At the Sept 1st meeting of The Eastern Science Fiction Association, held at the Slowak Sokol Hall, 358 Morris Ave, Newark, NJ, the 19 attendees relected Sam Moskowitz as director for a six month term. Opposing candidates were Alex Osheroff, Geo R Fox and Ricky Slavin.

Gerry de la Ree, Jr. was reelected to the Treasurer's against candidate Llold Alpaugh.

The most bitterly fought for office was the position of Secretary in which Ricky Slavin was opposed by Jimmy Wheaton. Two votes were called and both were ties, a third secret ballot was taken and Wheaton emergered the victor 10 to 8.

Science Fiction fan friends learned this week that A. Langley Searles, prominent New York fan and collector would marry within a month.

The the announcement did not come as a complete surprize. Searles having been warned consistantly that his obsession for Square Dances would end in his being "burnt", friends were saddened despite their congradulations, for Searles had a brilliant fan future.

His collection of magazines was complete down to every Weird Tales, he had 1500 fantasy books of selective quality, sets of many leading fan magazines and innumerable rare fantastic curios. His collection was known to be the finest in the East and

possibly in the country. Funtasy Commentator, his fan publication had established itself as the bible of serious collectors, establishing maintaining a quality of material hitherto unknown. It had been hoped that he might someday complete his started bibliography of books, the most comprehensive work in this line attempted. Recently his fine work had earned him votes as one of the top ten fans in the recent "Boowulf" poll, and at the First Post War Convention in Newark NJ, Searles as a featurespeaker drew favorable comment from the newspapers.

Searles has stated that he will continue Fantasy Commentator and the serious collectors will wait in trepidation to see if he can fullfill that obligation.
