Berkeley, Calif. 12 June. The editors of MOFASF are Anthony Boucher & J. Francis McCommas. Anthony Boucher recently saw hi s famous book"Rocket To The Morgue" published in pocket edition by Dell (254). This murder mystery has science-fiction writers, editors and fans as characters and should be of interest to all followers of s-f. It first appeared in 1942 under the pen-name of H. H. Holmes. Of special interest is the book's new afterword, surveying the s-f picture since the novel was first written and was especially authored for this edition.

It is doubtful whether more than a few fan publishers and other non-professionals will be able to afford these rates. For example, Fantasy - Times usually takes space in World Convention program booklets, but this year good-will has fought a losing battle with such inflation.


