President's Report

The duties of the President are limited to directing the affairs of the organization; appointing members to vacated offices; appointing the teller for the annual election; and whatever else is necessary to keep things running. Nothing has occurred requiring action.

Receipt is acknowledged of a carbon copy of a letter from a member to the secretary-treasurer, with a footnote to Perdue stating that no action is requested at this time.

Although this is not official business, Perdue would like to express his concern about former member Stan Woolston. There exists an organization — the Petards — that meets monthly at member's homes and elsewhere. Their meeting for January was held on the 25th at 11513 Burbank Boulevard. Attending were FAPA members Burbee, Cantor, Cox, Moffatt, Pelz, Perdue; and former members Cyrus B. Condra and Milt Stevens. Burbee was to pick up Stan Woolston at his home in Garden Grove, some thirty or forty miles away. Burbee arrived perhaps an hour late, with a six pack and without Woolston.

Burbee had gotten lost; had called for directions; and was driving along Burbank Boulevard maybe five blocks away when Woolston insisted that he was going the wrong way and demanded that he be let out of the car. Burbee tried to point out that the street numbers were increasing in size. Woolston, whose hearing is getting quite bad, kept shouting "Let me out!" so Burbee, rather than face kidnap, complied.

We watched for Woolston for maybe half an hour; then Len Moffatt took his car and made unsuccessful search for Stan Woolston. Burbee left at maybe 10:30, and also looked for Woolston before going home. As of February 2, 1986. Stan Woolston has not returned to his home in Garden Grove.

His disappearance had been reported to the police in Los Angeles (Perdue believes that former member Milt Stevens is still on the police force) and to the police in Garden Grove, an incorporated community which is home to both Burbee and Woolston.

Burbank Boulevard is a heavily-traveled section line street, well lighted, and primarily developed with mixed business and apartment house uses. We prefer not to think of muggings. Burbee recalls that Woolston had a head injury not too many years ago, and hopes that it is simple amnesia.

Official Editor's Report

Enclosed in the FA is the Egoboo Poll Ballot. Please show your appreciation of other people's work in FAPA and fill out whatever part of hte poll you can.

Expenses for last mailing were back up again due since we were not able to repeat our special courier service to Australia. However, we do continue to have income (dues plus stock sales) just cover costs (mailing expenses), so FAPA is doing fine financially.

The meaning of "tentative" on the ToC is for zines that I have been told will be delivered at collation or know were in the mail in time to arrive. Essentially it means that when I type the ToC late Friday night that it is a zine not in hand and could potentially not appear in the mailing. If you are worried that your zine may be postal delayed, drop me a note or call and I will consider holding the mailing a day extra if convenient (no guarantees). If a zine is delivered on collation day without my being told or manages to appear before I seal up the envelopes, it will still go into the mailing but not be listed in the ToC. If you call about a zine being sent, tell me title and number of pages (for the ToC).

Once again I remind people to please send at least 68 copies and preferably a couple more to make the collators' life easier. I consistently make use of at least one extra copy each time to replace destroyed or lost copies in the mail. Please remember that the Sec.-Treas. can not count for renewal credentials any zine that sent 65 instead of 68 copies.

I will mention again that any mail sent via the postal service (including express mail) should go to the PO Box. Only use my street address for mail that requires one (such as UPS) and keep in mind there will be at least a day's delay as I have to leave my signature on the door after receiving first notice. The problem is that I am not home during usual mail delivery times. I always try to leave my signature on the door on Fridays before the deadline but there have been occasions when I forget or the UPS person misses it. I can use the same procedure with Federal Express but warn me in advance if arriving on Friday or Saturday. If you use the Post Office Express Mail, try to mail by Thursday. The station my PO Box is at will not deliver mail on Saturday that requires a signature (or packages bigger than my PO Box which fortunately is large enough to hold 10"x13" envelopes flat and 6" high), though I do get regular mail in the morning. If desperate, though not recommended, you can Express Mail on Friday before deadline to my residence address but you do run the risk of my being at my PO Box or photocopying when the mail arrives.

The surplus stock sale continues as a regular and apparently popular feature. Cost will be for recent mailings \$4 each complete mailing plus \$2 postage for the first one and \$1 for each beyond that. Preference will be given to waitlisters. The most recent mailing will always not be available so that those bundles can remain for their primary use, replacement for copies lost in the mail. Currently available mailings are 187 (1 copy), 190 (1 copy), 192 (1 copy), and 193 (4 copies). While at the 1984 Worldcon Ed Cox gave to me a batch of surplus stock from his time as OE. For these I will be charging \$6 each (considered more valuable due to age). Available are 176 (August, 1981, 3 copies), 177 (2 copies), 178 (4 copies), 179 (1 copy), and 180 (2 copies).



- Best Personal Writing: narrative composition reflecting the writer's attitudes and experiences within the context of an informal presentation.
- Best Artist: drawings, cartoons and other visual material.
- Favorite Fapan: persons who you feel added to the ambience of Fapa regardless of their activity during the last year. These choices may have scored high in your voting for other categories.
- Favorite Unsung Fapan: someone who, even tho not ranking high in any of the other categories, nevertheless deserves some egoboo points because Fapa somehow wouldn't be the same without them.
- Other Rules: all voters get 10 points/two first-place votes but you may not vote for yourself no matter how much you deserve it.
