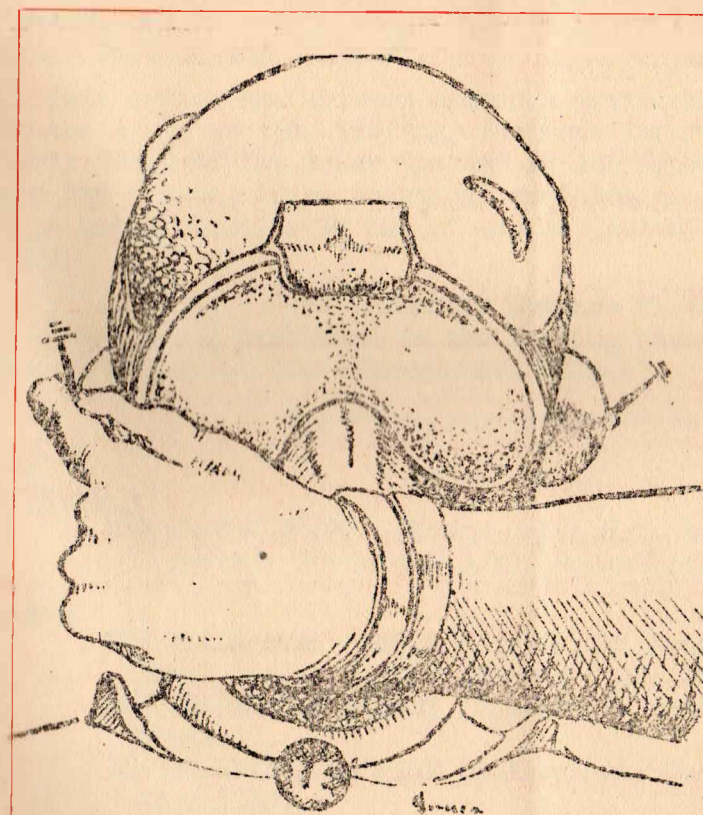

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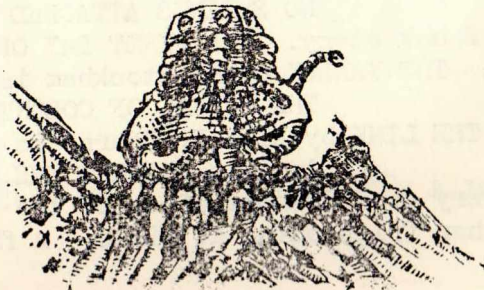
GALAXY SCIENCE FICTION BRE 18.

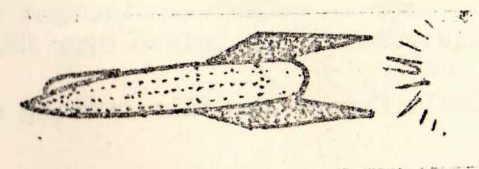

DONOVAN'S BRAIN. Starring Lew Ayres, Gene Evans and Nancy Brodie. Produced by Tom Gries, directed by Felix Herst, screenplay by Felix Herst from novel by Curt Siodmak.

As far as story adaption goes, this is the best stf film yet to appear. Acting and production were obviously on a low budget, but even so, Ayres and company did a really competent job. Sets were excellent, the only thing to not ring true was the aircraft crash in the first few minutes.

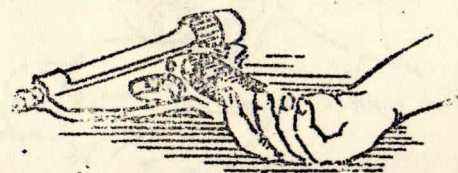
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
