I want to thank everyone who responded by letter to the hoo boy Great Issues of Papa. The results may be seen in the Fit lettercol. I like to see crossfire discussion arising in Papa over some of the underlying problems we have; I urge the membership to read the letters carefully. Meanwhile:

THE WAITING LIST AMENDMENT. 111 members should by now have received Terry Carr's teller report on the amendment vote. Terry announced that the amendment had pass. od since voting at closure of the polls stood at 19 Yes, 18 No, 1 Abstain. I received a few grumbles that no deadline was specified for voting, but I don't think this is important because the constitution clearly specifies that polls close one month after the mailing comes out.. True, this specification is for routine elections, but I don't see any reason why special elections should be any different, especially when the content of the proposed amendment was known to the membership a full mailing in advance of the February mailing. (*see bottom of page).

Several constitutional points were brought to the vp about the election. I felt that in view of the hassles it would be best to extend the election another month, but the VP ruled this would be a clear violation of the constitution, and he's right. The entire matter of the election lies clearly in tho VP's hands. The upshot is that the amendment still carries. See the VP report for details.

THE GFFAIRE MOSKONITZ. A lot of typewriter ribbon has been expended over SaM ${ }^{*}$. membership lately, and the upshot is that he is back in. I erred in my reading of the official correspondence file. Dean Grennell did rule a second time. His ruling was included in the correspondence but was out of chronological order, undated, and seemed to be a mere further explanation of the first ruling. Sorry about that.

DhG!s second ruling exists, in fact, in 119 copies. Ho mimooed quite a few for distribution to the membership with the Fin, but the other officers decided not to circulate it. In retrospect, Dean says, "I can see that I may have leaned overfar in the direction of leniency and charity in reaching the verdicts $I$ did. $N / s o$, as noted to Calkins, I was none too clear as to the precise procedure prescribed for such situations." It might be nice for a body of elder Fapans to write out a page or two about the duties of the Veep and proper official follow-through to avoid a repetition of such Affaires. Still, I'm glad the matter came up, since it brought to light the issue of reprints and made clear again that they are not mem-bership-saving material. To allow the vague impression that reprints are okay to persist would eventually lead to even more deadwood. Also, the entire Affaire brought up the issue of officers reversing the rulings of previous officers, a matter which has seemed to me to be a weak point of Fapa for some time. Dick Lupeoff will rule on that one elsewhere in this FA.
*TWo members also challenged Terry's reading of the results, since the amendment must gain a majority of the votes, and 19 is not a majority of 38 . The trouble with this point is that ibstain is not on the ballot. I checked by way of Terry and found that the member casting this write-in fibstain did not realize it would have any effect on the election and is now somewhat dismayed.

Fourteen ballots were received, including one from a member who cast no votes but wanted the ten points for voting. Tut, tut--but he gets the points.
Further commentary, it seems to me, would be superfluous--the results contained no great surprises, and will speak for themselves. They are:

The $V$-Pis report THE MATTER OF MOSKOIITZ. The key question here was: "May a President of Fief reverse an erroneous action taken by an earlier administration?" is substantial number of membors expressed opinions on this matter. The opinions re about evenly divided between positive and negative respones to the question.

The Vice President's ruling is: a President of Chili may reverse an erroneous action taken by an earlier official.

However, since this power could easily be abused, several lessons are to be taken. fimong these are the following:
(1) This power should be used very sparingly. The Vice President takes note of the fact that the President has decided not to reverse the Moskowitz decision which brought about the present discussion.
(2) If the power is abused, the original decision can be restored--that is, the President can be overridden--by a special rule.
(3) If the membership dislike this procedure, it may be altered by constitutional amendment.
(4) Be careful who your President is.

THE SPECILL ELECTION. While the special election on the waiting list amendment is not basically the Vice President's responsibility, the question of the nature of a majority (as distinct from a plurality) was raised.

Nineteen members voted Yes, eighteen voted No, and the remainder of the membership abstained. One of these people even went to the trouble of sending a postcard to the teller saying he was abstaining. Such thoughtfulness is appreciated. The final vote was 19 to 18 , and 19 wins.

One member claimed he sent a vote which was not received. Unfortunately, he did not send his vote by registered or certified mail and with enough leeway to send another if the first was not received. The Vice President offers his sympathy but can provide no other redress.

The amendment carries.
