## RUMOR THAT 'FANTASY & SCIENCE FICTION' FOLOS — IS NOT TRUE

UNKNOWN DICKENS FANTASY TO BE PUBLISHED

> TITLE CONTEST TO BE REPEATED

BERKELEY, Calif., 16 March (CNS) - The ugly rumor stating that The Magazine Of Fantasy And Science Fiction is about to fold. is not true. In a statement to Fantasy-Times, Mr. Anthony Boucher, co-editor of F&SF. stated: "Someone is spreading the rumor that F&SF is about to fold -- a rumor which has caused us some embarrasament with authors & agents. There is no truth whatsoever in the rumor: we're dery definitely still in existence buying and planning many issues ahead & hope to remain so indefinitely."

"Brightest news item in our future: two issues from now (in our Aug issue out in June) we'll present a completely unknown Charles Dickens fantasy story, "The Rat That Could Speak" which appears in no collected edition of Dickens' fiction!"

NEW YORK, 19 March, (CNS)-Mary Gnaedinger, editor of Fantastic Novels and Famous Fantastic Mysteries, announced today, that she will reprint the famous novel, "Rebirth" by Thomas Calvert McClary in the September 1951 issue of Famous Fantastic Mysteries. The novel will rate a cover and inside illustration by Lawrence.

"Rebirth" was first published as a serial in the February and March 1934 Astounding Stories.

In 1944 it was enlarged and reprinted as a Bart pocketsized book. Both of these early publications were edited by F. Orlin Tremaine.

# List Of Thrills' Plagarisms

SYDEMY, Australia, 15 March, (CNS) - In a Cosmic News Service report dated November 23, 1950, Vol Molesworth Australian Correspondent for Fantasy-Times, reported that a fan had complained to the publishers of Australia's only professional science-fiction magazine, Thrills. Inc., that some of their stories were plagarised from United States stf magazines. He then proved it by producing the American magazines the stories had been stolen from.

Mr. Molesworth has been investigating the case since then and has, today, complied a partial list of the stolen stories.

It must be remembered that the editors and publishers of Thrills, Inc., were not part of this wholesale plagarism; they were taken in by the erocked authors, whom they quickly fired.

The partial list of the offending stories and where they were stolen from is as follows:

In issue #1 of Thrills, "Castaway Planet" by E. V. Zinnus, was "The Ionian Cycle" by W. Tenn, from the Aug. 48 issue of TWS.

### NEW REPRILE STF MAG OUT IN ENGLAND AMAZING SCIENCE STORIES

There is a new publication on the British market, just out, a reprint stf magazine entitled Amazing Science Stories. Price is 1/-. It is pulp size, has 55 pages, print is clear and it has British ads. It is brought out by Pemberton's (of Manchester) Ltd. The contents page shows this issue to be the first, but gives the title as "Amazing Science Magazine". There are five stories: "Jet-Wheel Jockey" by Herscholt: "Planet Of Fire" by Herscholt, too: "Method For Murder" by Kensch: "Escape" Essence" by Ludwig and "Son Of The Stars" by Tremaine. The first four stories have heading illustrations. Cover picture is not signed, but shows a rec-clad female: a space-ship: a n d two space-suited fellows handling what look like flame-throwers. The cover is reprinted from Australian's Thrills Inc the stories are reprinted from the U.S. Super Science Stories and Thrills Inc.

#### AMAZING STORIES & FARTASTIC ADVENTURES

The British Reprint Editions of Amazing Stories and Fantastic Adventures, each bearing No. 6. are now out. They are both reprints of the August 1950 United States Editions.

Amazing Stories contains 164 pages (196 in the US edition), and six stories including "The Illusion Seekers" by Costello; also the usual short items. And, for the first time, the fan feature, "The Club House", is reprinted.

Fantastic Adventures has 130 pages and four stories including "The Devil With You?" by Bloch, and the usual-short items. Cover by McCauley.

Movie history will be made on the night of April 1st when "Tales Of Hoff-man" will have its world premiere at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York.

This is an operatic fantasy, produced by Michael Powell and Emeric Preschurger, the team who gave us "The Red Shoes". The opera tells of its hero's successive loves for a dancer, a mechanical doll, a courtesan who steals his soul in a mirror, and for a consumptive who dies of too much singing.

The picture opens with the Dragonfly Ballet, a beautiful fantasy scene. Another one, the Kleinzack Ballet, is performed by figures on beer muss and tavern walls who come to life. These are but two of the fascinating scenes in the picture. "Tales Of Hoffman".

Jack Rabin and Irving Block, motion picture experts, have completed a feature films, "To The Center Of The Earth", on which they have been working for nearly a year. The photoplay, which concerns atomic weapons, was directed by Terry Morse with a cast of virtually unknown actors on a budget of less than \$100,000.

Prom England comes a picture, "The Perfect Woman", which is about a real honest - to - goodness lady robot. The robot is invented by a scientist who hopes to prove the feasibility of such a machine. To complicate matters, the scientist's niece poses as the robot, confusing all who think she is a machine. appears a notice by the British publishers to readers of both magazines. It says that, in order to satisfy the demand for BRE's, difficulties are encountered. The purpose is, to produce the editions in the United Kingdom precisely as issued in the USA; i.e. word for word.

As the magazines are brought out in the United States in lengths varying from 128 to 196 pages, it would be impossible, owing to rapidly increasing prices of paper, to offer such larger issues at 1/6.

Therefore, prices of the magazines

will henceforth be as follows:

a) those running to 128 pages will cost 1/6;

b) those up to 164 pages will cost 2/-:

and c) those running to 196 pages will cost 2/6.
