'SPACE STF', 'ROCKET STORIES' DUE SOON

MANY FROS AND FANS AT ESFA'S 6TH
ANNIVERSARY MEETING

Newark, New Jersey, 2 March, (CNS) - Lester del Rey announced at the Eastern Science Fiction Association's anniversary meeting today that, he is the editor of two new scientifictional mags soon to hit the market. One, he stated, would be Space Science Fiction, a digest-size, 35% bi-monthly, aimed more at the general public than most stf mags; a magazine that will take its place with the best of them. This one should be out april 1st. Del Rey stated that he'd pay top rates for the right story for this magicine. The second, he went on, is a spaceopera stf mag called Rocket Stories: a magazine for the somewhat younger reader. One who has just started reading stf, or perhaps, one just out of the comic stage. This mag will also be a bi-monthly, digest-size and 35%. TEMPORARY SUSPENDED

New York, N.Y., 28 Feb., (CNS) - The Avon Publishing Go. amounced today that their science-fiction editor, Donald A. Wollheim, had loft them, and that their two fantasy publications, Avon Fantasy Reader and Avon Science Fiction Reader have been temporary suspended. When and if they are to be revived is not known at this time. It was pointed out tho that the magazines were not suspended because Wollheim leave because they were suspended.


