



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The new faces for 1958 are STAR SF, VANGUARD SF and two borderline things titled SPACE JOURNAL and TRUE SPACE SECRETS. Undoubtedly STAR wins some kind of award for the most atrocious format ever conceived in SF's history to date, aside of WORLDS: yet, amazingly, Fred Pohl, a dyed-in-the-wool fan turned pro is editor ! On the latter's heels, VANGUARD treads along . unillustrated inside, unostentatious, unassuming and, like most 'offerings' of recent years, totally unimportant. SPACE JOURNAL in an interesting and promising item which merits much attention though it's first issue had some amateurish signs, the 2nd and 3rd surpass each other. The idea behind journal is interesting: an attempt to bridge science and fiction in one package, yet remain palatable to arm-chair scientist and fan alike. It's printed on 1st quality slick paper and has a mature, neat a pearance though barely in it's 3rd month.

SPACE SECRETS is hard to categorize at first breath. Utilizing the "expose" mag approach atypical of such slush as HUSH HUSH, the old CONFIDENTIAL, SUPPRESSED, ad nauseaum, it's also struggling to show signs of quality along lines of earlier COLLIERS' and later LHFE space series of several years ago, also reaching out for the ouija board-lunatic fringe set as SEMECH, FATE and TRUE STRANGE do. SPACE SECRETS unfortunately missed the boat from being a potential 'best seller' with reported lousy sales around the country and mostly because nost of its alleged 'fact' articles are phonies, and what doesn't sound phony,

is old, worn out stuff. The main reason for such problems: the people behind STCRETS are totally inexpert, unknown in the SFantasy field, and obvious neophytes to publishing or editing, despite a command of potentially good material of much artwork.

STAR and VANGUARD, by the way, are digest size, JOHRNAL and

SECRETS are large size (8" x 11").

Even if the greatest SF may ever devised were born, it's chance of success would be dubhous under the present distributing conditions in the States. Distributors, especially in the key mag market, New York City, always were at opposite ends with most publishers in the past, difficult most of the time, impossible whenever a new publisher would get caught in their nets. How, the situation is unspeakable for the most part - open warfare between one distributor and another, and every other publisher, exists, and pandemonium is rife. How no blood has been shed so far, is beyond me. As a result, many publishers have resorted to distributing their cwm mags themselves, which is a most tedious task for people who are better geared to editorial routine than driving

wagons or lorries from one news-stand to another.

Though the mag situation (SF or not) is presently abominable SFantasy has virtually conquered a huge chunk of two titans of industry: Television and the cinemagical world! Those reaching TV were made primarily prior to '52, therefore are at times of higher calibre than what comes currently through theatres, i.e. I WAS A TEENAGE WEREWOLF, ditto FRANKENSTEIN (and more to some). On meanwh le. SFantasy and horror films (usually the latter) consider all opposition liquidated on other channels when their hour arrives. As a result of their tremendous popularity - overnight, almost, TV stations resemble veritable back numbers of early weard Morror magazines sprung to life, complete with ghoulish, menacing M.C.'s even. One station in N.Y.C. for example, (channel 7 of American Broadcasting Co) has expanded its series called SHOCK THEATRE from 3 times weekly to every night of the week (but for Sunday eves, featuring 'other' movies). Another nearby station in Connecticut uses similar films nightly. And so it goes, checked, snowballing in its overwhelming potency all over the naff III

tion. Some of the best have appeared to date, too: nearly all the FRANKENSTEIN films, starting with the original of 1930; DRACULA; the MUMIN scries, including the sensational first film, THE MUMIN, vintage 1932.

According to one of the top officers of a leading SF club, too many has-beens, would-be's and so-called 'pros' are using fan organizations for their own self-aggrandizement and for other devious reasons...as a result.." the effect on fandom is such that a full scale revolt is brewing in the mid-west clubs." This top officer, I'll vouch, is not me, but a party living some 550 miles away. His report is well founded however, and is basically emphasizing many grievances that have been a paramount reason for bad blood and notorious feuds in the past. Quite likely therefore, the SFannish password for '58-59 will be: BEWARE OF PROS-TURNED-FANS! or BEWARE OF PROS BEARING GIFTS!



Inside, the issue is notable for 2 things. There is a first rate novellette by Ted Tubb, THE TCUCH OF REALITY, and this is illustrated by a magnificant two-page picture drawn by Martin Frew. These are worth the two shillings themselves.

Also pleasing to see is an illus - tration by Gerard Quinn. Is long as NEBULA has artists like Tur-

ner, Frew and Quinn, let us hope they continue to include interior artwork which, for my money, makes all the difference to a magazine.

The remaining stories are fair, but noth -

There are two articles and three features

to round off a good issue of a good magazine.

The quality of NEBULA has, I think, fallen since it went monthly, but not far enough to hurt. There seems to be a lull in SF in Britain, which is affecting both books and magazines alike. Let us hope it is soon over.

ITY, a sequel to his 'Criffle Shaped' . Quite good.


Demons and humans are the protagonists used
