-by Joe Kennedy-The biggest fantasy bargain in many a month has just appeared on newsstands everywhere. This is The Avon Ghost Reader, a 25¢ pocket-size anthology of a dozen well-chosen tales by authors whose names have become bywords for fantasy collectors. Heading the contents page is The Dunwich Horror by H.P. Lovecraft the fifth time the story has been reprinted since the appearanco of The Outsider and Others) The item which makes this pocket book a must is A. Merritt's excellent short, Throught the Dragon Glass, Other inclusions: The Panelled Room by August Dorleth, The Fireplace by Henry S. Whitehead The Haunted Doll's House by M.R. James, The Squaw by Bran Stoker (the latter tale, a crude attempt at satire, is probably the weakest in the book), wing-less Victory by H.F. Heard, Naked Lady by Mindret Lord, The curious Case of Benjamin Button by F. Scott Fitzgerald, The Bottle Party by John Collier, By The Waters of Babylon by Stephen Vincent Benet, and The Sulamand-or by William Scabrook. All in all, an entertaining selection, despite the rather obvious reliance on previous anthologies of weird and stf, for several of the inclusions.
