## O VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT

BEST FAPAZINE

### THE SIXTH ANNUAL FAPA POLL

No official business was transacted this quarter in these quarters, except for the annual poll. But here there was a bit of a snafu: the deadline. In my announcement I said the deadline was 31 Dec 1952, and votes received after the deadline would not be counted. But in printing up the ballots Redd went ahead and noted, "Post before 31 Dec 52." This is manifestly awkward: suppose a pollcard were to be mailed 30 Dec and get lost in the mails; then, it reaches me some time in 1957. Under the terms of the Boggs deadline, I'd have to revise all the totals. Two cards, so far, have arrived late. They were posted 30 and 31 Dec, within the Boggs limit, but didn't get here till 4 January, which is outside mine. Since the votes on the cards would not materially change the results anyway, I've decided to abide by my original deadline and not count the latecomers.

So, after some explanation, to the poll. Votes were tallied according to the customary system of one point for last place in any given category, and one extra point for each place above it. Thus, first place in any one of the five-place categories scored five; first in "best artist" only counted two. All votes received on time were counted, even if the person voted for did not have material in FAPA in 1952. When the same person received two votes in the same category on the same card only the first vote was recorded. (Figures in parentheses below are first-place votes.)

Twenty-six legal ballots arrived, in this order: Boggs, Silverberg, Mackinaw City Michigan, Sneary, Drummond, Splawn, Savannah Georgia, Rochester Texas, Eney, Wilson, Los Angeles, Winne, Pullman Washington, Bergeron, Keasler, Croutch, Terry Carr, Shapiro, Wells, Ridgewood New Jersey, Graham, Seattle Washington, Portland Oregon, Pittsburgh, and Warner.

12 names here; last year 13. Rotsler is no surprise — this is at least the fourth consecutive year he's won. Leaders last year were Rotsler, Hoffman, Keasler, Grossman, and Markman. Bergeron is the only new fapan to take a top spot in any category.

Some general remarks: Harry Warner must have set some sort of record by winning first place in three categories out of six. Warner and Hoffman were the only fapans to draw votes in all six, though the Hoffman fiction vote and the Warner artwork vote are of dubious character.

Many members noted various things on their cards. Dick Eney sent a gentle-manly note of congratulations on the election, which was very nice of him. One refused to vote for Best Humorist, saying "I don't like humor, period." Rick Sneary, in picking Lee Hoffman for numerous things, postscripted, "If Hoffman doesn't return my wire recording sent in Aug., cross her out and write Laney's name in." The Hoffman votes were entered. One vote from the far west refused to pick any Best Mailing Comments, instead saying, "Let's have more Pogo."

One one fellow was honest enough to abstain from voting in one of the categories because he had only been a member for one mailing. There were sundry other comments, most of them interesting but scarcely relevant. Oh yes — one vote for Bergeron as third-best artist, not counted, and one vote for Burbee as fifth best humorist, likewise ignored. An unnamed insurgent picked Rotsler as first and second best artist, but just the first was counted.

The pollcards will be held until 1 March 1953, upon which date they will be destroyed. If you want your card back and you're not a regular correspondent of mine, kindly send a self-addressed stamped envelope.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE FANTASY AMATEUR PRESS ASSOCIATION

## Adopted 1947, effective 1 January 19487

1. FUNCTION: The Fantasy Amateur Press Association operates in the general field of activity which has grown up around interest in fantasy fiction. The quarterly mailings distribute to its members material written or published by members.

2. MEMBERS: Not more than sixty-five persons can be members of the FAPA at any one time.

Membership is open to anyone who can show as proof of his interest in fan-

tasy amateur activity

either (a) contributions in the form of verse, drawing, fiction, or nonfiction writing, published in two fantasy amateur publications not produced in the same city area

or (b) position as editor or publisher, not merely nominal or trifling, of

at least one issue of a fantasy amateur publication.

The credential must have been published within the year prior to acceptance of the application. When vacancies occur, the secretary calls on the applicants first on the waiting list to cite credentials and pay dues.

- 3. RENEWALS: To be eligible to renew his membership, a member must have published or had published in FAPA mailings or postpostings during the preceding year at least eight 81 x 11" pages or equivalent. The time limit for renewal is 45 days after the posting of the fourth mailing under his current membership.
- 4. FINANCES: To pay the FAPA's operating expenses, dues are \$1.50 per year(\*), paid at time of admission or renewal of membership. Contributions are accepted and surplus stock is sold. If there are insufficient funds to cover expense of the next mailing, the secretary-treasurer can announce equal assessments on all members, sufficient to pay for it, and members not complying will not receive that mailing.
- 5. MAILINGS: The official editor sends out identical bundles to all members immediately following the second Saturday in November, February, May and August. When individual members, or the official editor as an individual, send postpostings to all members, they are considered part of the mailing they were too late to go in.

Members are not obliged to distribute their fanzines through the FAPA, but all items included in the mailings are produced at the publisher's expense and are free to members, being considered exchanges. The publisher must send to the editor at least sixty-eight copies of publications intended for the mailing. These publications may be printed, mimeographed, hektographed, photographed, or reproduced in any other way which gives a sufficient number of identical and legible copies. They must represent to a substantial extent the work of the member who has put them in the mailings. While some relation to fantasy is desirable, there is no restriction on the type of material included except lawfulness. The postage on postpostings is not to be paid by the treas-

6. OFFICERS: The following officers are elected:

(a) The president has general direction of the FAPA's affairs. He appoints members to fill vacated offices, and auxiliary officials for purposes not otherwise provided for. He has what power is necessary to deal with situations not otherwise covered by the constitution.

(b) The vice-president succeeds to the presidency in case it is vacated. He also gives interpretations of the constitution after two or more sides of a

controversy over construction have been presented.

(c) The secretary-treasurer receives membership applications and renewals. He keeps track of members' standings in regard to sustaining activity. Each quarter he sends the official editor a list of members' names and addresses, description of credentials, report of income and outgo, and other information within his department. Notices of candidacy for office being sent to him, he furnishes the official editor information for preparing the ballot. He keeps the FAPA's funds separate from his own in cash or deposit. At the end of his term the secretary-treasurer turns over the records and funds to his successor.

(d) The official editor is charged with assembling and posting the mail - ings. He publishes ballots and the quarterly official organ, The Fantasy Amateur, at FAPA expense. The official organ contains the reports of the various

officials and other material at the official editor's discretion.

7. ELECTIONS: Elections are held by mail. Candidates whose names are to appear on the ballot file with the secretary-treasurer in writing. The ballots are included in the summer mailing.

All votes to be counted must be in the counting committee's hands a month after the mailing is dispatched. This ballot counting committee notifies outgoing and incoming officers and all candidates, of the full results of the election within two weeks after the ballot deadline. A plurality is sufficient to elect.

Officers serve for one year. No person can be elected to the same office, except the official editorship, more than once in five years. The secretary-treasurer must be an adult.

- 8. AMENDMENTS: Amendments to this constitution must be proposed in writing, endorsed by four members. Copy with signatures is sent to the president, other copies to the other officers. The proposal in substance must be given in the official organ the mailing before it comes up for vote. Unless the president orders a special vote, amendments are voted on at the annual election. A majority of the members must vote on an amendment, and a majority of such voters must be favorable, for the amendment to be adopted.
- 9. BY-LAWS: By-laws may be adopted at any time by a majority of the members endorsing a copy of a proposal which has been sent to the entire membership. Such by-laws can expel members, remove officers, override officials acts, suspend sections of this constitution, or do anything else within the sovereignty of the organization. On endorsement by 12 other members, a member's failure to meet sustairing activity requirements will be waived on a particular occasion.

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
