

From this point forward, the mailings have remained on the same Feb/May/Aug/Nev schedule. The few oddities that exist, such as the "Miniature Mailing," which was a group postmailing to the 42d mailing, will be noted on the index of that mailing.

To calculate the date of any mailing, divide the number of the mailing by 4 and add 37 to the result. This gives the base year. If the remainder of the division was a zero, it's the August mailing of the base year; if a one, the November mailing; if a two, the February mailing of the following year, and if a three, the May mailing. For example, 87 - 4 = 21, remainder 3. 21+37=58. Remainder 3 = May mailing of following year. Hence, mailing 67 was the May 1959 mailing.

Obviously the feregoing formula is valid only from mailing 42 forward, although it is generally valid from the first mailing—the werst case error is only two months.

THE FIRST YEAR

FAPA's first year was one of rapidly increasing membership as a result of vigorous recruitment; of hit-or-miss mailing dates; of searching for what a FAPA magazine should be; of political pamphle-teering; and of violent personal arguements stemming basically from either world politics of the time or the real or assumed immaturity of the participants.

By agreement of the founders--Wollheim and Michel--the first officers were self-appointed. Following the second mailing, an election was held. There is thus a long list of officers for the first year:

First mailing: President, Donald A. Wollheim; Vice-President, Dan McPhail; Secretary-Treasurer, William H. Miller, Jr; Official Editor, John B. Michel.

Second mailing: Miller resigned office, Wollheim assumed his duties.

Third and fourth mailings: President, Donald A. Wollheim; Vice-President, Dan McPhail; Secretary-Treasurer, John V. Baltadonis; Official Editor, Frederik Pohl. Additionally, Pohl with Wollheim's concent appointed Michel as "Mailing Manager" to actually get out the mailings.

Per The F.A.P.A. Fan, there should have been a ballot in this mailing. There must have been, since there was an election. No indexer or reviewer mentions it.

Zenith Foundation is indexed only by Shaw. Speer, in Sisyphos in the 92nd mailing, implies FAPA distribution. Reviews in the early mailings (and there was little in the way of mailing comments then) do not mention it. Shaw does not list it as a postmailing—that's my assumption.

Galaxy was probably the first FAPA postmailing.

THE THIRD MAILING--SPRING (MARCH-APRIL?) 1938

This mailing was sent out in two sections due to its size. It wasn't that large by today's standards, but it was larger than the first two mailings. The "A's" and "B's" below designate the sections. The division of the mailing into sections was apparently arbitrary.

Shaw indexed a postmailed "bellot for elections" to this mailing. Since there were no elections, this may have been the ballot for the second mailing.

Foo, Like the Zenith Foundation, causes indexing problems. At least Shaw and Ellik agree that it exists. A Speer comment in the fifth mailing implies that Foo was postmailed to F4. Years later (c.1950+) Speer cites this as "Morals and Dogma of Foo," but I cannot find that useage at the time. I've never seen the magazine.

There were three issues of Solor. I changed the listing style to conserve space which I'm now using up by talking about it.

THE SECOND YEAR

The first year had really been a remarkable success. Four mailings had been produced, membership had grown close to the limit of fifty, elections had been held. In the second year the mailings started to get fatter and the Fapazine started taking form. The politics—internal and external—continued, as did the feuds, charges of election irregularities, attempts to form power groups within and outside of FAPA, and the rest. In those days there was no secret master of fandom—or, if there was, his control was exercised like that of another Master.

Elected to office for FAPA's second year of operations were:
President--John B. Michel
Vice-President--Robert W. Lowndes
Secretary-Treasurer--James V. Taurasi
Official Editor--Donald A. Wollheim

This slate lasted out the fifth and the "emergency" mailings (which is considered a sub-part of the fifth mailing). Information on changes in officials will be noted as part of the mailing in which the change occurred or was announced.

THE EMERGENCY MAILING--OCTOBER 1938 (Coded F5E in this index)

This was probably actually mailed in November. Its purpose was to announce the resignation of several officers; First, VP Lowndes. Michel appointed Wiggins to the vacancy. Second, President Michel. Wiggins automatically became President. Third, OE Wollheim. More on the new officers under the sixth mailing, when they actually took office.

This mailing went out in two sections. The second section consisted of Democracy in Danger, Paths of Glory, Solor II 5, and one other item of which I'm not sure. This has caused some confusion in other indexes of this mailing, but I think the list that follows is correct.

Both Coslet and McPhail indicated that Galaxy might have been postmailed.

The officers at the time of this sixth mailing were--P - Wiggins; VP - Walter E. Marconette; ST - Taurasi; and OE - Milton A. Rothman.

THE SEVENTH MAILING -- MARCH 1939

The same officials remained in office! Could they finish out FAPA's second year? It wasn't to be. In the postmailed "Dear Member..." Madle announced that Rothman had been called to Washington and Madle would handle the eighth mailing.

THE EIGHTH MAILING--JUNE 1939

The masthead of the FA still carried Rothman as Editor, but Madle and Agnew actually put the mailing out. The situation was similar to the "Mailing Manager" appointment of the prior year, except that the approval of the President was not obtained. On July 11, VP Marconette ruled that since Rothman had not resigned he was still OE, and that "Mr. Rothman had no constitutional right to impart his power in whole or in part, to anyone."

There were two ballots. The first set, mailed June 14th by Taurasi, were declared invalid since they had been sent to all members rather than just the active members. The second set was mailed in mid-July by Wiggins.

Shaw indexes a postmailed Constitution and an item, "Messieurs et mesdames..." I find no confirmation in other sources. Shaw also lists "Nova" as "A Nova Burst's," which is the heading of the second sheet. The second sheet was also the only sheet I owned for some time, only later acquiring what appears to be the FAPA set--cover, contents page, and flyer.

Phantasy Press is indexed by McPhail in the ninth mailing, while Speer, in the ninth mailing, cites this as a postmailing to the eighth, then qualifies it as a pre-mailing to the ninth. In the combined mailing (10-11) the official critic's report reviews it with the eighth. So be it!

I should mention that, at that time, there was no agreement on mailing numbers. In general, references at the time will be one number higher than the mailing number I give. I've seen 3A and 3B counted as separate mailings, with 5E ignored entirely, but I believe that in most cases 5E was counted as 6, thus throwing off the count. The combined mailing (10-11) resolves the discrepancy. This, by the way, is not my invention—Shaw's index used the same scheme, and 10-11 was announced at the time as a double mailing.

THE THIRD YEAR

"The F.A.P.A. is in a mess. The worst mess it has ever been in." Those are the opening words of President Rothman's message in the FA for the ninth mailing. Milty might not have been so cheerful had he known what the year had in store.

Both sets of ballots to the eighth mailing were questioned. The announced winners, under the second ballot, were--

President - Rothman Veep - Speer Sec-Treas - Madle
OE - Marconette

In the Fall of 39, Speer took a poll of members present at: the Philco and contacted by mail members not present. Results confirmed second ballot results. However, throughout the year, Speer and Rothman considered themselves as caretakers, "acting" officers. They clearly saved FAPA in this trying year.

The trials for this year were the quasi-official status of the slate of officers; the difficulty of obtaining FAPA funds and prior records from the former Secretary-Treasurer (finally obtained in February 1940 by Rothman (and Perdue) in a trip to New York for that purpose; sending out the first mailing without funds or a good membership list; the resignation of Marconette following that mailing--apparently Marconette had never filed for office, and his name was placed on the ballot without his knowledge; the enforced missing of the November-December mailing due to the fund/record situation; and finally Agnew's failure to send out the June mailing-which led to the famed Blitzkrieg by Rothman, Speer and Perdue. Agnew had been appointed OE following Marconette's resignation.

Speer, in the 92nd mailing, mentioned that this "To Members..." note of 15 Dec might have been an intermailing. At least half of the extra bundles for mailing 10-11 had this item, so I very much doubt that it was mailed separately by Speer.

This was the Blitzkrieg mailing. Although Agnew was OE, the mailing was actually put out by Rothman, Speer and Perdue. A glorious way to end a troubled year!

THE FOURTH YEAR

"What we should fight for most, this year, is <u>mailings on time</u>" says President Tucker in the FA for the 13th mailing. This was achieved, and with it came stability. At last FAPA could settle down to a routine and reliable existence. I'll have fewer historical notes from this point forward.

Elected officials for the fourth year (July 1940 - June 1941) were--

President - Tucker Sec-Treas - Rothman Veep - Warner OE - Perdue

Also adopted at this time was a new FAPA constitution. With this, which helped remove some prior ambiguities, with Rothman to straighten out the membership books, and with a slate of officers who had little interest in fannish feuding, a FAPA identity had a better chance to emerge.

An incidental comment--since I don't want to start the next mailing on this page--is that I've never seen proper recognition of Perdue's role. While not a prime mover, he seemed to be around when a helping hand was needed.

Electron, Polaris, and Sardonyx are indexed by Shaw but did not appear in the Ellik index and are not in my own collection. All other items appear in at least two of the three collections or indexes. The 14th was, unfortunately, the last mailing indexed by Ellik. My mailings 10-18 have passed through several nands, but if memory serves they're the bound Tucker mailings, bought by Norm Stanley at Philadelphia in 47 and later somehow acquired by me, probably courtesy of Chauvenet.

The Futurians, whose activity had been notably absent from FAPA, suddenly showed up with a number of magazines. I'm missing the ballot for that mailing and don't know who was running for office, but a quick glance at the mailing shows Lowndes was running for President, Wollheim for Veep. The election pitch was strict constitutional interpretation and Turn the Rascals Out. Admittedly I just glanced over this material in the process of typing this note, but I'm left wondering if they knew that Speer had not held an elective office during this fourth year of FAPA.
