

Even Shaver was better and that's getting mighty low. Greatly missed were: "The Editorial", "Readers! Column" and "The Club House". Bring them back! The new Amazing is now 35¢, digest-size, trimmed edges, 162 pages and bi-monthly.

Apparently my unfavorable review of Crt Siodnak's "A-Mon" picture (in the 1st January 1953 issue of Fantasy-Timos) is a minority report.
