ALIEN VIRUS by John Rackham . A TitBits Novel from McGills at 1/3.

This one continues the 'Fairless' saga begun in JUPITER EQUILATERAL and THE MASTER WEED. An intelligent virus from Titan is introduced into Mars, paralyses the population, and is all set to attack Earth when the counter is developed.

The ending is a noble sacrifice. Don't try to find as association between the cover illo and the story --- there isn't any! As usual, this is value for money.

We've been on Heron for 5 weeks now, and will be here at least two more. The place is perfect for underwater exploring and photography, but we have been unlucky about the weather, and have been able to operate only one day in four. However we've got some excellent material (colour, black-and-white & movie) though we want lots more and are praying it keeps fine.

We've been processing our own coloured shots. using the new Ektschrome (three times as fast as Kodachrome) which I'm fairly sure no one else will have used here yet ... it only came out in the States early in the year.

We've obtained a couple of colour shots of sharks, but Mike had a bit or rotten luck the other day when the camera jammed as he was doing a whole series of shark close-ups over the edge of the reef. A week or so ago he speared a 5-footer which we got back to the boat before it escaped. Then he shot at and missed (luckily) a 10-footer which came right up and stared him in the face.

The best photos we have are a really stunning sequence of a big manta ray. No t unforgettable moment -- when a hundred or so 5-foot barracuda, looking very mean and hungry, spiralled in on me and got to within little more than a yard be fore I reached the boat.

Otherwise there's not much news -- it's just hard slogging and trying to sit out the weather.

We plan to come back to Brisbane around the first week in June, dump the car and fly to Cairns and Thursday Island, so we look forward to at least a brief reunion with the Birsbane Group.

GATEWAY TO THE STARS an anthology compiled by John Carnell, and published by Museum Press. Available from McGills 12/-

This contains 9 stories which previously appeared in NEW WORLDS, AUTHENTIC, SCIENCE FANTASY and FANTASTIC UNIVERSE. They are :- STITCH IN TIME (if time travel is possible the future would be a vegetable patch); OTLY AN ECHO (the blooding of a space warrior); CONSPIRACY (another parallel worlds. fugitives and hunters story); STRANGER FROM SPACE (spaceman lives out Stevenson's epitaph): NEVER ON MARS (first man to land on Mars is proved, scientifically, to be a liar); ASSISTED PASSAGE ( a stranded alien is given passage home, in the seafaring tradition); CIRCUS (a strange menagerie on a far planet): OPERATION EXODUS (a threasened Earth finds a new home, but who is destroyed the process ?).

These topnotch stories are all by British authors. I can recommend the purchase of this book.

HERC'S WALK by Robert Crane, published by Cresset Press at 13/3. Available from McGills

This was originally a serial in Colliers. then a Ballantine book. In the days of InterCos, the successor to UNO, voices from Space are heard. While a struggle for power goes on among the delegates to InterCos, mainly about the launching of a Space platform to orbit around Mars, the Ampiti invaders bomb the world in an arithmetical progression, and seed the waters with a fiery fungus.

The book ends on an open note, the 'Benedict Arnold' is revealed, and a telepathic communication informs the Am piti that Earth is defenceless and peaceloving. The book does not give the Alien's reaction.

THE YEAR OF THE COMET by John Christopher, published by Michael Joseph and available from McGills at 15/6.

This book deals with a future time when Earth will be controlled by the Managerials - Atomics, United Chemicals Genetics etc. Charles Grayer is experimenting with solar power, operating through radio-active diamonds. He is called in by U--C to continue the work of an Israeli scientist, Isaacsohn, presumed dead. He falls falls for an Israeli girl, who disappears, and her father presumably suicides. A fantatical religious sect, spurred by a comet visible, overthrows the managerial system aided by the hero and diamond power.

Christopher rarely writes a bad story, and this

is one of his best. I can thoroughly recommend it.

THE BRIGHT PHOENIX by Harold Mead, published by Michael Joseph , available from McGills at 15/6.

In this, the remnants of civilization, after a holocaust, worships the spirit of man. The Officials 'recondid ion' those who do not conform, and also produce the 'Colonists', a genetically perfect race, who are to repopulate an island.

The New Era is one of non violence (theoretically), but is practically a dictatorship, with thought police and purges. The Colonists have thoughts of grandeur, the Recondit ioneds recover and revolt, and the Islanders defeat the Colonists when they attempt to rule by force.

I would rate this an 'A'.

THE CONQUERED PLACE by Robert Shafer, published by Putnam's, UK available from McGills at 15/6

This is a first novel, and its writing was caused by the bitterness at the complacency at John Q. Public. The story deals with a period when, after an atomic war, much of the Northern Hemisphere is dominated by the 'Enemy' (a Russ-Asia combination). Hal Lorch, a Free Territory Lieutenant is sent to occupied territory to bring out Carroway, a scientist working on a project that could end the war for the side that gets it.

He contacts the Underground, and finds them singularly self centred. So is Carroway, who almost wrecks the escape by his insistence that his family must be saved, then loses half the family due to this insistence.

The writing is good, the story full of suspense, frustration and a bitter view of parochial reactions - even to their disbelief in the proposed atom bombing of the city to create confusion.

This is well worth reading for a second time.

The story is a little unconvincing but quite interesting. The author finds himself more at home in the 3rd part when writing of what we consider the normal way of life.

three entirely different types of people belonging to different age groups, to a land which now and then attaches itself to our world. During the time of attachment, it is possible for people of our world to travel to this land of an almost immortal people.

Inhabiting another section of this land is a more human type of people who are partially ruled by a time --system thus resulting in our achievments. Wars are waged, over - indulgement in food, drink and love is rife. Good reading.

### MALIAN FRESS American Science Fiction

The lead story OF SUCH AS THESE by Irving . Cox Jnr. is a rather unconvincing alien story. The blue skinned Bems conquer the Earth in an endeavour to bring us peace.

Gerald Vance contributes the second story

which is worse than the first. It concerns time travel.
