
This film has had good reviews in various Australian magazines, and this reviewer, having seen some SF (?) films lately is happy to announce that this one is really worth seeing.,





August meeting of the Brisbane Science Fiction Group was a small one - mainly because a few members were laid a bit low by the 'flu, with even George Tafe sitting up in 'bed, convalescing from it when the others arrived. Present were Betty Tafe (doubling as hostess and nurse), Iris Girvan, Rred Drennan, and Frank Bryning. George was on the mend however, and much of the meeting took place on the threshold of his room. The bed - side manners of Brisbane Groupers would do credit to members of the BM.

Just how stimulating it was for George was demonstrated next evening, for he was well enough to attend, with Fred Drennan and Frank Bryning as guests of the Radio Industries Social Club, a showing of the film, EXPLORING SPACE, produced by Dr. I. M. Levitt of Fols Planetarium, USA.

The film was a very clear and easy-to-follow exposition of rocketry, and included some excellent shots of the V-2, the Viking, the WAC Corporal and other rockets taking off, and a quite long sequence of the surface of the earth receding as seen by the camera carried by a 60-mile high rocket. The audience of radio industry men, hitherto somewhat uninhibited with end-of-the-week exuberance, was held in complete silence by the film. It was obvious that the subject was of absorbing interest to them and this, of course, was gratifying to the Brisbere Group members, to see their pet subject accorded such respect.

After the film, Frank Bryning was asked to speak on the subject of space stations and space travel, on the strength of his notoriety as a writer in the field. He was accorded a similar rapt attention for about forty minutes, and several questions were answered afterwards, so apparently the Brisbane Group's contribution to the evening was well appreciated. A vote of thanks to Frank. George and Fred for attending and contributing to programme was carried and an invitation for another occasion TIME extended to them. This they hope to accept at a later date.

What with this occasion, and the simultaneous presentation in Brisbane of FORBIDDEN PLANET and Walt Disney's MAN IN SPACE, and Robbie the Robot's appearance at the Royal Show, Bris bane is rather more science fiction and space travel conscious than usual at the moment.


MARIUS by Poul Anderson gives us a post World War III future - not quite the usual one but equally as depressing. Asimov contributes an article on planetary atmos-phere.


Cover by Rederson is fair; I'd be interested to learn how the pilot of the rocket landed there, however.

American International have started casting for their upcoming production of THE AMAZING COLOSSAL MAN. First player signed is Cathy Downs as the femme lead.

William Alland's THE LAND UNKNOWN, a Universal release in CinemaScope has opened to good reviews. It stars Shawn Smith and Jock Mahoney, and is set in the Antarctic, where a smashed helicopter crew find a 'oasis' of land in the ice, with creatures of the Mesozoic age flitting around.

Conversely, the Sam Katzman/Columbia film, THE NIGHT THE WORLD EXPLODED opened to bad reviews.

Roger Corman's next for American International release will be VIKING WOMAN and with a budget of over \$ 300,000, it will be his most ambitious venture to date. Jack Rabin and Irving Block are set for the special effects.

Trying out for possible Broadway production is THE CIRCUS OF DR. LAO, based on the book by Charles Finney, adapted by Gwyn Conger and Nathaniel Benchley, starring Burgess Meredith.

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
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THREE TO CONQUER ERIC FRANK RUSSELL

Published by Dennis Dobson, London. Available from McGills at 15/6.

This appeared originally as a 3 part serial in ASTOUNDING, titled CALL HIM DEAD. Telepath. Wade Harper - micro forger, is present at the death of a State Trooper, shot down by three men in unfamiliar uniforms. Though under suspicion, he does some detective work, in the course of which he kills a girl, explaining that she had been taken over by an intelligent alien life form. Finally convincing the FBI, that their first expedtion to Venus had returned with the crew under control of the alien, the rest of the story deals with his efforts to track down the 3 crewmembers, now 'hosts' to the life forms.

This is a fast moving story of the 'chase' type, and well worth reading.

This is an extremely interesting combination of an historical novel and a fast moving mystery, the

link being temporal transfer. Carr has penned two others of this type, THE DEVIL IN VELVET and THE BURNING COURT.

John Chevict, Superintendent of Scotland Yard's C.I. Division, abruptly finds himself transferred 'to Old Scotland Yard at the time of the creation of the first police force.

He applies for a position and is made Superintendent of ohe of the new police divisions. He investigates the theft of birdseed from parrots, a murder is committed, he is challenged to a duel and comes up with an ingenious solution to the murder only just in time to prevent being arrested for the crime.

Recommended as a fantasy or a mystery






Hollywood didn't think much of the Brit -

ish entry, X THE UNKNOWN starring Dean Jagger, as it was panned by all and sundry.


