is by Keith McLelland, AFPA's Art Editor, who presents a new twist on an old joke. Interior illustration is by Bryan Roberts, a promising stf artist here in Melbourne.

Over the past twelve months, the publishing of science fiction IN UK has reached a new height, with many good reprints of top American mags and books ... and, unfortunately, some utter rubbish. Still, I think that on the whole, the stf fan has been catered for in an excellent manner, and we can only hope that this year will be even better. The promises of reprints of IF and BEYOND certainly leads one to believe that this will be the case. Only black cloud on the horizon was the strange non-appearance of the NOVA group of mags, with no explanation from the publish -ers. One hopes that they have not finished, as cessation of ANY mag will have a long reaching effect on the balance of publishers. The startling rise AUTHENTIC to one of the top places was very grat -ifying. Keep it up, AUTHENTIC. TJC

MAGAZINE REVIEWS

SCIENCE FICTION PLUS.....Oct., 1953.

Weep your tears of bitterness, my friends, for the Gernsback gem is no longer a slick. With this issue, the mag increases in bulk with the introduction of a heavy paper. But, as editor Moskowitsz hastens to inform us, it is a book paper, and that any good printer will tell you (us) that it actually costs more that the coated stock. Hmm. Anyone want to take him up on that? The reason for the change, avers Mr. Moskowitz, is that the previous stock tended to give an illusion (?) of slenderness to the mag, but the new paper will give it bulk, and, so seem to be more value. Hmm, again. Too bad, though. No half tones, now. (Of course, Mr. Moskowitz assures us that line work techniques are better adapted to stf illustrating than half tone......Nertz.)

Paul has a really magnificent eye-catching cover this issue, illustrating Menzel's article, "Our Atomic Sun", and, boy, that sun sure looks atomic!

Lead novelette is "The Celestial Brake" by Thomas Calvert (Rebirth) McLary. This one would have done well in a 31 AMAZING, but....so help me, I just can't comparing it to the old time Gernsback mag!... in this day and age, it's real hoary. The gimmick is a field of energy, without any weight, size, density or such approaching Earth, and causing it to slow on it's axis. I needn't tell you what that means. Tidal waves and such have a real time before our Hero saves the day, but not the Earth, so to speak. The characterization is creaky, and so is the writing. Pleasant reading, though.

Philip Jose Farmer has another biological short novel, "Strange Compulsion" and it is first rate stf. Some magnificent Finlay illos highlight it,

but don't reproduce too good on the new paper. Two of them are actually spoiled by being buried under print washes of green and red. What price "color" illos? Stick to the line stuff Sam, so that readers can SEE the illos.

Roger Dee's short, "Worlds Within Worlds" has another hoary plot, but handled competently. Eric Frank Russell has a whimsical short "Postscript" that carries a "message", but as usual, one that will be ignored. Jack Williamson offers the "typical" gadget yarn - "Operation Gravity", but does so competently. In a thumbnail sketch, we are informed that Jack's "The Humanoids" is being made into a movie. Good huck Jack, if handled well, it should be worth seeing, as the book was worth reading.

A short-short by Anne McCaffery will turn a few stomachs, or a few eyeballs, as the case may be.

MOVIE REVIEW

SADKO a Sovexportfilm in Sovacolor, starring S. Stolyarov as Sadko, and A. Lareonova as Lyubova. Directed by A. Pkuskilo. Music by Rimsky-Korsakov.

This exquisite film is based on a musical fantasy by Rimsky-Korsakov. Broadly, the story is as follows:

Sadko, an adventurer, lands at his home town of Novgorod, and, after seeing the unhappiness on the faces of his kinsmen, decides to sail off to seek the bird of happiness. The catch is that he has no ships so he approachs the merchants, who rebuff him. He wanders down to the bank of the river, where he meets the daughter od the Tsar of the Ocean. Here the first amazing scene comes, when the girl rises out of e sea. I defy anyone to pick the trick.

Next day, Sadko tells the merchants that he will catch a gold finned fish. They bet him their stock that he will not, but with the help of the girl he catches the fishes, and promptly gives all the poor people clothes. Through the night he realizes that he is no closer to the ships required than before, but the princess comes to his aid once more, filling the small boat he has with gold.

Leaving Lyubova, his sweetheart, he sails off into the unknown, in search of the Bird of Happiness. First landfall is the land of the Vikings, an unhappy looking crew, who promptly attack Sadko and his men.

After thrashing the Vikings, he journeys on to the hotter regions of the middle east, where he hears about the Phoenix, in the possession of the local Prince. He wins the bird in a game of chess, & goes to take it back with him. In the creature's den he discovers it has the body of an eagle and the head of a beautiful woman, who tries to put them to sleep.

He overcomes her, and attempts to leave the palace. But the prince tries to stop them, but the Phoenix puts them all to sleep.

On the way back, a terrific storm comes up, and as the Tsar of the Ocean requires a human sacr-ifice, Sadko leaps overboard. He is transported to the throne of the Tsar, where he meets the Princess, who promises to help him escape. He does so, and returns to his Lyubova, just as the remments of his fleet is coming in, downhearted.

On being asked where the Bird of Happiness is, he informs the populace that happiness is found in the hearts of men, and not as a solid artifact that one can see.

That, then, is the story. Now on to the presentation. I have never seen colouring like Sovacolor. Where Technicolor is garish, Cinecolor is washy, this is the most natural I've ever seen. The photography is absolutely terrific, and gives full scope to the beautiful coloring. In a couple of scenes of the storm, it doesn't need Cinemascope or 3D to give you the feeling of being tossed around like a cork.

The trick sequences are faultless. I defy anyone to pick the dubbing. The English subtitles are unnecessary, in my opinion. They are superfluous to the viewing, as one can follow the story quite easily without them.

I urge everyone to grab some money and race off to the nearest theatre screening this film, and I'm sure it won't be the last time you'll see it.

You know Don, it would be a great thing if it could be obtained for the Con.......

Once again, don't miss it. It's GREAT.

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
