



Someone in the crowd risked a cheer. Von


Rasselov stood temporarily stunned. But it was only temporarily.


"Seize and hold him !"

LEADING MAN by Lloyd Biggle Jnr. is a way to cure the mentally deluded. Better than average. SHOCK TROOP by Daniel Galouye is about the best in the issue. It concerns a $r_{\rm a}ce$ of microscopic aliens who choose the wrong place to live.

More meticulously presented anticoology by

Willy Ley completes what is generally a poor issue.







Starring and narrated by Raymond Burr.


Strangely enough, this one has no credits at all listed, but it is a Japanese production with only the principle leads speaking English.
