


Nova Publications have announced

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the publication of a new magazine, SCIENCE FICTION ADVENTURES, to be issued in London on February 14th, on a bi-monthly schedule at 2/- stg. As indicated by the title, the emphasis will be on the adventure type of fiction, and the lineup for the 1st issue include C. M. Kornbluth and Algis Budrys. It is not yet known whether the magazine is original material, or whether it is a reprint of the US magazine of the same name. However, I would think it would be a reprint. This gives editor Carnell the honour of heading the largest chain of SF magazines in the world, as no US company, as far as can be ascertained, issues 3 magazines. Hany, of course, issue two, but none as yet have taken the plunge upward.

Faber and Faber seem to have usurped the mantle of 'leading SF book publisher in U.K.' from Michael Joseph. Fabers have just announced that they will issue the following during the English Spring/Summer period:

NON-STOP by Brian W. Aldiss at 15/- stg. BEST s f THREE edited by Edmund Crispin at 15/-STRANGERS IN THE UNIVERSE by Clifford D. Simak at

15/- stg.

In addition, they will issue paper back versions of BEST sf 1, edited by Crispin, and LORD OF THE FLIES by William Golding, at 6/- each. It is gratifying to note the issue of BEST sf 3, as there is a need for a good anthology, since the demise of the Grayson BEST... series.

Issued in London in December was C. M. Kornbluth's CHRISTMAS EVE as a Digit Book at 2/- stg. A very neat bit of timing, it is now available from local booksellers.

In a letter from Renown Publications publisher Leo Margulies, it is stated that an Australian edition of his SHORT STORIES MAGAZINE will be issued shortly. This magazine uses one SF and one fantasy story per issue, and this practice will continue in the ANE. In addition, a story reprinted out of the old WEIRD TALES is used in each issue, so it worth watching.

Two new pocket books announced from U.K. publishers are THE TWENTY SEVENTH DAY by John Mantley from Beacon Books in April and JOURNEY INTO SPACE by Charles Chilton, from Pan in February, both at 2/- stg.

Cn the film fron, John Christophers THE DEATH OF GRASS, to be filmed under the title of NO BLADE OF GRASS, has been handed to producer Laurence Weingarten as one of his chores for Avon Productions this year. MGM will release.

The title of the new Blish magazine has been announced as VANGUAND SCIENCE FICTION - a bad choice, if I may say so, in view of Sputnik. Maybe they should change the name..... Listed as bi-monthly, it will have book reviews by Lester del Rey, and an article by L. Sprague de Camp in each issue. On the American book front, the fol-

Russell from Avalon at \$2.75; THOSE IDIO'S FROM EARTH . a coll-ection of 10 shorts by Richard Wilson from Ballantine at 35c ; whilst due out this month are: THE END OF ETHENITY by Isaac Asi-mov from New American at 35c; EARTHLIGHT by A. C. Clarke from

Ballantine at 35c; SATELLITE E.ONE by J. L. Castle from Bantam at 35c and CHILDREN OF THE ATOM by Wilmar Shiras from Avon at 35c.

The US firm of Crest Books has bought the reprint rights to Jules Verne's two stories, FROM EARTH TO THE MOON and ROUND THE MOON. They plan to issue both novelettes as one book at 35c. A motion picture tie-up with the forthcoming Benedict Bogeaus production of the two Verne stories due to go into production shortly, will follow.

Ace Books, specialists in SF, report that their SF titles have taken a 400 to 500% upsurge in sales following on the launching of Sputnik. Latest title is the factual EARTH SATELLITES AND THE RACE FOR SPACE SUPERIORITY, Latest out from Gold Medal is

THREE TLIES EFFINITY, anthology edited by Leo Margulies at 35c, whilst Avon issued C. S. Lewis' THE TORTURE PLANET, a retitling of THAT HIDEOUS STRENGTH at 35c.


The latest Leonard Wibberly to be issued in U.K. is McGILLICUDDY McGOTHAM, out from . Robert Hale last month at 10/6 stg.

The latest offering in Michael Joseph's 'Novels of Tomorrow' will be Isaac Asimov's THE NAKED SUM, due out shortly at 12/6 stg. It is to be hoped that this is only the first of many more to come from this once prolific house. Re the announcement of the new Nova magazine. Since writing that, word has come through that the mag will be a reprint of the American mag of the same name edited by Larry Shaw.

Another 'new' magazine has appeared, this time a reprint of PLANET STORIES. No date, number or contents, the issue starts on the inside front cover ! The first issue features SHANNACH THE LAST by Leigh Brackett. The publishers are some obscure house in England. I

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

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STRANGE EVIL by Jane Gaskell, published by Hutchison & Co. Lon - d.n at 15/6 aust., available at McGills.

Jane Gaskell, so the publishers claim, was only 14 when she wrote this novel. Why this is supposed to startle us I cannot'say; for though many parts of the book are precocious in the extreme, many parts are disturbingly naive. Naivety and precocity struggle for possession of the book and to say that precocity wins is to pay tribute to Jane Gaskell's 'instinctive literary skill.

The story is simple: Judith, a model, discovers that her cousin and her cousin's fiancee are life sized fairies. They take her with them to their country, where a bitter struggle between Good (the Externals (!)) and Evil (the Internals) is in progress. Hero of this materialistic feud is Judith's would -be lover, named, in a moment of Freudian pseudo-smartness, Enaj !

Too inexperienced in writing to make the story fully plausible, Jane Gaskell astounds by her faculty for creating atmosphere. She shows condiderable promise, and if she continues to write, could develop into a major novelist.

STRANGE EVIL remains, however, only what its publishers intended - a mere literary curiosity: but even so, eminently readable for all those interested in fantasy.

British author Charles Eric Maine has struck the jackpot once more with HIGH VACUUM which has been purchased for filming here in Hollywood. Previously, he has had TIMELINER, SPACEWAYS and THE ISO-TOPE MAN filmed, whilst ESCAPEMENT is currently being filmed in UK as THE DREAM MACHINE, and CRISIS 2000 has been sold to films. Not a bad record !

Amongst the big ones coming out are MANANA from the Bradbury story 'And the Rock Cried Out', THE VILLAGE OF THE DAMNED from John Wyndham's 'The Midwich Cuckoos', THE NIGHT CREATURES based on Richard Matheson's 'I Am Legend', ON THE BEACH from the novel of the same name by Nevil Shute and John Cristopher's NO BLADE OF GRASS. Watch for these: they are really good ones!

Cashing in on Sputnik, the film studios are about to overwhelm us with tasty little trifles like ESCAPE VELOCITY; EYSTERIOUS SATELLITE; THIRD BARRIER; RUNAWAY SAT-ELLITE; WAR OF THE SATELLITES and similar offerings.

Recently sold to film was Frank Herbert(s THE DRAGON IN THE SEA, and is scheduled for a big budget production. George Pal, currently shooting TOM THUMB in England, will release this one shortly through MGM.

Well known author Jerome Bixby has scripted IT for Peerless Productions, as well as selling CURSE OF THE FACELESS MAN to Ed Small.



We wish to offer our condolences to Graham Lycll on the recent death of his father. We extend our sympathy to Lirs. Lycll also.


