

Impressions of American Fandom by

"The comic book medium, having come of age on the American cultural scene, must measure up to its responsibilities", , says the Code of the Comics Magazine Association of America, Inc ..., beginning its contradictions and refusals to face reality with a vengeance -- for, if the comic book has come of age culturally(!) , children are going to revert to paganism and television; and if it has not 'come of age", the Code's Preamble implies that it would have no responsibilities to measure up to.

The Comics Code, upon whose authority duly censored American comic books are awarded their 'Approved by the Comics Code Authority' seals to assure purchasers of their lily-white purity, was included in a 'Fact Kit' which I received some months ago and which may perhaps still be had from the Comics Magazine Association of America, Inc., 41 Hast 42nd St., New York 17, N.Y. It is a four page leaflet of do's and don'ts and striking commendations -- for example, "Comic Books have also made their contributions in the field of letters and criticism of contemporary life". Could this mean anything but POGO and MAD ?

The Code for Editorial Matter, striving to pull Comic Books from their lofty position in the field of letters, includes in its primer for aspiring censors such gems as 'In every instance good shall triumph over evil and the criminal punished for 'his misdeeds" (which rule, incidentally, violates another: "... wherever possible, good grammar shall be employed"); 'Policemen, judges, government officials and respected institutions shall never be presented in such a way as to create disrespect for established authority" (there goes 'criticism of contemporary life' !); 'Instances of 'Law

enforcement officers dying as a result of a criminal's activities should be discouraged" (But sir, Superman is copyrighted !).

With regard to (CENSORED) type comics: "Scenes dealing with, or instruments associated with walking dead torture, vampires and vampirism, ghouls, cannibalism and werewolfism are prohibited." "...instruments associated with...werewolf ism"... Sorry, Lone Ranger old boy, but it's nickel plated bull ets for you from now on.

The Vonus de Milo bids farewell with "Nudity in any form is prohibited...." And Gina Lollobrigida is declared fantastic with another rule : "Females shall be drawn realistically without exaggeration of any physical qualities." Hempecked husbands are in the same boat (too bad I'm not, if Lollo is in it) with " Divorce shall not be treated humorously nor represented as desirable". "Seduction and rape", we are informed," shall never be shown or suggested." Great Ghu, what comic books have I been missing ? And "the sale of picture postcards, pinups, art studies or any other representation of mude or semi-nude figures is prohibited," along with knives, liquor and tobacco, and a few do zen other classifications which include Hadacol and racing forms.

The Code continues with "All characters shall be depicted in drcss reasonably acce_table to society " ---does this mean the end of spacesuits and coonskin caps ? "If crime is depicted it shall be as a sordid and unpleasant activity! Ah, yes... I know that the million dollar Brink's robbery was really sordid and unpleasant. I never wanted to live the rest of my life on pheasant and champagne, anyway.

So save your pre-1955 comics, boys, because there's going to be a fortune made in 1960.



TOMORROW REVEALED by John Atkins, published by Neville Spearman, & available from McGills at 20/-.

This is a monumental 'history' of the world, up to about 3000 AD or thereabouts. The aficionado will get a lot of amusement from this epic ! Briefly, a man of the future, one of the few who can read, finds a library, and from the contents reconstructs the history of the world and the planets. His source material is taken from Wells, Heinlein, Van Vogt, Lewis, Blish,Wyndham, Deegan, Orwell, Clarke, Gheorghiu, Morris, Ardrey, Shaw,Adamski, Kornbluth, Chesterton, Huxley, Bradbury, Heard, Farjeon,Arlen, Duncan, Leinster, Graves, Stewart and many other contemporary writers, both SF and non SF.

The various stories are skilfully woven 'into an almost believable history, considerable ingenuity and research being evident. The satiric 'misconceptions' are gems, Grable is . a minor diety -- Deegan's stories are 'authentic' etc. Although its a heck of a lot of reading, I enjoyed this thoroughly.

A HANDFUL OF DARKNESS by Philip K. Dick, published by Rich & Cowan and available from AcGills at 13/3.

This is R & C's best to date - a really worth while book. It is a collection of Dick's spine chilling stories, culled from many sources. Some of them are new to me - rare con fession ! Here's the list, with curt comments : COLONY (murderous microscope), LEPOSTER (who is the robot ?), EXFENDABLE (ants in the pants), PLANET FOR TRANSIENTS (man moves himself out - an atom --light flit), FROMINENT AUTHOR (who wrote the Bible ?), THE BUILDER (Hark, the Ark !), THE LITTLE MOVEMENT (little Tin Soldier, what now ?), THE FRESERVING MACHINE (putting bugs to music, and vice -versa), THE IMPOSSIBLE PLANET (a dime's worth of Earth), THE INDEF-ATIGABLE FROG (It's a long climb to nowhere) THE TURNING WHEEL (penicillin vs, Buddhism), UPON THE DULL EARTH (vho is Silvia - and how many is she ?), THE COOKIE LADY (eating is SO exhausting), EX-HIBIT PIECE (get right into your job). Highly recommended.

SALAMANDER WAR by Charles Carr, published by Ward Lock, review copy from publishers, available at McGills at 12/-

In spite of the blurb on the wrapper this is not a fast moving story of conflict. There is conflict, between the pacifists and the normally aggressive remains of the human race on Bel, a far planet with no rotation. The salamanders are entities inhabiting the hot side. The humans from the twilight side commence to mine fissionables in the hot zone. This causes the salamanders to attack. Finally, all the various struggles are resolved. These Ward Lock novels are improving. This one is readable.


