Evanston, III., 20 Earch, (CIS) - Bea Mahaffey and Ray Palmer annumed today that their science-fiction magazine, Other Yorlds, will soon go monthly. Exactly with what issue this step will be taken is not known at this time, but the plans are all set and as soon as final arrangements are mide, Other Worlds will be a monthly magazine. The magazine is

published every six-weeks at the present time.

All this is the excellent results of the plea for readers to subscribe to Other Worlds at the rate of 25 issues for \$5. In the March editorial, Ray Palmer stated that if 2,000 subscriptions at this rate could be pledged, he would go monthly. A pparently emough readers have pledged the \$5s, as Mr. Palmer is now asking them to send in the money as the mag is going monthly. These subscribers will also have the previlage to subscribe to OW at the rate of 20¢ a copy for life.



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
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
