3. The Waiting List. By now I hope all of you have received, and acted upon, the special message sent to you just before the mailing deadline. If you haven't, take heed.

In view of the great length of the waiting list, I plan to institute a firmer policy on acknowledgment of the FA. Acalizing that there may be occasions when it is impossible to reply, but feeling that an answer each mailing is desirable, I plan to require acknowledgment every mailing, but will allow the first 20 in the following list one non-reply, with a second dropping you. THE PRESIDENT'S MESSACE

Following custom, I will make it the first order of business in my spanky new administration to say thank you to all who voted for me. Not that I'm a conformist, but this is obviously a sound procedure. Once things get rolling, those in office may not be so strongly impelled to thank those who put them there.

As you all know, the amendments passed. Section 2.3 of the Constitution now demands in detail that waiting-list applicants present legal credentials before being accepted as w-a-i-t-e-r-s. (At the rate their numbers are increasing, they'll be unionizing next and trying to Take Over Fapa.)

Section 3.3 of the Constitution now requires that 22 members must sign any petition to waive a member's activity requirements. Another move to cull the sluggards.

Hear Ye -- my first Presidential Edict. These two new amendments are effective November 15, 1960.

"Aha," some new waiting-listers are saying who slunk under the wire before the deadline. "I haven't any credentials, but I don't have to worry about that for 3 or 4 years -- and maybe by then I'll be in the mood."

"Oho," certain of the old waiting-listers are saying. "Good thing I got on when I did. I've still got a year or two to think about getting something published. Meanwhile, I'll just keep sending my FA acknowledgement postcard in case I want in when the time comes."

I've got news. The current waiting-listers are going to have to cough up credentials, too.

No need for panic. Unqualified (in terms of our amended Constitution) people who have been complacently sitting it out are not going to have to show proof of fanac a week from Wednesday or be unceremonicusly dumped. They will be given plenty of time to make any necessary arrangements to keep their slowly-inchingupward spot. However, in fairness to the waiting-list newcomers with a vista of endless years stretching ahead of them -- in fairness to the currently active and vitally interested waiting-list sitters -- I feel that all waiting-listers should be able to show, if not evidence of current activity, then at least interest and willingness enough to engage in the minimal fanac required for credentials.

The credential amendment to the Constitution will, of course, see that newcomers are qualified. Extending this credential requirement to cover the present waiting-list is an immediate, non-recurring situation not covered by the Constitution, and therefore in the President's domain. If the Fapa membership feels -- as it obviously does or the amendment wouldn't have passed -- that we should have a qualified waiting-list, then it should be qualified throughout, and qualified NOW. Not three or four years from now which would have to pass before the waiting-list was made up solely of qualified prospective members.

Here's the plan. All waiting-listers must submit credentials as specified by the Constitution to reach the Secretary-Treasurer by February 8, 1961. A large proportion of our waiting-list is all set -- members of other Apas, fmz publishers or contributors, Fapazine contributors, Shadow Mailing participants, etc. In fact, I would say that the majority of waiting-listers can lay hands on credentials in five minutes. (Just be sure you send them right away, before you forget!)

The others, though, are going to have to shake themselves up and Do Something. And here's what they do. They publish a fanzine if they are already on the verge of doing so. Otherwise, they sit themselves down and write a couple of stories, articles, poems, book reviews or something. It doesn't have to be literature -but it's got to be good enough that two fanzines in two different localities will publish the material they write. Or pictures they draw. Not letters, though.

The deadline is very nearly three whole months away. And we're going to lean over backward to help them meet it. 1) I'm writing a special message outlining this which will be sent by Bill Evans first class mail (air-mail overseas) to all waiting-listers at once. There will be no outcries that the directive was buried in the FA which arrived late, etc. 2) Credentials in FAPAzines, SAPSzines, or OMPAzines, which often have a limited run and are hard to obtain, can be validated by simply citing the mailing number and/or date, publication title and the publisher to Bill Evans who, with Dick Eney's help, has kindly offered to check them from files. There must surely be NAPA members also among the membership, who will check any w-l credentials cited from that group. Bjo? Ron? Marion? Volunteer, somebody please. 3) If a waiting-lister arranges to have needed credentials published in somebody's Fapazine in the forthcoming February mailing which will go out a week after the qualification deadline, they will be considered to be provisionally validated on citing publisher and publication to the Sec-Treas, Bill Evans -- subject to their actual appearance in the February mailing.

This should give any really interested waiting-lister, lacking immediate credentials, ample opportunity to arrange things without even breathing hard.

However, as it is not the purpose of this measure to eliminate any waiting-lister with even rudimentary interest in joining Fapa, they will <u>still</u> not be dropped even if they fail to meet the February 8 deadline. They will simply be demoted, in a sense. In the February FA, Bill Evans will cite all credentials presented, and offer a <u>fully qualified waiting-list</u>. At the <u>end</u> of this list will appear the names of all those who have not yet qualified. This group will be listed in the order of their present standing on the November waiting-list. They will then be given another three months, until May 9, 1961, to show evidence of interest in joining Fapa by arranging credentials. Six months in all. At that time, those who have become qualified during the Feb.-May quarter will retain their position on the waiting-list following the original group. All others will be dropped. (Some waiting-listers may even welcome this chance to drop back, if they feel a membership opening is approaching before they are quite ready for it, without starting entirely over again as a number have done.)

This is in no sense a discriminatory measure, as would be any proposal to "bump" supposedly promising waiting-listers over the heads of others at the discretion of Fapa members. Fapa has demanded a qualified waiting-list -- standing on that waiting-list is squarely up to the waiting-listers themselves. Those who have been interested and active will cheer -- the others will get in a little practice which will do not a bit of harm.

And what do you bet the waiting-list grows even longer during the coming year?

Your Egoboo Poll is included with this mailing. Let's try to top last year's fine 44-member return -- if only to prove that record response was not due only to a lot of axe-happy members faunching to cast their blackballs. This year, let's set another record voting for people, it's just as much fun!

THE FAPA CONSTITUTION (Adopted effective 14 November 1959) (Amended effective 15 November 1960)

1. Function

The Fantasy Amateur Press Association (FAPA) operates in the general field of amateur activity that has grown up around interest in fantasy fiction. Its quarterly mailings distribute to its members material written or published by members.

2. Members

2.1 Not more than 65 persons can be members of the FAPA at any one time. 2.2 Membership is open to anyone who can show, as proof of his interest in fantasy amateur activity, the existence of one of the following credentials:

2.21 That he has had contributions, in the form of verse, drawing, fiction, or non-fiction, published in two fantasy amateur publications that were not produced in the same metropolitan area.

2.22 That he has been the editor or publisher, in a real sense, of at least one issue of a fantasy amateur publication (fanzine).

2.3 An individual who wishes to join FAPA shall send to the secretarytreasurer an application stating his desire to join and citing credentials as described under Section 2.2 of this constitution. The credentials must have been published not more than one year prior to the date of application. The secretary-treasurer shall determine whether the credentials are valid; if so, if there is a vacancy, he shall admit the person to FAPA membership upon payment of dues. If there is no vacancy, and the credentials are valid, the applicant shall be admitted to a waiting list as of the date his application is received by the secretary-treasurer; the waiting list shall be maintained by the secretary-trasurer and shall be published in the Official organ each quarter. Copies of the official organ shall be sent each quarter to each person on the waiting list. The secretary-treasurer shall require from each person on the waiting list suitable confirmation of continued interest in membership not less often than every other mailing; non-receipt of such indication shall be grounds for removal from the waiting list. As vacancies in the membership occur, the secretary-treasurer shall notify the person who appled earliest, at which time the individual shall again cite valid credentials, published within a year from the date his membership is to begin, and must pay dues. In all cases, membership begins upon the date set for the next quarterly mailing, unless a different date is set by the secretary-treasurer.

2.4 A new member must have renewal credentials distributed with the third mailing after his joining or with an earlier mailing or postmailing following his admission. Ctherwise, he shall receive only the first two mailings of his membership year, his membership shall be cancelled and his dues forfeited.

2.5 Husband and wife may jointly share a single membership, and will be considered as a single person under the requirements of this constitution.

3. Renewals

3.1 To renew his membership, a member must have renewal credentials. Renewal credentials consist of credentials as described at 2.21 and 2.22, but must total at least eight 8.5" x 11" pages or the equivalent in page area. Letters will not count unless they represent a substantial contribution to FAPA. To count, renewal credentials must be distributed in FAPA mailings or postmailings during the year that ends when the fourth quarterly reailing under the member's current membership is sent out. Postmailings that are not distributed before the fourth quarterly mailing date do not count.

Constitution, p. 2

Reprints do not count unless they represent substantial work in re-writing or compiling the material (this provision shall not serve to deny credit to material solely because it was distributed outside of the FAPA shortly prior to its inclusion in a FAPA mailing).

3.2 If a member fails to have renewal credentials due to Section 5.56, an error of an officer, or postal delays beyond what might be reasonably and cautiously expected, he shall, if he offers dues in time, have an additional quarter in which to make up his credential deficiency. In these cases, dues will be refundable. The member will not receive the fifth mailing unless the credential deficiency is removed, nor will further extensions be granted.

3.3 On endorsement by 22 other members, a member's lack of renewal credentials will be waived on a particular occasion.

3.4 Renewal dues must be paid so as to be received by the treasurer on or before the mailing date of the fourth mailing under the member's current membership.

4. Finances

4.1 Dues are \$3.00 per year. The secretary-treasurer will accept donations. The official editor will sell surplus stock to members at such reasonable prices as he may set, the net proceeds of which sale will be turned over to the treasury.

4.2 If it appears that the treasury will lack funds to cover the cost of the next mailing, the secretary-treasurer can notify the membership of an equal assessment on all members, sufficient to meet expected costs and provide a small reserve. Members not paying the assessment will not receive that mailing until they pay the assessment, within a time limit of six months.

4.3 The treasury will pay any legitimate expenses incurred by officers or auxiliary officials in the discharge of official functions required by this constitution.

5. Mailings

5.1 The official editor shall send out identical bundles to all members immediately following the mailing dates. The mailing dates are the second Saturday in November, February, May, and August.

5.2. When necessary in order to get information to the members, officers may make mailings at FAPA expense between regular mailing dates. Other publications sent in by members may be distributed with such mailings if those members agree to pay any additional cost incurred. The official editor as an individual, and other members, sometimes send publications to the members at other times. The expense of such unofficial mailings is not chargeable to the treasury.

5.3 Fanzines distributed between regular mailing dates are counted as postmailings to the preceding mailing under these conditions:

5.31 Identical mailings have been sent to all members at substantially the same time, and additional copies, to bring the total to 68, have been furnished to the official editor.

.

5.32 The publication satisfies Sections 5.52 through 5.54. 5.4 Members are not obliged to distribute their fanzines through the FAPA, but all items included in the mailings are produced at the publisher's expense and are free to members, being considered as exchanges.

5.5 Publications in the official editor's hands on the mailing date shall be included in the quarterly bundle if they meet these requirements:

5.51 68 copies (to provide a margin for error) are furnished.

5.52 They are printed, mimeographed, hectographed, dittoed, photographed, or legibly reproduced in some other way that gives a sufficient number of identical copies.

Constitution p 3

5.53 The 68 copies are identical in size, artwork, typography, wording, etc., except for serial numbering (if desired).

5.54 They represent to a substantial extent the work of the member who sends them in.

5.55 They conform to the requirements for second, third and/or fourth class postage.

5.56 While some relation to fantasy or fandom is desirable, there is no restriction on the type of material except that it must not be against federal law. If such a violation comes to his attention, the official editor shall exclude the publication from the mailing.

5.57 They do not require special packaging, Material which requires special handling due to its size, shape, or weight may be mailed separately by the official editor, at the expense of the member submitting the material. The official editor is not obliged to provide this service.

6. OOfficers

6.1 The following officers are elected annually from the membership:

6.11 The president. He has general direction of the FAPA's affairs. He appoints members to fill vacated offices, appoints a teller for the annual elections, and may appoint auxiliary officials for other purposes. He has what power is necessary to deal with situations not otherwise covered by this constitution.

6.12 The vice-president. He becomes president if the presidency is vacated. In case of a controversy over the meaning of this constitution, after two or more sides have been formally presented by others, the vice-president shall decide and his decirion is binding. He conducts an annual egoboo poll, and furnishes results to the official editor for inclusion in The Fantasy Amateur.

6.13 The secretary-treasurer. He receives membership applications, renewals, and filings for office. He keeps track of members' standing in regard to renewal credentials. Each quarter he shall send the official editor a list of members' names and addresses, an identification of the credentials of new members, a report of income and outgo, and other information within the scope of his duties. He shall furnish the official editor information for preparing the ballot. He must keep FAPA's funds separate from his own in cash or deposit. At the end of his term he shall turn over the records and funds to his successor. The secretary-treasurer must be at least 21 years of age.

6.14 The official editor. He shall assemble and send out the mailing. He has custody of surplus stock. He shall publish election ballots and the official organ, The Fantasy Amateur. The Fantasy Amateur shall appear in each quarterly bundle, and shall contain information on postmailings, a list of the current mailing's contents, the reports of the various officials, the text of any proposals to be of the various officials, the text of any proposals to be official editor's discretion. The constitution shall be included in The Fantasy Amateur not less often than once every six months.

6.2 Each officer serves until his successor is elected and notified, unless he first resigns, loses his membership, or is expelled from office.

6.3 Although each officer is responsible for the duties indicated, he may have the help of others in performing them.

6.4 In the absence of a formal controversy, each officer may decide for himself doubtful points concerning his duties.

Constitution, p. 4

7. Elections

7.1 Elections are held by mail. Candidates whose names are to appear on the ballot must file with the secretary-treasurer in writing. The ballots shall be included in the summer (August) mailing, except that ballots for the use of overses members shall be mailed to them first class or air mail at the time the summer mailing is posted.

7.2 All votes, to be counted, must be in the teller's hands a month after the mailing is despatched. The teller shall notify all members of the full results of the election within two weeks after the ballot deadline.

7.3 A plurality is sufficient to elect.

7.4 No person can be elected president, or vice-president, more than once in five years.

8. Amendments

Proposed amendments to this constitution, in writing, endorsed by four members, no more than two of whom are officers, shall be submitted to vote. The proposers shall send a copy with the signatures to the president, and other copies to the other officers. The gist of the amendment must be given in The Fantasy Amateur the mailing before it comes up for vote. Unless the president orders a special vote, amendments shall be voted on at the annual election. A majority of the votes must be favorable for the amendment to be adopted, and such majority must be more than 1/4 of the membership.

9. Special Rules

9.1 Special rules may be adopted at any time when a majority of the members endorse a copy of the proposal, if the proposal has been sent to the entire membership at substantially the same time. Such special rules can refuse applicants, expel members, remove officers, override officials' acts, suspend sections of this constitution, or do anything else within the sovereignty of the organization.

OFFICIAL EDITOR'S STATEMENT OF POLICY

It was one of my campaign promises -- and, unlike candidates for national office, I take campaign promises seriously -- that all contributions to the mailing would be acknowledged by return mail. For this mailing, that policy has been faithfully carried out. In the case of overseas members, who go to additional trouble in getting their fapazines to me on time, I made a point of acknowledging receipt by airmail. ++ So far I have done this at my own expense and will continue to do so during my tenure of office. However, I hope the membership will support this policy so emphatically that future Official Editors will be required (by popular demand, if not by Constitutional Amendment) to carry it on, and will be permitted to do so at FAPA expense as Official Business. ++ How about it? Do you like having your fapazines acknowledged, do you like knowing when they reached the Official Editor? Let's hear your views!

This Matter of IBM Cards; Section 5:52 of the FAPA Constitution reads ".... or LEGIBLY reproduced in some other way that gives a sufficient number of identical copies."
