A new Australian promag was sighted a week ago from Atlas Publications, of Melbourne, who recently reprinted three Hamilton PB's.

This magazine, titled SCIENCE FICTION MONTHLY is the BEST attempt yet at a regular publication, and it is using good quality paper. colored inside illustrations. and full color cover, which, the first time, is a reprint from Gernsback's SCIENCE FICTION PLUS. Most of the stories emanate from this publication also, and are quite high standard.

The size is roughly the same as the 2 recently folded Sydney publications, only 100 pages and selling at 2/-. This price is high, but I think it is better that a mag start at a high price, giving the public fair warning as to the money needed to put a mag out, and if it warrants it later, then the price can be reduced.

This can only happen if the whole of Australian fandom get behind this mag and push as hard as possible.

Also, I hope that the publishers will accept a suggestion or two: Get in contact with the Melbourne fan organization, and obtain help in the selection of stories as did the two Sydney magazines. I know that you only have a certain supply to draw upon, but the surest way to kill a magazine. and especially a science fiction magazine, is to print poor stories.

Who knows, we even might be able to

arrange some for you from America!

A review of the offering in the first issue will be found further on in this issue.

In conclusion, I can only hope that a long time will elapse before this magazine folds, if ever.



This collection contains 16 stories, 8 long reprints, interlarded with 8 little jewels of short stories, not previously published. They alone are worth the money.

The long ones are: PLACET IS A CRAZY PLACE (planet of a Binary system); ETAION SHRDLU (a sentient linotype); ARMA-GEDDON (Satan hates holy water); THE HAT TRICK (an extraterrestrial shows cff); LETTER TO A PHOENIX (Humanity indestructible); THE AN-GELIC ANGLEWORM (a heavenly linotype slips a letter) and THE YEHU-DI PRINCIPLE (catches you nodding).

For those who like the cetailed, but wacky yarn, this collection is a must.

SCIENCE FICTION MONTHLY No. 1

Published by Atlas Publications, Melbourne at 2/-. 98 Pages. Copy from McGills.

With this new Australian magazine, Atlas have improved on the paperbacks which they released recently. The magazine is well produced and bound, and is printed on good quality, smooth paper. It is in all respects, a quality production.

The only criticism to be made concerns the size and price - 2/- for 98 pages as against 2/- for 128 pages in FANTASY & SCIENCE FICTION. Still, we may see bigger issues later, and your reviewer for one would prefer to pay 2/- for a good magazine rather than have it cheaper and fold after a few issues.

The Schomberg cover and most of the contents are from Gernsback's SCIENCE FICTION PLUS, with the balance coming from FANTASY & SC ENCE FICTION.

THE DIMENSIONAL TERROR by Harry Walton deals with he dangers of Klein bottles. Richard Tooker's THE ULTIMAT CITY has future mankind committing suicide from sheer boredom. INCIDENT IN SPACE by Lawrence E. Larkey, the blind must lead the blind.

John Scott Campbell's VIHOLA, is as confusing and involved as the title implies. THE DESRICK ON YANDRO is one of Manly Wade Wellman's 'John' fantasies. No more need be said.

Charles A. Stern's MERCURY BILL AND THE AMOR-OUS HUNK has a meteor falling in love with a space ship. POSTSCRIPT is a moody little piece by Eric Frank Russell. Milton Lesser in A AS IN ANDROID gives us a new method of invasion. Bring on the dancing girls! WORLDS WITHIN WORLDS by Roger Dee. Big fleas have lesser fleas etc.

To Sum up: a good issue - some of the stories

would not have been chosen by your reviewer - but then, he isn't the editor of the magazine.


GALAXY SCIENCE FICTION BRE 28.


