

• AN INTERVIEW WITH FARNSWORTH WRIGHT by San Moskowitz

1000 22nd, 1939, is filed in the annals of fandom as the day when Farnsworth Wright, editor of "Weird Tales", was interviewed for the 1st time since his arrival in New York. The interview was consumated by your correspondent, and arranged in advance.

The offices located in the same sec tion with others of the Short Stories Inc, are very neat and comfortable, but no special effects are utilized to "brighten up" the place, such as hanging a few stuffed Banshees on the wall or a couple of groveling Ghouls underfoot. Editor Wright himself, is remarkably cheer ful when you consider the terrorriden manuscripts he plows thru daily.

After a short discussion on various ngles of "The World Science Fiction Convention", the trend of the conversition turned to the one and only "Weird Toles".Farnsworth Wright confided that the bi-monthly issunce of "Weird Tales" is but a temportry mensure put thru becluse of slockening soles in the Summer months, and that it would not be continued as WT's regular policy. The magazine will appear for the space of two issues, it intervals of 6 weeks. Therefore, the August 1939 issue of WT goes on sale June 15, the Sept number Au ust 1st, back to normal again.

It was learned that "Far Below" was very well received by the renders, but that a tremendous choras of protest was aroused because the story had not been illustrated by Finlay. Secondly Thoms P Kelley's "A Million Years In The Future", which Wright enthusedly commented upon as "the finest interplanetary story I have ever read, and by far the best WT's ever printed. It hits a new slant on Interplanetaries and surpasses by light years Kelley's last two excellent novels. E Hoffman Price reappears in the pages of WT in the August issue with "Apprenctice Magician", which cops the cover and which Wright describes as "whimsical humor". Price has a second unusual yarn scheduled known as "Sp-

nnish Vampire", "which is a tale of a vampire poisened by its own kind of blood, and therefore kill-ed." Lovers of David H Keller, M D will be glad to know that Wright considers his forthcoming novelette "Lords of the Ice Age", as "up to Keller's very highest standard of past years." It was found that the two unpublished novels by H P Lovecrift hid not yet been submitted to Weird Tales. Upon your correspondent explaning that it was such little knickknacks

as the note above Lovecrift shosting for Houdini which give WI it's stmosphere, Editor Wright divulged something further in the same line. Fornsworth Wright was the origina. chost-writer for Harry Houdini, It wis Wright & not Houdini or Lovecraft who wrote "Spirit Fakers of Hermannstandt", and "The Hoax of Spirit Lovers" which appeared in errly WTa. When Wright obtained the position of editor of Weird Toles, he recommended Lovecrift to Houdini for the latters need of a ghostwriter, hence the recent reprint. Another question asked was how WI managed to maintain its standard of quality despite the increased number of pages. Two answers were giv. en. First of all, back in 1923 when Edward Baird was editor of WI very few monuscripts were received, and there wasn't very much to pick from In contrast to the hundreds received every month by WT today. In corraboration of his statement Farm sworth Wright pointed to nest piles of monuscripts on his desk. There were rejection slips for no less then three prominent fins mong them. Too bhi I'm ethical. However, there is a yarn under serious consideration by old-timer J Scholosse "uthor of "The Second Swarm" etc. Secondly he has a better chance to blance the issue now that he has 160 pages. Before withe the regular raders department, reprint selection Quinn Novelette, and chapter of a serial, it was a tough pob selecting Neil R Jones has failed again to

a fine enough variety of material. However, with 32 more pages, his problem is more or less eliminated and he can balance the issue so that the material reads better. His future hope is that he will receive enough support so that he can afford to jump the pages up to 176 as "Short Stories." Wright promised to help out with the convention as much as possible. He will attend along with his wife and son. He has seen Metropolis twice belives it one of the finest scientifilms ever made and can't wait to see it again at the Convention. He also contributed a number of Finlay originals toward the auction. In the future he will put aside other illustrations for the auction. One fact that impresses most after a conversation with Wright is his determination to maintain the quality of "Weird Tiles" at any cost. WT has hid some pretty rough sailing it times, but even when the mightine seemed to forming the proverbial throaty death rattle Wright never compromised with quality, and eventually his policy proved sound. 
