WORLD'S OLDEST SCIENCE-FICTION 'NEWSPAPER

J Donald Adams, of the Book Review Section of The New York Times, devoted his July 12th and 19th columns to sciencefiction. At present, he's being"impartial" and is "suspending judgement" -b u t. I believe that he's girding up his loins for an attack on the field. His present ideas about science-fiction are derived from R. Bretnor's Modern-Science Fiction and, more particularly, from Bretnor's contribution to that symposium, "The Future of Science Fiction". I don't blame him for being sceptical of the worth of science-fiction as long as his experience is restricted to that book: the volume in general and Bretnor in particular ludicrously and pompously over-stated the case for science-fiction.

Another article on science-fiction is to be found in Alan deFoe's column in the August issue of The American Mercury. Curiously, he spends most of his time discussing Ernest Thompson Sexton. the animal story writer. (van Vogats "Slan" was inspired by Senton's "Biography of a Grizzley", but Defoe connects Sexton with science-fiction on the grounds-that his natural science was fiction).

The Honry Kuttners are in Mexico, writing a science-fiction novel. It will be published by Ballantine Books, which is paying them an outright \$5,000 for it. August Derleth is preparing an anthology for Rinehart which will subsequently be published by B. Llantine.

For POGO fans: POGO PARADE, a 25¢ comic book with 96 pages, has just appeared on the stands. It reprints 11 of the old Albert the Alligator and Albert and POGO stories which appeared in Animal Conics -- a magazine which saw some thirty-odd issues, being suspended in 1948. Compared to the current POGO strip .these are often crude-but have a historical interest as well as being funny in their own right. I suspect that next year will probably see another volume

The 11th World Science Fiction Convention's program is shaping up very well. In addition yo Willy Ley, we are having Flecher Pratt. who will talk on Computing Machines. L. Sprague de Camp, Lester del Rey, and Robert W. Lowndes will take part in a symposium on "Science Fiction as a Career". Bert Campbell. from England, editor of Authentic Science Fiction, will speak, as well as Tetsu Yanu, of Japan. There will be a costume party, sponsored by The New York Science Fiction Circle. Entertainment by fans from Chicago, Pittsburgh, and by Ted Sturgeon. And More. We're planning a real good time.

House, announced today that the 2nd issue of their newest science - fiction
magazine, Tops In Science Fiction, will
be out shortly. The new magazine will
be digest-size, 128 pages & 35¢ & will
contain reprints of Planet Stories.

Mr. Reiss had this to say about the new issue: "We are going ahead with TOPS IN SCIENCE FICTION. I expect we will be putting it out two or three times a year as usual but it will be in a new format — the digest size, 128 pages. This issue will contain reprint stories, but some rather unusual ones carefully culled from the best back issues of PLANET. If the magazine is successful in the new size we expect to put in new material".

The second issue of Tops will be dated Fall 1953, and will contain stories by Bradbury, Brackett, Abernathy, Parker and others.

The first issue of Tops In Science Fiction was dated Spring 1953, was regular pulp size. 128 pages and 25¢.

Australia - At the Thursday night meeting at the Sydney Bridge Club of Sydney Science Fiction Fans, (28th May) Vol Molesworth dropped a surprise packet by announcing that Australia was to have its own two S-F pro mags. He went on to say that they were called Popular Science Fiction and Future Science Fiction, and that if they were successful he would probably become editor of them both.

Popular Science Fiction has 66 pages, and it is about the same size as The Readers Digest. It contains reprints from Galaxy and Startling with such authors as Murray Leinster. It is printed by Associated Newspapers and costs 1/3 Monthly.

Future Science Fiction is the same size as its companion, and contains reprints by such authors as Henry Kutner and Milton Lesser. This also costs 1/3 monthly.

PALMER TO PUBLISH FICTIONIZED "FATE"

TO BE CALLED "MYSTIC MAG ZINE"

Warners, N. Y., 20 August, (CNS) - Ray Palmer's third new magazine, his other two being Universe and Science Stories, will be a "fiction version" of his Fate magazine, and will be called: Mystic Magazine. The first issue will be dated November 1953, sell for 35% and be digest size, probably 128 pages, and be published bi-monthly.

The details of this new magazine were revealed by Robert N. Webster. (reportedly a pen-name of Ray Palmer) editor of Fate, when he send out a circular on Clark Pub. Co stationary, asking readers of Fate to subscribe to the new

"Occult" magazine.

Stated Mr. Webster, in part, "Just wait until you read Ray's own story in the first issue, about the Secret Rulers of Earth and the Coming Ammageddon! And Rog Phillips' startling story of three people who proved their reincarnation. And a story by the managing editor of Fate. Chester Geier, about estral beings who walk unseen among us. Plus the account of the first actual contact with the flying saucers in TRUE HESTIC ADVINTURES. I n LEAGUE OF THE LIVING DEAD you'll read of weird obsession and possession. There are many more I have no room to list: but I've read them all, and I can say right now: This is the magazine you've been waiting for!"
