Lead story is Lee Rondelle's "Cosmic Mirror" - (author is another newspaperman joining the ranks of stf writers.) The rest of the shorts are: John Christopher's "The Tree" already published in Worlds Beyoud, USA, beautifully illustrated by Quinn, another Cedric Walker android story. "The Scapegoats": "Greek Gift". Ted Tubb's second pro story; and new author Alan Burelay's "Welcome, Stranger!". Interior illustrations are by Quimi Clothier. Hunter and Bull.

Features for this issue are a four page article on the International Convention, with photos; book reviews featuring forthcoming British editions of "What Mad Universe", "The Big Eye", "Cruise Of The Space Beagle", "Man Against The Stars", "The Star Kings" and "Best Stf Stories" (taken from Fell's

"Best Of 1950").

ASTOUNDING UPS PRICE TO 35¢

MEN YORK, NY, 18 July, (CHS) - Astounding Science Fiction, increased its price from 25¢ to 35¢ an issue, or \$3.50 a year. But, until August 18, you can still get it for \$2.50 a year by subscribing.

For the extra dime in price, Astounding has added 8 slick-raper pages for use in illustrating their articles. It was in the mid-30s with Tromaine at the helm that Astounding became the-leading stf magazine by giving, in addition to fine fiction, the most for the least — 160 pages (pulp size) for 20¢. Now its one of the higest priced mags.

THE WESTERCON 1951

LOS ANGELES, Calif., 2nd July, (CNS) The 1951 Vestercon was held on June.29
and 30th, sponsored by The Elves, Gnomes' and Little Men's Science Fiction,
Chowder and Marching Society of Berkeley; originally, it was suppose to be
presented by The Futurian Society of
San Francisco, but complications arose
(namely, the dissolution, for all practical purposes, of the Society) and the
Little Men took it over.

A group of half-dozen Los Angeles fans, who journeyed to San Francisco, were unaware that the original schedulod dates for the Westercon of June 30th to July 1st, had been changed to the 29th and 30th. However, they missed only a small portion of the conference.

The evening of the 29th was open house and registration for attendoes at the Gardon Library in Borkeley; storoscopic slides of the Norwescon Woro

shown.

Next morning, the site of thefestivities moved to California Hall in
San Francisco. Tom Quinn and Anthony
Boucher welcomed attendees and the
first event of importance was a panel
discussion of the science fiction books
of 1951 with Anthony Boucher as moderator over Tom Quinn, R. Bretner, Jimmy

Kepner and Sam Peoples.

After lunch and recognition of guests, R. Bretner, author of "The Gmurrs Come From The Voodvork Out", gave a lenthly talk on "The Future Of Science Fiction". Then a transcription of the Dimension X program, featuring "The Blue-Skinned Spaceman" was played. (This is familiar to most science-fiction radio listeners, as it's been broadcasted twice.) The auction offered little of original interest; most items seemed to be left-overs from the previous Westercon and also from the

Increase Sales Of "Amazing" & "Fantastic Adventues" Stalls Their Quarterly

NEW YORK, N.Y., 20 July, (CNS) - Due to the increase in circulation to both Amazing Stories and Fantastic Adventures, their quarterly reissues will not amear for awhile.

Mr. Howard Browne, editor of both magazines explained that the quarterly reissues are made up of returns from the newsstands. Their original covers are removed and a new cover reglued over three of the monthly issues. While the print order of both magazines have remained the same, in spite of paper shortages, the increase in sales makes it impossible to acquire enough of the monthly issues to reissue them as quarterlies. And, the paper shortage makes it impossible to increase the print order.

Until either the sales drop far enough so that enough returns come in, or until the print order can be enlarged, there will be no quarterlies of Amazing Stories or Fantastic Adventures on the stands.

HUGO GERNSBACK___

After 42 years, Hugo Gernsback recently revived one of his earliest occursions into science-fiction by reprinting, as a special presentation to the attendees of the juarter Century Wireless Ass'n held June 8th in NY, "Wireless On Mars", which originally appeared as an article in February, 1909, issue of Modern Electronics.

Included in the four-page folder, a "shaggy-dog" deal somewhat similar to Mr. Gernsback's annual New Year's cards was a picture of him in company with

FIRST "TARZAN" FILM SHOWN AT "ESFA"

NEWARK, N.J., 1 July 1951. (CNS) - One of the scarest and most interesting of all fantasy films, "Tarzan Of The Apes" was shown to the approximately thirty-fantasy fans who attended the July meeting of the Eastern Science-Fiction Association here today.

The 16 mm. print of the 1919 version of Edgar Rice Burroughs' creation was shown by Ray Van Houten and Jimmy Taurasi in behalf of the FANTASY VETERANS ASSOCIATION, to which the ESFA had made a very timely denation of cash.

Those present seemed to enjoy the film, which starred Elmo Lincoln in the title role, although the silent action did leave much to be desired according to modern standards.

The scenario of the film followed the book with fair accuracy, and Filmo Lincoln was a satisfyingly huge and powerful ape-man, riding elophents, fighting lions and engaging in mortal combat with a giant black man who attempted to kidnap his beloved Jano.

An interesting point of the film was that Tarzan is shown at three different ages, as a babe in arms, as a handsome (and completely naked) boy of twelve or thirteen, played by Gordon Griffith, and as the man, played by Hr. Lincoln.

Unlike the more recent versions of stories based on this immortal character, "Tarzan Of The Apes" is not prosented with tongue in cheek, and does a far better job of convincing the viewer

Here's the latest news on the forthcoming T-V programs, "Fu Manchu" and "Sax Rohmer Presents". First of all, there's a better chance that Fu will be on radio than on T-V this summer. NBC is interested in a radio series, and while Fu was sought as a summer T-V replacement, the producer declined, thinking he can get a better offer in the Fall.

Meanwhile, there may be a summer T-V series, "Sax Rohmer Presents", a series culled from several hundred short stories, and featuring some of his better-known characters, such as Morris Klaw, the Dream-Detective; Major de Treville, the Crime Magnate; Bazarada, the Magician, based on Harry Houdini; Bimbashi Baruk; and Sumuru, a sort of female Fu Manchu, who seeks to become a world dictator(she was introduced in the Gold Medal pocketbook novel, "Nude In Mink").

Italian movie maker, Vittoria di Sica's, newest movie, "The Miracle Of Milan", will be a switch on the Peter Pan yarn --- it has a flying grandmother.

Lovers of Superman may now sit back and relax. His future is very secure. Flamingo Films, syndicators of movies to T-V programs, has purchased the video rights to the comic strip character for thirty years at an estimated million dollars per year. I wish my future were that secure!

Fritz Kortner is undertaking a Berlin sequel to the silent screen classic, "The Cabinet Of

Dr. Caligari", with Werner Krauss also in the new version.

"QUICK" predicts: "The next boom in television programming will come in dramatizing sciencefiction for adults". (From the issue of May 14th, 1951)

Most of you have seen or heard of the "Bowery Boys" pictures. They are all the same, merely zany adventures of a supposed NY gang. However, in the series, there is a "genuine" ghost, a 300-year-old spirit, just arrived from heaven. He is visible only to "Sach", the stupidest member of the gang. Naturally, the others think he's crazy. No use telling the plot of the film because it's hardly worth it. I only mention it because it is fantasy, even though a very poor grade.

RKO has concluded a deal to distribute three films which Aubrey Wisberg and Jack Pollexfen will produce independently. The first will be "3,000 A.D.", a stf. venture, which they have been preparing for six months. Their last picture was "The Man From Planet X".

Also at RKO, George Bricker has been engaged to work on the scenario of another stf. film, "Lost In Space", from a story by Edna and Edward Anhalt.

British movie magnate, J. Arthur Rank, is making plans to film Jules Verne's "20,000 Leagues Under The Sea" --- in technicolor.

Superfan Forry Ackerman has a highly informative article on stf. movies in the September issue of "IMAGINATION". He lists and describes dozens of stories to be seen on the screen.

"Los Cuentos Jantasticos" Increases Price

The April 1951 issue of Mexico's Les Ouentos Fantasticos arrived in the USA last week, revealing that its price had been increased from \$1.00 Mexican to \$1.20 Mexican per issue. This issue contains a cover reprinted from an old Amazing Stories and no interior illustrations. It has five stories: "MI Planeta Enemigo" by D. V. Gallery, "Liora Un Nino" by John D. HacDonald, "Un Golpe A La Puerta" by Fre design Brown, "El Estanque Nupcial" by Zona Gale and "La Humanidad Parasita" by Bustillo Oro.

The magazine is pulp size, trimmed edges and 50 pages. This is a real collector's item for all stf fans.

"THRILLS" Nº 12 ARRIVES

Australia's only stf magazine, Thrills Inc. arrived in the USA this week, containing four stories: "Calibrated Death" by Roc Hampton, "Kidnapped In Chaos" by Paul Valdez, "Atomic Riddle" by Ace Carter, and "Naster Of The City" by Rick Hart, Also in this issue is the feature "Frontier Of Infinity" by Geoffrey Stone and a book review of "Concuest Of Space".

Due to the present three-a-year policy, because of the paper shortages, the Summer issue has been skipped.

ACKERMAN IN DUTCH

RELEAST, U. K., 25 June, (CNS) -7ell, I've been to Amsterdam, heart of Holland, with its 40 canals and 600 bridges. Found "1984" and "The Big Eye" translated there with "Day Of The Triffids" coming up as a newspaper serial; but what really amazed me was to find A. Heuritt in Dutch! Yes, I am bringing back with me a beautifully jacketed mint copy of (if memory, hore in Scotland, sorves me correctly) "Dow Schift Van Ishter". Also acquired Burroughs hard to get "Jungle Girl" in an edition from Rotterdam, And an Italian novel of the year 2020 translated into Dutch;

When I last wrote we were still in Germany: Before leaving Frankfurt I had the extreme pleasure to see "Motropolis" with German titles and a sequence never seen in the United States! Also was put on the track of a print of "Girl In The Moon". Then we went to Bivaria, where, in Munich, we not Brightto Holm, scientifilm star of "Atlantide", "Alreune", etc. At a garden party a to Miss Helm's, abounding in counts, princes, princesses, the District Atterney, etc. (ever 50 representatives of royalty plus several leading blackmarketeers) Vendayne had her hand kissed by the grandson of the Kurser of Germany!

In Munick we saw an excellent fantastic film, "The Eternal Game", but I doubt it will ever be shown in America; at Peast, if so, it will be considerably consored. I found a lovely copy of "A Brincess Of Mars" in German in Hundch, and some Max Brand titles for Darroll Richardson; also several original Germa str novels, including "Adventure os On Vonus", "Southwest Vonus", and one about an artificial world beneath the Etrih's crust, But we felt uneasy in that ruined city (45 percent destroyed) a particularly after a trio of shady characters got away with 20 bucks of our fast vanishing greenbacks.

We next went to the unique principality of Luxemberry, and from there made an unexpected deteur to France. We had not expected to return to Paris, but decided we liked it so well we'd rather sacrifice a couple of days elsewhere a return there. We had the great good fortune to see "Baron Munchhausen", the technicolor fantasy film which cannot even be shown in the country of its origin, and there is no prospect of its being released in the USA. It abounds in fantastic happenings, climaxing with a trip to the Moon with its amezing flora and astonishing Selenites.

Passed thru Belgium on the way to the south of the Netherlands, where we stayed with a stf-Esperantist acquaintance of mine. Then to the capital and a couple days in the company of stf artist Bon Abas, Back to London briofly where I saw a bunch of new stf mags and books, for the firstime in am bout a month, also the Life article, two issues of Fantasy-Times, and a numbor of fotos from the European Conven-Tod Carnell had so much good news concerning Ackormon Fantasy Agency placements in English periodicals that I'm contemplating taking a side trip to Ireland to see Walter Willis and the fens thoro, and in fact am off to Edinburgh right now to see about booking a flight from Glasgov tomorrow morning.

After this, Margaret St. Clair told how she got ideas for her stories. Dr. Bernard I. Kahn, chief psychiatrist of the Psychopathic Division of the Oakholl Naval Hospital, and author of three stories in Astounding Science Fiction, gave a talk on "The Psychological Aspects of Science Fiction".

The main event of the Westercon was the presentation to George Pal, producer of "Destination Moon" and "When Worlds Collide", of "The Invisible Little Man" award, "for bringing science-fiction to the motion picture screen". The award was presented by Anthony Boucher. Pal was apparently very moved by the award. He stated that, despite his previous ideas about not being typed, after an award like this, he could never produce anything but science-fiction.

The last event was the showing of Jean Cocteau's allegorical film, "Orpheus".

The 1952 Westercon will be held in San Diego.

I was greatly disappointed to discover that "The Green Hills Of Farth", the new Heinlein anthology, contained no or iginal story by him. At a casual inspection, only one story seems to have been rewritten and that is "We Also Walk Dogs", which originally appeared in Astounding under his alternogo of Anson MacDonald; it has been fitted more closely into the Future History series, though it never did conflict seriously with it.

Doubtlessly, the reader recalls Isaac Asimov's story "Hostoss" which appear ed in the May Galaxy; it was recommended in this column as. "Best Bet Of The Month". Well, it caused quite a stir of puzzlement as to Asimov's moaning in the story - some asserting that ho . meant that the Earth government was apreading the Inhibition Disease among its neighbors for purpose of gain, and others that the action was motivated by . the mysterious "pseudo-genes". In response to a query. Mr. Asimov writes to say that the latter interportation is the correct one: "The ending on "Hostess" was, through an unfortunate chain of circumstances, not the original one. The original one made it quite clear that your interpretation was correct. Unfortunately, a completely fortuitious

similarity between that ending and the ending of another story that had not yet appeared at the time of submission made it advisable that I change my ending. This was done, but some clarity was lost. If the story is ever anthologized, I shalltry to restore the original ending if I can."


ASIMOV AUTOGRAPHING PARTY
