

New York, 25 June, (CNS) - A new science-fiction magazine will have its first issue out early this Fall. It will be published by Crestwood Publishing Co., of 1790 Broadway, New York 19, NY. The magazine will be digest-size, 128 pages 35¢ and will be published bi-monthly. The cover date on the first issue will probably be November 1956. No title yet has been announced. The editor is W. W. Scott. Mr. Scott wants "strong" science-fiction stories of 5,000, 6,000 and 7,000 lengths. Payment is 2¢ a word on acceptence.

This will be Crestwood's first science-fiction magazine, but years ago they put their "little toe" in the s-f field with a digest-size booklet. They published Murray Leinster's "Flight For Life". This was a reprint of "The Laws Of Chance" from the March 1947 issue of Startling Stories. The booklet was listed as #10 of the Prize Science-Fiction Novels series. It was the only one to appear. They also at one time published Frankenstein Comics.

Nº 30 "FUTURE S-F" OUT THIS AUGUST

New York, 29 June, (CNS) - Columbia Publications will issue a second 1956 issue of <u>Future Science Fiction</u> late this August. This issue will be numbered #30, and as usual be digest-size,
