


Who's LATE?

Carse is pushed into Rhiannon's grave, and finds that it is a time flow. His adventures in the civilization that existed on Mars when it was a young, green planet ,



This one left me with mixed feelings, as some of the ideas and gimmicks are humorous, others are good.


Worth reading as an example of that type of fantasy writing that postulates a new kind of world, without really considering the facts of life in that new environment.



"How's about some supper ?"


Ken Quinlem arrived very late, bringing with him a seemingly endless supply of puns and witty sayings.




